But the main focus is now on Quitaque as GTE Central prepares to analyze the overall impact of BETRS on the large scale trial in what's already being called "Wireless City."

The Quitaque trial will involve 422 customers and aims to help GTE Central gain a better understanding of the operational administrative, maintenance and provisioning differences between wireless and conventional wireline technologies.

GTE Central will consider using wireless technology as a viable option when evaluating relief alternatives in some rural area. What happens in Quitaque will help GTE Central determine whether to expand the wireless technology and if so,
