to order the City vehicle at the bid price. The meeting was then adjourned


Special Called Meeting

Leafing Texas: Foliage At Caprock Canyons State Park Makes States 'Must See' Top 10 List

Motorists searching for the best sites for fall foliage in Texas have help at their fingertips beginning Oct. 1. The Texas Department of Transportation's fall foliage hotline (800-452-9292) will be open through late November. To make it easier to find the leaves changing color, hotline callers at any hour may request information for seven regions of the state: Big Bend, Gulf Coast, Hill Country, Panhandle, East Texas, Prairies and Lakes (North Central Texas), and Southwest Texas.

TXDOT's website (www.dot.state.tx.us), also beginning in October, will provide information on the best stock to find fall foliage along the state's 70,000 mile highway extern. Foliage maps will be available.

best spots to find fall foliage along the state's 79,000-mile highway system. Foliage maps will be available by clicking "Road Conditions" on the TxDOT homepage.

Foliage information comes from local TxDOT maintenance offices, chambers of commerce and parks

'The presence of fall foliage can be very fleeting in Texas where trees aren't as plentiful as they are in the East," said Heidi Zetty, TxDOT's travel-information manager. "A wind and rain storm could possibly come up and blow all the leaves off the trees and end the season in an instant."

First Baptist Church's Former Pastor Serves God & His Country

From Texas to Korea to Boston, former pastor of FBC Silverton came through here to visit with us at FBC on Sunday night. When First Baptist Church of Silverton called Brother Jim Browning to be their minister, he felt like Silverton, Texas would be his home for many years to come. He never dreamed that the Lord had places for him to go and people he needed to minister to. Jim was and is a chaplain in the United States Air Force (USAF) where he has served for 15 years. For chaplains to serve, each person must be sponsored by a denomination. Since there are every religion in the services, there must be a chaplain who serves that denomination. Brother Browning is sponsored by the North American Mission Board of the Southern Baptists. In 1987 Jim and his wife Jan and their two daughters, Juree and Jill moved to Silverton to serve the Lord. Even though Jim had three more years to serve in the Air Force Reserves, he felt sure he would not be called back to serve. Whoops!

In 1989, the USAF recalled Jim to become chaplain to the servicemen. "Jill and I began praying, Feeling that this was a clear call from the Lord, a week later, Jim proceeded to tell the Silverton Baptists the news. "It was so hard to tell them I was leaving," said Jim. "After all, I told them I was sure I would be here for a long time. It was God's timing, not mine. I was not ready to leave this church. The Lord asked me to trust Him and step out in faith."

The Browning family moved to Kansas in 1989. It was 100 degrees here and 125 degrees in Kansas Jim told us. "The Lord Jesus Christ has blessed me in this ministry," continued Jim. "We were following God into a journey of faith. We had just gotten there when a tanker crashed and four people were killed. I was on the detail that picked up the bodies because I had pastoral and clinical experience." That was really quite an experience for Jim. Following Kansas, the family then moved to San Antonio for 15 months. Then Jim was called to Loring Air Force Base in Northern Maine. They spent two winters (years) there. "They measure time in "winters" there. It snowed in early December and lasted until the end of May and was waist deep. Then they were sent to Brooks AFB at San Antonio. Then they were sent back to Loring AFB.


The Lord had a very special place for Jim to go next. He was

The Lord had a very special place for Jim to go next. He was given the pastoral care of some special troops in Pusan, Korea for a year. Jim given a special reforestation place there to prepare a Promise Keeper's Retreat for the soldiers. "It was an incredible place," he said. 'it reminded me of Arkansas." It was to be held out under the trees. He had planned to speak on King David and had prepared his sermon all week. "Then on Saturday, the Lord told me to change my sermon. By that night, I knew the Lord wanted me to change it, so I did. Instead of a message out of the Old Testament, it came out of the New Testament from the book of Luke. It said, "Jesus told Peter, after you have fallen, encourage your brothers." Jim told the men, no matter how bad you messed up, God can use you." After "Joe" heard the message, he told Jim, "This is the first time I've felt like I could take communion." God used that sermon to show him that God could always use a person who commits his life to the Lord. Jim said that reminded him of the direction the Lord had led him into also. He headed back home to the USA. The Lord had a very special place for Jim to go next. He was given

Jim then went to Boston University to learn to use technology to help the chaplains in their work. Then he was sent to Montgomery, Alabama AFB where he broadcast messages to air force bases. Following that, Jim was sent to the Dover Delaware AFB for three years. From this base they move men and cargo all over the world. He rode planes to Bafran, Kuwait, Spain and Italy and other places. "I got to be with people doing all kinds of different jobs and see what stresses they go through. These men and women serving our country deserve all our prayers and thanks for what they are doing. We all should be very proud of them and support them in every way we can."



With fall coming and the summer fruits waning, apples will be a popular snack after school. Besides eating them out of hand, apples are a great ingredient in lots of different dishes. Apple Beef Stew is different and delicious on those first nippy fall days, and Apple Pear Cake may prove to be one of your favorites. very simple recipe for Fresh Apple Cake can be prepared anytime of year. Enjoy!

Apple Beef Stew 2 pounds boneless stew beef, cut into 1 1/2 inch cubes

- tablespoons butter or margarine medium onions, cut into
- 2 tablespoons flour 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons apple juice 2 bay leaves
- 2 whole allspice
- 2 whole cloves medium carrots, sliced
- 2 medium apples, peeled and cut into wedges

In a large skillet or Dutch oven over medium heat, brown beef in butter.

Add onions; cook until lightly browned. Sprinkle with flour and salt. Gradually add water and apple juice. Bring to a boil; cook and stir 2 minutes. Place bay leaves, allspice and cloves in a cloth spice bag. Add to pan. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 1 ½ hours until beef is almost tender. Add carrots and apples; cover and simmer 15 minutes longer or until meat, carrots and apples are tender. Discard spice bag. Thicken if desired. Serves 4

Apple Pear Cake
2 cups shredded peeled apples

- 2 cups shredded peeled pears
- 2 cups sugar 1 ¼ cups Crisco oil
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup chopped pecans eggs, beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon salt Cream Cheese Frosting:
- softened
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 3 cups powdered sugar
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

In a large bowl, combine the first eight ingredients. Combine dry ingredients; stir into the fruit mixture. Pour into a greased 13x9x2 inch baking pan. Bake at 325° for 1 hour or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack. For frosting, beat cream cheese and butter in a mixing bowl until fluffy. Add sugar milk, and vanilla; mix well

Spread over cooled cake Store leftovers in the refrigerator. Serves 12-15. Fresh Apple Cake

Cream together: 1 1/4 sticks butter 2 cups sugar

2 eggs 2 cups flour

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon baking soda teaspoon baking powder

2 cups raw chopped apples 1 cup chopped nuts 1 cup chopped dates OR raisins

Batter will be very thick. Bake in 13x9x2 inch pan for 40-45 minutes at 350°. If using a glass pan, bake at 325°. Serves 12-15.

Maple Apple Rings
Mix together in shallow bowl: 3/4 cup flour, 1 egg, 1/4 cup maple syrup and 1/4 cup maple syrup and buttermilk. Cut 3 large peeled, cored apples into ¼-inch rings, and dip both sides into batter. Heat 2 inches of oil to 375° and fry rings 2 minutes. Drain and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Serves 4. God Bless America!

This Week's Crop & Weather Report

It's the Great Pumpkin season for Texas producers. Problems in other areas are bringing on a bright orange fall for Texas' crop, according to a Texas Cooperative Extension agent.

"Harvest is strong and heavy. We're moving lots of pumpkins and have been for two weeks. The producers have been shipping them all over: Fort Worth, Kansas City, Washington, D.C. and New York," said

over: Fort Worth, Kansas City, Washington, D.C. and New York," said J.D. Ragland, Extension agent in Floyd County.

According to an article in the Detroit News, crops in Michigan and other northern states were damaged by a cool, wet summer. With that supply down, the demand for Texas pumpkins is higher.

Floydada's annual "Punkin Day," held on the second Saturday of October, draws people from other states as well. Pumpkin rolling, painting, pie cooking and many other pumpkin-related activities will be offered to the vicitors. be offered to the visitors

be offered to the visitors.

Ragland said the majority of pumpkins produced in the county are jack-o-lantern size: 6 to 12 pounds. "They're probably 60 percent of production," Ragland said. "The next most popular is the pie pumpkin; they're 5 to 7 pounds. That's 10 percent of our acreage."

Harvesting pumpkins is very labor intensive, Ragland said. To harvest the Big Macs, a tow sack is spread on the ground, and four field workers roll the pumpkin on to it. Each worker holds one corner of the sack and carefully lifts the pumpkin onto a waiting trailer.

"Average [planted acreage] is 1,800 acres, and this year we planted 2,000 acres. We're getting 7 cents per pound; that's slightly above average," Ragland said. "Low is 5 cents, and high is 10 cents. So we're right in the middle, as the season progresses that might increase." An extra bonus for Texas producers was the favorable weather: More pumpkins were produced per acre.

"Normally we produce 20,000 pounds per acre. This year we've

got about 22,000 pounds [per acre]," he said. "Mainly it's due to the
extra rain we got, which caused rapid growth through the growing
season. It also caused the pumpkins to be larger in terms of weight."
"Perhaps the major reason that this area has become a pumpkin
production region," he said, "is due to the fact that it does not have as
center a problem with viruses as exist in other vegetable production."

According to Ragland, the most favorable market for pumpkins is before Thanksgiving.
"We'll harvest until Halloween, and then it will slow down until

Thanksgiving, when it will pretty much stop," he said.

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Extension district administrators:

PANHANDLE: Soil moisture is short to surplus with most areas reporting adequate. Temperatures were below average; overnight lows reporting adequate. Temperatures were below average; overnight lows were in the upper 30s. Some rain fell early in the week with amounts ranging from 1/4 inch to more than 5 inches. Corn harvest was slowed by wet fields; good yields have been reported. Sorghum continues to mature, but for good progress warmer weather is needed. Harvest was just getting under way before being stopped by rain. Cotton bolls continue to open, but maturation is being slowed by below-average temperatures. Range conditions are rated fair to good.

SOUTH PLAINS: Soil moisture is adequate. Wet weather stalled maturation and harvest of spring-planted crops. Many cotton fields

maturation and harvest of spring-planted crops. Many cotton fields were defoliated and some were strung out. Corn was ready for harvest, Peanut producers were ready for harvest. Pastures and rangeds were in good condition.
ROLLING PLAINS: Soil moisture is short to adequate. Cool

weather and rain was reported. The first bale of cotton was ginned. Some fields were damaged after receiving hail. Wheat was being sown. Peanut producers began harvesting two weeks ago. Reports of peanut leaf spot forced some farmers to begin digging and threshing early. Cattle producers will be entering the winter with good grass cover; they are purchasing stocker cattle for wheat grazing.

If access to a good place to hunt is the only thing keeping you from experiencing what wildlife biologists suggest will be the best quail huntexperiencing what wildlife biologists suggest will be the best qualinum-ing season in years, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has some excellent opportunities for hunters.

"Some of the best quail hunting in Texas this season will be on pub-lic land," said Dennis Gissell, TPWD wildlife management area facili-

ties coordinator.

With the purchase of a \$48 Annual Public Hunting (APH) Permit from TPWD comes access to tens of thousands of acres of quality quail country. Finding a place to hunt is simple using the detailed map booklet that comes with the APH hunting permit. The booklet explains all the rules pertaining to hunting on public land in Texas, along with locator maps of all the hunting areas and the dates each site is open to

Quail season opens Oct. 30 statewide and runs through Feb. 27. The daily bag limit is 15, with a possession limit of 45 quail.

WMAs offering quail hunting, but there are a handful of areas that stand

"If ever someone wanted to give scaled quail hunting a go, this is the year to get out there and do it," Pittman noted. "We have an excellent crop of birds this year.

In the Panhandle, the Matador WMA is prime quail territory. Last season, upwards of 5,000 quail were harvested off the 28,000-acre Matador WMA near Paducah; more than on any other public hunting area in the state. According to area manager Chip Ruthven, this year's outlook is equally promising. "It ought to be better than last year, we're seeing decent numbers of birds," said Ruthven.

With all the talk about tax hikes & tax cuts, it's hard to know the real story and what it means to you. Sometimes you just have to put it in terms you can understand. A friend, Tex Barclay, of Matador sent the following explanation.

Who Benefits From A Tax Cut?

"Since you are all such good customers," he said, "I'm going to reduce the cost of your daily meal by \$20." So, now dinner for the ten only cost \$80.

The group still wanted to pay their bill the way we pay our taxes. So, the first four men were unaffected. They would still eat for free. But what about the other six, the paying customers? How could they divvy up the \$20 windfall so that everyone would get his 'fair share'? The six men realized that \$20 divided by six is \$3.33. But if they subtracted that from everybody's share, then the fifth man and the sixth man would each end up being 'PAID' to eat their meal.





What is it about my local paper that I love?
It's called the News-Sun and lists the communities it serves under the masthead; the largest, population 3,500, the smallest, 200, if that. It comes out every Wednesday and high school students sell it in front of the post office. Or, you can buy it at Safeway, the only grocery store and the busiest place in town. We subscribed the year before we moved to the community. We read about our future neighbors, the real estate ads, city politics, parades, school activities and the antics of local characters.

"Letters to the Editor" was my favorite part of the paper then. It still is today.

Ironically it was carrying my weekly column, but when we moved here it discontinued it! It was a relief, actually. The column is published nationally and written with a 'broad stroke.' However when your next-door neighbor or Sunday School teacher thinks it only runs locally, they suspect you of pretending grandiosity. The compensation was that the closest big-city paper (many thousands circulation) picked it up.

My local paper takes itself seriously. The bulk of the news stories from "Crash on the Highway" to "Top Grads Recognized" are done by the editor and one busy reporter. They are skilled writers and circumspect about not flavoring the news with "news analysis." "Just the facts, ma'am, just the facts."

Small town papers often thrive because CNN or The New York Times are not going to scoop them for coverage of the "VFW Fish Fry," "Bridge Construction Delay," or local boys and girls playing baseball, receiving scholarships, graduating, getting married or going off to war.

I think of local papers as the last refuge of unfiltered America. A running documentary of the warts and triumphs of real people unfettered by the spin, the bias and the opaque polish of today's homogenized journalism.

It is the difference between homemade bread and Pop Tarts. It gives our little community a sense of place in the world. We are important to somebody. We make a difference. The paper recognizes that.

They are the glue, the mirror, the billboard, the flashlight,

Patriots Dismantle Owls

The Valley Patriots used a defense that only allowed 55 total yards to help dismantle the Hedley Owls 46-0 last Friday night. The Patriots,who had been giving up only 69 yards a game defensively, used nine tackles from Zack Ramsey and three interceptions to help stop the Owl offense.

In addition to his nine tackles, Ramsey recorded an interception and a reception for the Patriots. Charlie Walden recorded eight tackles, Cody Barrett recorded six tackles and ran an interception back for a touchdown, and Bryant Ortiz recorded eight tackles and scored twice in his first start of the year.

"We were very strong defensively against a pretty good Hedley team," Coach Bret Tyler said. "They were able to move the ball a little bit but we held them out of the endzone and were able to score outselves."

Barrett started the second quarter with a 20 yard interception return for a touchdown before Espinoza scored from 25 yards out and 20 yards out to give Valley the huge lead. Matt Whittington finished off the Owls with a spectacular 24 yard run in which he hurdled one player and ran over another to score.

Fidel Valdes kicked the final extra point and then intercepted Hedley's last ditch effort to score. Valdes, Espinoza, Whittington, and Kye Fuston each recorded four tackles.

"We had excellent blocking, as usual," Tyler said. "One of our strengths this year has been that everyone gets on a defender and stays on him. It makes it easier for our backs to find running lanes when everyone is being blocked."

Ortiz finished the game with two carries for 41yards and two touchdowns, while Cody Barrett completed three out of five passes for 44 yards. Walden caught the longest pass on a 22 yard catch and run.

"It was good to get another win," Tyler said. "This is a quality team we played. We play another one this week and need to be prepared. With seven district games, you just can't afford to have a down week."
