**Applicator Training Set**

Silverton-Private Pesticide Applicator Training is set for Brisco County on Tuesday, April 4th at eight a.m. It will be held in the district courtroom on the third floor of the Brisco County Courthouse. This course is for individuals who do not have a license and wish to receive one. Individuals who already have a license will not benefit from this training, unless you received your license between January 10, 1989 and December 31, 1989. Then you must be retrained and retested.

The training will take approximately three hours. At the end of the training, Lavon Harmon-Texas Department of Agriculture, will be there to test individuals. The test consists of 100 questions and will take about one hour.

Individuals interested in taking the training and test should pre-register by calling the Brisco County Extension office at 823-2131.

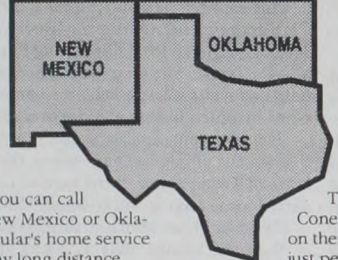

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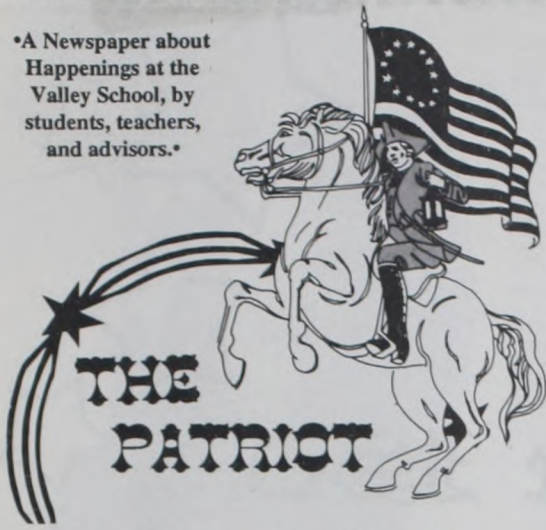

### Boll Weevil Trapping Program

Plains Cotton Growers along with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is participating in a boll weevil trapping program again this year.

This program allows cotton growers and consultants to purchase four traps, four poles, twenty pheromone and eight kill strips for a cost of \$12.

The producer or consultant will monitor trap catches and report to the local Extension Agent, who will in turn summarize the information.

This program will allow us to "take the temperature" of the weevil situation across the area which will in turn help the control program get a better grasp of the kind of control effort that will be necessary in the fall if the boll weevil eradication referendum passes. Traps will also help producers and consultants determine if fields will benefit from an overwintered weevil insecticide application.

Traps can be ordered through the Brisco County Extension office. The deadline for placement of orders is April 11th. The Extension office phone number is 823-2131.

### Horse Accessories Company Helps Revitalize Quitaque's Downtown Trade

More than 15 years ago, Norlin Mora joined a company here that many predicted would fail.

"I think that made me want to make it work even more," she said of the Texas Horse Pad Inc. Three days after she was hired, her boss told her, "It's all yours." Then he appointed her manager and left town. Mora, who knew nothing about making about making horse pads, set about learning the business.

Texas Horse Pad was founded in September 1979, when two saddle-making brothers, Gary and Troy Skinner, sensed a market for wholesale saddle accessories. A Quitaque bank convinced them to open their factory here in an effort to begin restoring the downtown area. The thriving company now is housed in three formerly vacant buildings.

In the early days, employees were thrilled when they were able to put together 100 pads per week, Mora said. Now they produce 900. It takes from 10 to 20 minutes to make a pad, depending on the style, she added. "Every second is pennies to us."

First, furniture fabric is measured and cut on huge tables. Wear leathers then are sewn onto the pad. Sewing machines whirl constantly as employees quilt the pads, deftly moving the fabric under a blur of needles.

When completed, the pads are sacked, boxed and shipped to distributors through out the

United States and Canada.

It took Mora, who now is vice president, and other fumbling employees quit awhile to refine the procedure used today, she said.

"You pretty much figure out the fastest ways when you get down to it," she said, recalling the nights she remained at the factory until 9 or 10 P.M.

These days, Mora spends most of her time helping customers and selecting trendy fabrics. Pads are like clothes, she explained, adding that dark and South west patterned fabrics are in, while pastels have made an abrupt exit from the horse fashion scene. "You just try something and see if it's going to work."

Many customers of the Texas Horse Pad have been buying from the company since its early days, Mora said. "Everybody who buys from us always come back."

The company has 14 employees who work with rapid hands as they listen to the mournful strains of popular county songs drifting across one large room.

Mora runs the Texas Horse Pad like she does her household, she said, carefully keeping an eye on cost and efficiency.

The factory gave her not only an opportunity to raise her children in a small town but also to attempt what some called the impossible, she said.

"I enjoyed it all, or I wouldn't be here."

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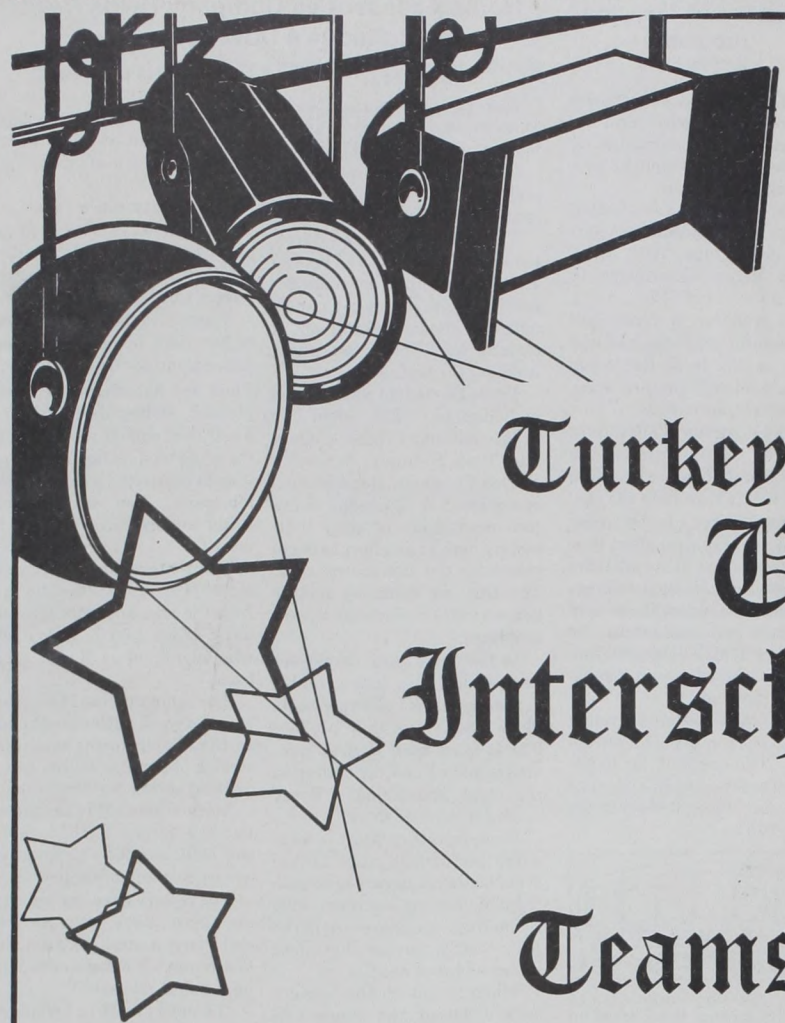

**Small Business Urged to Check Wage Reports**

Small businesses are urged to take steps to insure that the wage reports (Form W-2) they give to their employees during February are error-free. Most small employers file paper reports, which are most likely to involve errors.

These reports show the amount of wages you paid to your employees and how much you withheld from them for Social Security and Medicare taxes during the past year. While large employers are required to make these wage reports by magnetic media, businesses with fewer than 250 wage reports have the option of using either magnetic media or paper to file these reports.

Errors in filing these reports can be costly. Correct reporting saves time and money for you and the government. The Social Security Administration investigates over 200,000 wage reporting errors annually. The IRS can assess penalties for the employer if discrepancies in wage reports are not reconciled.

Correct reporting ensures that employees have the proper wage amounts credited to their Social Security records. These amounts are used in calculating the Social Security benefits payable to them and/or their families if the worker dies, becomes disabled, or retires, and in determining the worker's eligibility for Medicare coverage.

If you are a small business owner who uses paper W-2's to report Social Security wages, here are a few suggestions to help you file accurate reports:

- o Make sure to use the W-2 form for the proper year. For example, a W-2 form for 1993 cannot be used to report 1994 wages.
- o Be sure to file Copy A of the W-2 form with the Social

Security Administration. When a copy other than "A" is filed, it is more costly to process and may result in errors.

Do not send W-2 paper reports to the IRS. Send all W-2 (and W-3) paper reports to:

Wilkes-Barre, PA 18769

Don't check off the "Void" box on the W-2 by mistake. The wages shown will not be credited.

Complete the "Pension Plan" block in Box 15 of the W-2 when the worker is an active participant in a retirement plan or a simplified employee pension plan. For more information on this subject, get IRS Publication 1602, General Rules for Individual Retirement Arrangements Under the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

If you print your own W-2 forms, make sure they meet the IRS specifications for proper paper weight, margins, etc. You can get W-2 forms free from IRS by calling 1-800-829-3676.

Be sure to report Medicare wages and tips separately in addition to any Social Security wages and tips.

If you need more information, you can call the toll-free number of the federal government's Small Business Administration, 1-800-827-5722. Or, contact IRS at 1-800-827-5722 and ask for publication No. 583, Tax Guide for Small Businesses.
