## THE RAINS CAME!

After a year of short moisture, Quitaque received a good three inches of rain, according to report from City Secretary James Brunson.

Last Wednesday the Valley Tribune editor started to Silverton to take some advertising and newspaper material and ran through a rainstorm going up the caprock that impaired driving

visibility. That day, the Dale Smiths, who live southwest of Quitaque approximately five miles, received four inches of rain. On Monday they got another .60 and an inch early Tuesday morning.

The City received 1.4 Wednesday, 1.3 Monday and .30 early Tuesday morning, bringing a total of three inches. This brings the yearly total to 6.20, approximately four inches short for the year.

Needless to say, the RAIN was welcome. It fell so nicely that most of it will be beneficial.

Turkey also received beneficial rains last week and on Monday of this week. Your Turkey editor had to jump a big stream of water to get to her car two different times, but no one can complain about rain. The moisture will help the farmers and ranchers a lot.

Several members of the Valley Future Farmers of America will be receiving State Awards and Degrees at the State FFA Convention which will be held in Lubbock July 11-12-13.


