

### May is MS Awareness Month

Area high school students can win one of 10 college scholarships and help raise money to fight multiple sclerosis by participating in project: Learn MS 95. Sponcered by teh Multiple Sclerosis Associa tion of America, Project: Learn MS '95 is a national essay competition with over \$16,000 in scholarship funds available to any sophmore, junior or senior high school student in the country. Information on the essay competition is available through local high school guidance offices or by calling the MS Association at (800) 833-4672.

Designed to encourage education about Multiple Sclerosis and high-light a nationwide "May is MS Awarness Month" Campaign, participants are required to write a 300-500 word essay on MS and its effects on the family. By acquiring sponsors, students raise funds to provide services to MS patients across the country. Separate prizes will be awarded for various levels of fundraising. A panel of experts will judge teh essays on content, grammar, and style. All essays must be postmarked by May 22, 1995. Winners will be announced in the sum
