Quitaque Baptist Revival Opens Sunday

Weeks of preparation have focused toward the revival at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque, which begins April 15 and continues through April 21.

The evangelist for the revival will be Aaron Laverty of Mobeetie. He is now involved in full-time evangelism, and his picture and personal biography are included elsewhere in the Tribune.

The music evangelist for the revival is Ross Hartsfield, who is the Minister of Music at the First Baptist Church in Andrews.

Rev. Jess Little, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Quitaque, said, "We feel we have a truly outstanding evangelistic team coming to our church next week, and we invite everyone who possibly can to come to worship with us."

Morning services will begin at 7:00 a.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and the evening services each night will begin at 7:30 p.m.

A nursery will be provided for each service for children pre-school age through six.

Aaron Laverty of Mobeetie, Texas, will be the evangelist for the revival at the First Baptist Church in Quitaque beginning April 15.

Although Aaron Laverty is now in full-time evangelism, for a number of years before this he served as pastor of churches in Canadian, Borger and Mobeetie. He also served as a missionary with Spanish Missions for a four-year period before surrendering to full-time evangelism.

During his period as pastor, he was involved with youth camps for eighteen years, serving as camp missionary, and in various other capacities. He was also employed by the Home Mission Board during his service with the Spanish-speaking people in Colorado.

His evangelism has led him over a vast area, including revivals in four churches in Idaho, and a number throughout Texas and adjoining states.

Aaron Laverty's background has uniquely qualified him for his mission in full-time evangelism, and the public is invited to attend each service next week.

Ross Hartsfield, who is the music evangelist for the First Baptist Church revival next week, was born and reared in West Texas. He graduated from San Angelo High School and attended Hardin-Simmons in Abilene, where he received his bachelors and masters degrees in music.

During his music ministry, Mr. Hartsfield has served churches in San Angelo and the First Baptist Church in Andrews, where he is now minister of music.

He has sung in shows in Germany, Columbia, Equador, Mexico, Poland and the Soviet Union.

His own choirs have led successful mission efforts in Colorado and Florida.

Mr. Hartsfield said, "Music can be a powerful and useful tool in the hands of God, a tool through which He can touch a life, convict a heart, and bring a person to a life-changing experience with Jesus Christ."

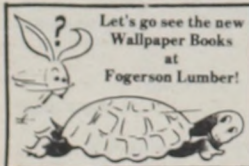
