 Home made soups, salads and the special pumpkin desserts will be served at the luncheon.

Vehicle Title Applicants Required To Have Social Security Number

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will soon require additional information on title applications for motor vehicles. Beginning November 1, Texans who request title transactions in counties using the Registration and Title System (RTS) must provide their social security number. RTS is an automated system that electronically links county tax offices to TxDOT Headquarters in Austin. The Briscoe County Tax Office and the Hall County Tax Office use RTS to process motor vehicle transactions.
 The social security requirement is part of House Bill 1863, passed by the 74th Legislature; the bill addresses fraud prevention in public assistance programs. TxDOT is mandated to collect the social security numbers and make them accessible to other state agencies for the purpose of determining eligibility for those programs. Individuals who do not have a social security number, or are not eligible for one, must complete a statement before their title application is processed.
 Questions concerning the new requirement should be directed to Betty Ann Stephens Briscoe County Tax Assessor, Pat Floyd Hall County Tax Assessor or the nearest Vehicle Titles and Registration Division (VTR) office.
 TxDOT is implementing TRS statewide, with completion expected by December 1996. The computerized system makes it possible for registration records to be updated within 48 hours, which is a major benefit to law enforcement. Customers will also receive their vehicle titles within five days of the date the title applications arrive at TxDOT Headquarters.

Ulrey And Shelburne Nominated For Award

Rural ministers face special challenges, but also reap reward from small-town ministries, said two pastors who have been nominated to be Texas Rural Minister of the Year.

The Rev. Steve Ulrey of First United Methodist Church of Wellington and Curtis Shelburne, from the Church of Christ at 16th Street and Avenue D in Muleshoe, are among 26 nominees from around the state, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which sponsors the award.

The Rev. Steve Ulrey is a former pastor of the Turkey-Quitaque Methodist Churches. Curtis Shelburne is married to the former Juana Cotten and is a son-in-law of Vernell Cotten of Turkey.

The winner will be announced during the Town and Country Church Conference scheduled Monday and Tuesday at Texas A&M University in College Station. The award recognizes a minister who serves a congregation in a community of 10,000 people or less.

"It's exciting," said Ulrey, who plans to attend the conference. I'm

deeply honored to be nominated. I'm almost overwhelmed. I'm just really appreciative."

Shelburne, who serves on the Muleshoe School Board, said he'll be unable to attend because of a school conference in Houston. Shelburne is active in civic affairs and Little League coaching. He writes a newspaper column for the Bailey County Journal and does stained glass work as a hobby. He is the brother of Gene Shelburne, minister of Amarillo's Anna Street Church of Christ.

Ulrey said the isolation of rural towns may mean exploring different ways to meet people's needs. People in urban setting have more options of getting their needs met and in a more anonymous fashion, he said.

Ulrey, who has always ministered in rural areas said, "I think any ministry is relational ministry, but we have the opportunity to get closer to people in a rural ministry," he said. "I like the freedom that a rural setting gives, both for ministry and for life."

Shelburne, who has been in Muleshoe for ten years said, "The best part of being in a rural area is the whole town is almost like part of your congregation if you are there very long. It is really neat atmosphere."

In Wellington, the United Methodist Women nominated Ulrey for the Minister of the Year honor, said Jean Lewis, president of women's group.

"He's the most loving person, he just embraces us with love," she said.

Ulrey helped heal a church that was going through some troubled times she said. The church was losing membership and "those still serving the church were not serving the Lord with gladness," she said.

That has changed since Ulrey arrived. The church has a new vitality, Lewis said.

In Muleshoe, Pat Moore said she thought Shelburne would be a good candidate for the award. John Gulley, a member of the Church of Christ, also nominated Shelburne.

"From sun-up to sun-down he is always involved in something for the church or for the community," Gulley said.

Other nominees include the Rev. G. Mark McMillian of First Baptist Church in Wolfforth and the Rev. Mark Wilson of Idalou United Methodist Church.

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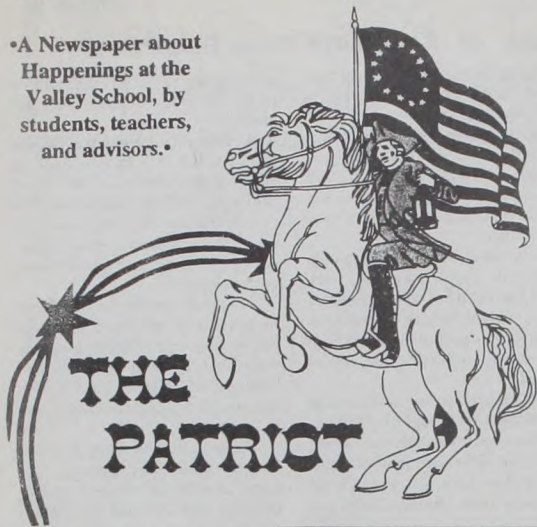

Senior Citizens Urged To Get Influenza Vaccine

The American Lung Association of Texas urges those who may be at increased risk of complications of influenza to be immunized before flu season begins.

Both influenza and pneumonia can be deadly. "Influenza is a highly contagious, potentially life-threatening lung disease," said Dr. William Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor University. "Since 1960, pneumonia has been the leading infectious disease killer in the U.S. It is both the most common and most deadly complication arising from influenza," he explained.

- Groups at increased risk are:
- 1) Persons 65 yrs of age or older.
 - 2) Residents of nursing homes and other chronic-care facilities that house persons of any age with chronic medical conditions.
 - 3) Adults and children with chronic disorders of the pulmonary or cardiovascular systems, includ-

4) Adults and children who have received regular medical follow-up or hospitalization during the preceding year because of metabolic diseases (including diabetes mellitus)

5) Children and teenagers (6 months-18 years of age) who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy and therefore might be at risk for developing Reye's syndrome after influenza.

Health care workers should be immunized to reduce the chances of spreading this condition to high-risk people.

The flu shot is recommended every year because the influenza virus strain changes annually. The ideal time to receive flu vaccine is between October 15 and November 15. In the United States, influenza activity generally peaks between late December and early March.

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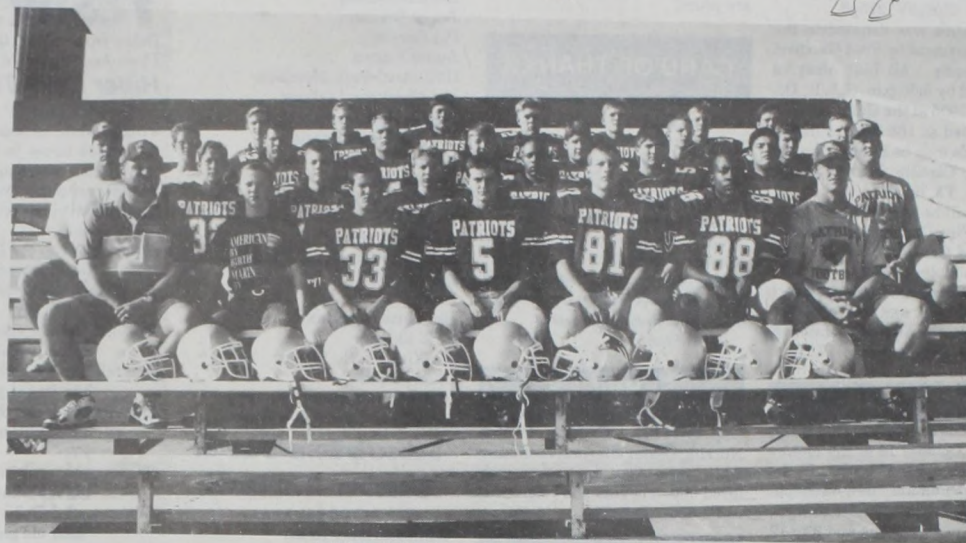
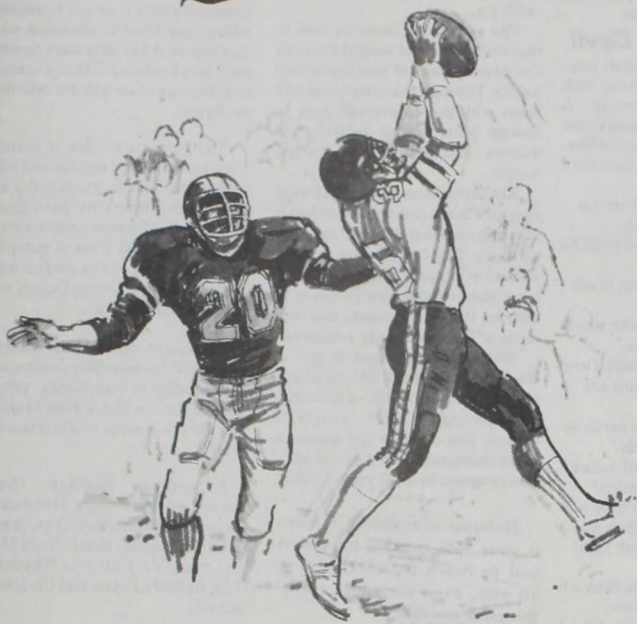
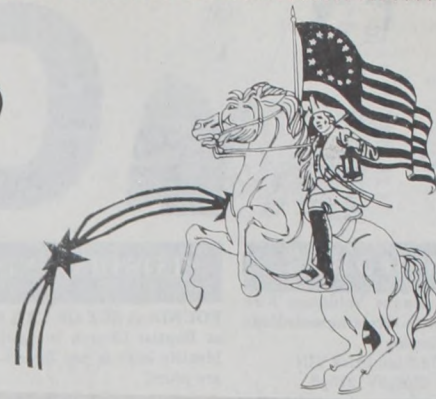

Hitler Calls The Devil

These verses by F. S. Allen were written while he was serving with the armed forces in Germany. A copy of them which appeared in the Sweetwater paper, was sent to Mrs. Ira Graham by her cousin Carl Ford of Sweetwater:

Hitler called up the Devil on the telephone one day,

The girl at central listened to all he had to say;

"Hello, 'tis Hitler speaking, is old Satan home?"

Just tell him it's Hitler who wants him on the phone."

The Devil said "Howdy Adolph," and asked Hitler, "How are you?"

"I'm running your hell on earth so tell me what to do."

"What can I do?" the Devil asked, "dear old pal of mine?"

"You don't need any help from me—you're doing mighty fine."

"Yes I was doing fairly well until some time ago,

"When a man called Uncle Sam advised me to go slow.

"He said to me, 'Dear Hitler, I don't want to be unkind,

But you've raised hell enough so you'd better change your mind."

"I thought his lease-lend plan was a bluff, he'd never get it thru;

"But soon he put me on the spot when he told me what to do;
