## Joint City Council Meeting Concerns Disposal Grant

A joint City Council meeting will be conducted Tuesday, March 3rd at 7:00 p.m. at the Quitaque City Hall between the cities of Silverton and Quitaque. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss and consider the partial funding for a solid waste

transfer station for the two communities.

In recent grant proposals, the application was ranked 7th at State in the Texas Community Development block grants, which left the application only partially funded. The two city councils will be considering how this money can be used to construct the facility by cutting costs.

Following that joint meeting, the City of Quitaque will conduct its regular monthly council meeting on a Tuesday instead of the first Monday night.
