

### **USDA Will Not Extend** 1985 Acreage Reduction **Programs' Signup Date**

The U. S. Department of Agriculture will not extend the 1985 acreage reduction programs' signup deadline past the originally scheduled March 1 date, said Everett Rank, Administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Requests to extend the signup period are being received from several areas where some farm-ers have not been able to arrange financing for 1985-crop plantings.

Rank said that USDA encourages such owners and operators to sign up for the program while they work out their financing. If lack of financing is the reason for

not seeding the 1985 crop, USDA will terminate those contracts by mutual agreement and without

mutual agreement penalty.

The 1985 acreage reduction programs are for wheat, feed grains, rice, upland cotton and extra long staple cotton.
