

economists say that prices for farm and ranch products compared to the cost of produc-tion are the lowest this century.

Because of depressed prices, some people are reluctant to install needed soil and water conservation practices. Yet post-poning the use of these measures can damage land and water resources while increasing the cost of correcting the problem

Practices such as parallel terraces, waterways, shaping and brush control are expensive, but remember that some practic-es cost very little. If you do not think you can afford conservation work, perhaps you can use some alternative treatments that are relatively inexpensive and will help reduce long-term costly

On cropland, for example, you may want to consider using better crop residue management, better crop residue management, or you may need to rotate your crops to include a high residue producing crop every other year. Few practices can do as much to protect the soil and conserve moisture as good as crop residue management. Conservation tillage, strip crops, windstrips and furrow diking are also inexpensive but effective conservation measures.

On rangeland, you should consider using planned grazing systems (rotation) to maximize grazing efficiency. Prescribed burning of rangeland is another inexpensive measure that is effective.

The problems of depressed prices won't be easy to solve. But you might want to consider conservation treatment alternatives, some of which are very effective with little capital investment. vestment.
