Five File For Places On Turkey-Quitauque Board Turkey Man Fatally Injured in Roll-Over

At the close of the filing deadline on March 23, five persons had filed as candidates for three positions in the Turkey-Quitauque I.S.D. Board of Trustees. Two positions will be vacant for the May 7th election.

Thelma Gafford and Steve Ulrey have filed as candidates for the two-year unexpired term vacated by the resignation of Larry Curry.

Mrs. Gafford is the incumbent, while Ulrey is a candidate for the first time. Jim Saul is completing nine years on the Board and will not run for a fourth term.

Turkey City Council has two candidates running for two places. Brian Wheeler, incumbent, has filed for reelection to Place 1, while Rita Guest has filed for Place 4. Hubert Price is incumbent in

the Mayoral race, with Richard L. Greene opposing him for the position.

In the Quitauque races, three candidates, Danny Mayfield, Manuel Cruz, and Warren Lee Merrell have filed as candidates for two places -- those

vacated by A. B. Ramsey and Elgin Conner. Incumbent Randy Powell is running unopposed for an unexpired term. Elgin Conner vacated his city council seat to run unopposed for Mayor.

Jesse Lopez Jr., 24, of Turkey, died Sunday from injuries suffered in a one-vehicle rollover near Canadian, and two other Turkey men also were injured, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Lopez, a passenger in the 1984 Chevrolet pickup truck, died at 7:44 a.m. in Canadian Hemphill County Hospital.

A second passenger, James R. Lopez, 18, was listed in serious condition with internal injuries at the same hospital.

Jose R. Lopez, driver of the vehicle, suffered scrapes and bruises, and was reported in

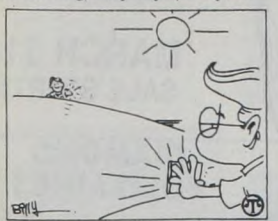

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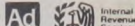


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Caprock Comments

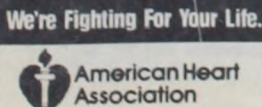
NUEVO STUDY CLUB

When Easter's Over, Eat Those Eggs

When Easter is over, mothers are faced with using all those leftover eggs. That's no problem in families that enjoy whole hard-cooked eggs. Sometimes, however, coming up with ideas requires some thought. Hard-cooked eggs are not as versatile as raw, but they can be utilized in a number of different ways. The most common are egg salads and deviled eggs.

To enliven an egg salad sandwich, serve it piled with lettuce, tomatoes, onions, celery and cucumbers. For an even easier but just as tasty sandwich, slice the eggs and pair them with leftover Easter ham or turkey. Perk up deviled eggs with any one of the following: chopped chives, picante

sauce, minced ham, chopped olives or grated cheese.

Leftover eggs are also good in potato, tuna, ham or poultry salads. They can be creamed, turned into dips or served in curries or casseroles. The list isn't endless, but an enterprising cook can make good use of this nutritious little package of protein, vitamins and minerals.

Egg protein is an ideal balance of essential amino acids, the building blocks of protein. In fact, egg protein is of such high quality that it is often used as the standard by which other protein is measured. Eggs contain 13 vitamins, but no vitamin C, and minerals including phosphorus, magnesium,

potassium and iron.

So, don't throw those brightly colored Easter eggs away. Take advantage of their nutritional value and versatility in dishes like these from the TDA test kitchen.

SOUTHERN SAUSAGE-EGG CASSEROLE

6 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 C. butter or margarine
1/4 C. all-purpose flour
1/2 tsp. salt
Dash of black pepper
2 C. milk
1 lb. bulk pork sausage, cooked and drained

1 (17 oz.) can whole kernel corn, drained

1 C. soft bread crumbs
1 T. butter or margarine

Slice 2 eggs into 1 1/2-quart casserole dish. Blend butter, flour, salt and pepper in saucepan; add milk all at once. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture is boiling and thickened. Stir in sausage and corn; pour over eggs. Slice remaining eggs and arrange on top of sausage mixture. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and dot with 1 tablespoon butter. Bake in 375 degree F. oven 20-25 minutes or until heated through. Makes 6 servings.

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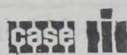
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EMS, Women Honored During Month of March

During March females in all walks of life were honored, as part of Women's History Month. Emergency medical services is one field where women have played a key role in the early development of the profession-as field medics, as trainers, and as administrators.

Gene Weatherall, Chief of Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Emergency Management, remembers the early years of EMS: "Twenty years ago when EMS was just becoming a profession on its own by breaking away from funeral homes, women were a very important part of its development because so many organizations depended on volunteers and because it is a medical field. Women are a vital part of the modern EMS profession." Today

nearly half of the 38,000 certified emergency care personnel in Texas are women.

There are remarkable women involved in Texas EMS. Faye Rainey-Thomas ran a volunteer organization in the Hill Country's Utopia for years before she took over the paid service in Corsicana in east Texas. Today she is also chair of the statewide Texas EMS Advisory Council. Babe Aycock, an Emergency Medical Technician with Special Skills and the Mayor of Mart, a rural community in north central Texas, leads that community's cadre of 30-some volunteers. In recent high-angle rescue training, all five of the Mart participants were women. Lubbock's Bonnie Jackson has trained hundreds of West Texas EMT's and paramedics in the years she has been teaching health professions for Texas Tech University. Jackson was honored by the Texas Department of Health this year during EMS Week as Texas' Outstanding EMS Educator. A typical female crew is the city of Austin EMS crew of Emergency Medical Technicians Patrice O'Neal and Marjorie Leichsenring. O'Neal and Leichsenring are remarkable not because they are known in state EMS circles, but because what they do as women in EMS is what every other woman and man in Texas EMS does - save lives every time they go to work.

The Quitaque Ambulance Service has ten (10) volunteers and five (5) of these are women. Judy Barrett, Dianne Brunson, Susie Shannon, Kay Calvert, and Kathey Taylor are a vital part of the Quitaque Ambulance Service.

Easter Eggs Have Colorful History

(AUSTIN)--The Easter tradition of coloring eggs came to the new World with the Pennsylvania Dutch in 1728. These deeply religious, hard-working farm people colored eggs as tokens of good times to come, a custom that spread across Pennsylvania and New York and eventually the entire country. Decorated eggs, however, never

belonged exclusively to Christian custom, but were symbols of fertility and the earth's spring renewal long before the time of Christ. The ancient Chinese gave painted eggs as gifts during a three-day spring festival. And Persians marked the beginning of their religious year every spring with a feast that included giving colored eggs to friends and strangers.
