# **Double Funeral Held Sunday**

In Quitague Joint funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque for Cecil Payne, 32, of Boise City, Oklahoma, who was killed in a one-vehicle accident Friday at Clarendon, and for his uncle, Willie E. (Bill) Payne, 53, of Quitaque, who died of natural causes the same day.

The Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Silverton, and the Rev. Mike Grebenik, pastor of the Quitaque Baptist Church, officiated. Burial for both was in Resthaven Cemetery at Quitaque by Quitaque Funeral Home.

The accident occurred shortly after 9:00 p.m. Friday 4.3 miles north of Clarendon on Texas Highway 70.

Mr. Payne was traveling southbound in his pickup truck at a high rate of speed when the accident occurred, said Department of Public Safety officials.

The pickup ran off the road-way to the right and overturned two and one-half times. Mr. Payne was thrown from the vehicle and was pinned beneath it, officials said.

officials said. He was dead at the scene. Cecil Payne, born in Floyd County, was a cowboy and a member of the First Baptist Church in Quitaque.
