Railroad workers are represented by 23 standard unions. By mutual agreement, 20 of these unions—comprising about 1,200,000 men, or more than 90%—are working under wages and rules agreed to by them and the railroads. But leaders of three unions—with only about 130,000 men, or less than 10%—still refuse, after more than a year of negotiations, to accept similar wage and rules agreements. These are even more favorable than the terms recommended by the Emergency Board appointed by the President.

Yes, it certainly seems to be finally about time that the leaders of the three unions stop their delaying tactics—their quibbling. But the leaders of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors continue to refuse. They continue a course of dillying and dallying. It is definitely time to

END THIS QUIBBLING!

On June 15, 1950, an Emergency Board appointed by the President under the terms of the Railway Labor Act—an Act largely fathered by the unions themselves—made its recommendations on certain wage and working conditions ("rules" in railroad language) which had been in dispute between employees and the railroads.

More Than 90% of Employees Accept
Since then, terms equal to or better than the Board recommendations have been accepted by about 1,200,000 railroad employees—more than 90% of the total of all workers. They are represented by 20 of the 23 standard railroad unions.

Less Than 10% Refuse
But three unions—with about 130,000 men, or less than 10% of the total—have refused to accept, even after months of negotiations. These three unions are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors. These are three of the so-called "operating" unions. Already the highest paid men in the industry, their leaders demand still further advantages over other workers.

In all, there are about 270,000 operating employees. But not all of them, by any means, are represented by BLE, BLF&E, or ORC. As a matter of fact, less than half—132,000—to be exact—are in these three unions. More than half—about 140,000—are in other unions, principally the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. What makes the whole situation so hard to understand is that these 140,000 operating employees are working under wages and rules which the leaders of the other 130,000 say they cannot agree to.

What Do the Railroads Offer?
They offer these three unions the same settlement which was contained in a Memorandum of Agreement signed at the White House on December 21, 1950, by four brotherhoods and the railroads. Later these brotherhoods sought to repudiate this agreement. But on May 25, 1951, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen signed a complete agreement carrying out the

principles of the Memorandum Agreement of December 21. They have been working under this agreement since May 25.

What About Wages?
Under the terms of the agreement, yard engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving a wage increase of \$.34 an hour (\$2.72 a day) and road engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving an increase of 19½ cents an hour (\$1.56 per day). Large sums of retroactive pay have already accrued and if the agreement is carried out, will be paid promptly.

What About "Cost of Living" Increases?
The White House Agreement includes an "escalator" clause under which wages will be geared to changes in the Government's cost-of-living index. Two such increases—April and July, 1951—have already been paid to the 90% of railroad employees covered by signed agreements.

What About the 40-Hour Week?
The White House Agreement calls for the establishment of the 40-hour week in principle, for employees in yard service. The employees can have it any time after January 1, 1952, provided the manpower situation is such that the railroads can get enough men to perform the work with reasonable regularity at straight time rates. If the parties do not agree on the question of availability of manpower, the White House Agreement provides arbitration by a referee appointed by the President.

What Else Do the Union Leaders Demand?
The continued quibbling of the leaders of the three unions has to do principally with

rules changes, which have already been agreed to by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. Of these, the principal one seems to be that having to do with so-called "interdivisional service"—runs which take in two or more seniority districts.

The union leaders would bar progress and efficiency in the industry, and better service to the public, by maintaining a situation where they can arbitrarily stop a railroad from establishing such interdivisional runs. The carriers propose that if a railroad wishes to set up an interdivisional run, the railroad and the unions should try to agree on such run and the conditions which should surround its establishment, and if the railroad and the unions can't agree, the matter will be submitted to arbitration.

But the three union leaders still refuse.

Rules Can Be Arbitrated
The railroads have not only offered these three unions the same rules agreed to by the BRT and covered by the White House Agreement, but have even agreed to submit such rules to arbitration.

The Industry Pattern Is Fixed
With the pattern so firmly established in the railroad industry, it seems fair to suggest that the leaders of BLE, BLF&E, and ORC stop their quibbling and take action to make the railroad labor picture 100% complete. Certainly today's economic and international situation calls for a united front. And certainly no good reason has been advanced why these three unions should be preferred over all other railroad employees.

Paymaster Offers Cash Prizes To FFA and 4-H Club Winners

ABILENE — F. F. A. and 4-H Club boys and girls will have a chance to win extra cash awards for their grand champion and reserve champion steer calves, fat lambs and barrows in junior divisions of state, district and county fat stock shows beginning January 1, 1952.

Awards for fat lambs and barrows are: \$75 each for grand champion fat lamb and grand champion barrow at fat stock shows in Fort Worth, San Antonio, Oklahoma City and Houston; \$50 each for the reserve champion fat lamb and the reserve champion barrow at shows in these same cities; \$50 each for the brand champion fat lamb and the grand champion barrow at shows in Amarillo, San Angelo, Lubbock, Abilene, Odessa and El Paso; \$25 each for the grand champion fat lamb and the grand champion barrow at district shows; and \$15 each for the grand champion fat lamb and the grand champion barrow at county shows.

- 1 Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952.** On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved in accidents. It affects all drivers and motor vehicle owners (except Federal, State, County and City-owned cars).

- 3 You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But . . .** If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the Department of Public Safety security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover all claims growing out of an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you cannot establish financial responsibility for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license plates are automatically suspended.
- 4 It's Easy to Establish Financial Responsibility** with a motor vehicle liability insurance policy. If you do not now have such a policy, call your local insurance agent today. He is a qualified insurance counselor who will be happy to advise you concerning your needs.
- 5 What is the Minimum of Your Liability?** The law permits each driver to establish the following minimum limits of liability: up to \$5,000.00 for injuries sustained by one person; up to \$10,000.00 for all personal injuries resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000.00 for property damage. You do not have to establish such liability but it is the easiest way.

'Jim Thorpe, All American' at Plaza

The life of one of the most world-popular athletes of all time has been put on film and will be seen locally on Wednesday and Thursday, when 'Jim Thorpe, All American' comes to the Plaza Theatre. Burt Lancaster stars in the title role.

Between the time Thorpe was called by the King of Sweden on occasion of his winning both pentathlon and decathlon events in the 1912 Olympic Games at Stockholm, "the greatest athlete in the world," and the time less than a year ago when the combined sportswriters of America voted him "the greatest athlete of the first half of the twentieth century," Thorpe's life had many ups and more downs. But a human story it is, a great love story too, and the events both before and after the period mentioned added to a full, if not always rewarding life.

When it was recently put down in book form, Warner Bros. bought it up to try for another "Knute Rockne, All American." Advance reports indicate the Burbank studio as having succeeded. Raised on a small western ranch, Indian lad Jim Thorpe would have rather run ten miles than go to school any day. Yet his wise father insisted, and one day young Jim showed up at Carlisle Indian School to launch a career that would bring him to the forefront of the nation's stellar personalities.

He soon became a track star under Coach "Pop" Warner, but when he wanted to impress the girl he later was to marry, played in the film by Phyllis Thaxter, he went out for the more glamorous sport of football. How Thorpe ran wild as a halfback to bring his little college teams victory over the greatest eleven in the country is a well known sports saga. But what happened afterward is what makes the story of Jim Thorpe so touching.

Denied a coaching job, he entered the Olympics and drove himself to great victory, but hard luck pursued him and Thorpe for many years after that, though he played major league baseball and professional football, gradually hit the skids. It was "Pop" Warner who brought him back, and when one day a group of youngsters in a sandlot asked an onlooking truck driver to become their coach, Jim Thorpe knew he'd found his life's work at last. Charles Bickford as "Pop" Warner, Phyllis Thaxter as Jim Thorpe's wife and Steve Cochran round out the cast.

Farm Workers Are Protected By Social Security Benefits

AN EMPLOYEE of a greenhouse called his local social security office. "I hear that people who work on a farm have brought under social security. How about me? Do I now have social security like regular farm workers?" The answer was: "Yes, you are a farm worker."

It was explained that, for old-age and survivors insurance purposes under social security, a "farm" is defined in its broadest sense. It includes not only a greenhouse when used primarily for the raising of agricultural or horticultural commodities, but any other acre or fraction of an acre commercially used for agriculture, horticulture, or animal husbandry.

Equally broad is the social security definition of a farm employee. It includes not only the man on a tractor in a prairie wheatfield, and the man at the potting bench in the greenhouse, but also some 600,000 other regular workers, whether hired to herd sheep on a New Mexico mesa, or manage milking-shorthorns on an Iowa stock farm.

Whether or not the job of a farm worker is covered for old-age and survivors insurance depends on three things: First, his employment by the farm operator during a three-month qualifying period; second, his regular work for the same employer during the calendar quarter immediately following the

Physical Examinations for Married Men Without Children to Begin in November

AUSTIN — Married men without children will be affected principally when state draft boards order approximately 3,600 men for physical examinations in November and December.

First orders to local boards for the examinations will be placed in the mail Wednesday, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director said today. These are the first

physical examinations to be ordered since the past April, except in isolated cases.

The orders are designed to get married men without children examined as early as possible, in compliance with official instructions from national Selective Service headquarters. First examinations will take place in November.

Eighteen hundred men are scheduled for examination in November and 1,800 in December. Examination dates scheduled for November are on the 5th, 13th, 16th and 27th. December dates scheduled are the 6th, 7th, 13th, and 14th.

Examinations will be given at armed forces joint examining and inductions stations at Abilene, Amarillo, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, San Antonio and Shreveport, La.

General Wakefield said that some of these men will be inducted in December and still more in January. He pointed out that, in many cases, these married men without children will be inducted ahead of single men who have been examined and acceptable for many months.

"It turns out this way," General Wakefield observed, "because the law provides that men shall be inducted in order of age — the oldest first."

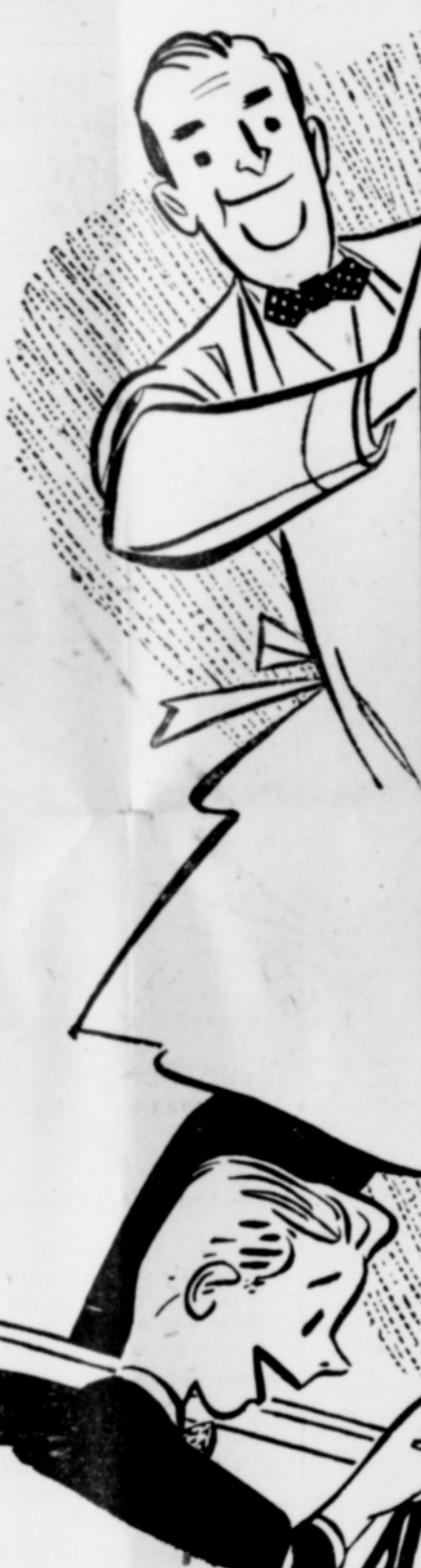

1 tablespoon flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
