TILLAGE RESEARCH DATA CAN HELP MAINTAIN HIGH YIELDS

Harvest results from the first
 grain sorghum minimum tillage
 study at the High Plains Research
 Foundation indicates that the
 High Plains area probably does
 not need to be "farmed to death"
 to maintain high yields.

In this study, harvest results
 showed little difference between
 sorghum yields in the plots where
 seedbed preparation was done the
 conventional way and where seed-
 bed preparation consisted only of
 one chisel down the middle of the
 old row where cotton was planted
 the preceding year. This was done
 to permit water penetration.

Dennis Mooney, Foundation re-
 searcher, said the plots in which
 seedbed preparation included
 mold board, disking, floating and
 listing, yields averaged 8,301
 pounds per acre. In the plots
 where seedbed preparation in-
 cluded only the chiseling prior to
 planting, the yield was 8,103
 pounds per acre. This method of
 seedbed preparation could save the
 High Plains farmer approxi-
 mately \$15.00 per acre.

"In plots where no seedbed pre-
 paration was done, the yield av-
 eraged 7,298 pounds per acre,"
 Mooney said.

These tests were conducted on
 cotton stubble crop land.
 Mooney said the difference in
 the chiseled and conventional till-

ed plots compared to the no till-
 age method was moisture stress,
 due to the inability of the water
 to penetrate in the unchiseled
 plots. "You could see it while it
 was growing. The plots that were
 not chiseled did not take the wa-
 ter and showed moisture stress
 through the entire growing sea-
 son," he said.

"The plots had no cultivation
 after planting," Mooney said. A
 mixture of Paraquat and Propa-
 zine was used for weed control.
 The Paraquat was used as a con-
 tact herbicide for immediate con-
 trol and the Propazine was used
 for residual season long control.
 Mooney said the chemicals offer-
 ed "good" season long weed con-
 trol. He pointed out that the plots
 with minimum tillage did have a
 few more weeds than the conven-
 tional preparation method, "and
 this could have contributed to the
 yield differences," he said.

The sorghum was planted May
 22 on flat land with 150 pounds
 of nitrogen per acre used in a
 side-dress application.

Grain Sorghum Variety Test Results Are Announced Here



Results of the Briscoe County
 Grain Sorghum Variety demon-
 stration are complete. The 1969
 test proved very successful in that
 good yields were made on the
 major varieties planted in this
 area.

Riley Harris, who farms seven
 miles west and three miles south
 of Silverton, was the cooperator
 for this demonstration, and did
 an outstanding job of his cultur-
 al practices. The test plots were
 planted May 2, 1969, and were
 harvested October 2, 1969.

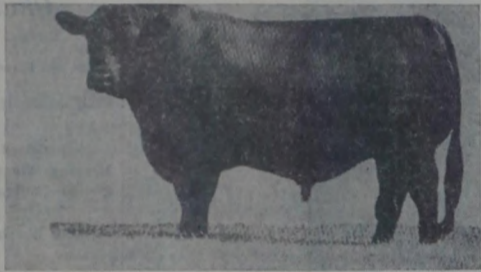
