## Community Continues To Aid Child's Family

A Love Fund continues for Brian and Mona Wheeler at the Turkey Branch of The Memphis State Bank in Turkey by friends of the local communities for the young couple.

Candy is five years old and a student at Valley School.

The child fell ill on Sunday October 2 at her home and was hospitalized in Lubbock for two weeks, before being transported to a Phoenix, Az. hospital last Sunday.

These funds will be used in any way the family should

see fit. Anyone wishing to contribute may do so at the bank in Turkey, or at the Valley Tribune office in Quitaque.

Candy Wheeler was transported by air ambulance on Sunday morning to St. Joseph's Hospital in Phoenix, Az., where she under-went a 3-hour artery bypass surgery on Monday.

The five year old is listed in the intensive care unit at press time. Her room number is 2 East, 2M 24.

The surgery was done on only one side of her neck. The other will be done next Monday if all goes well. Candy will be in the Phoenix Hospital about three weeks, then will require extensive physical and speech therapy. She has been diagnosed as having Moya-Moya, a rare disease of the arteries.

Her parents, Brian and Mona Wheeler, have been at her side since she fell ill on Sunday, October 2, at her home. Her grandparents, Billy and Janice Wheeler were in Phoenix for her surgery.

## Hall Justices Attend Seminar

Hall County Justices of the Peace, B.J. Robson, Precinct 4, of Turkey, Ruby Roden, Precinct 1, of Memphis and Gertrude Smith of Matador, Motley County Precinct 1, Place 1, attended a 20-hour seminar September 6-9 in Amarillo along with 88 more justices of the peace.

The seminar was conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training Center headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. Seminars are held in compliance with Supreme Court rule and statute, Art. 27.005 of the Texas Government Code. Topics covered include a review of recent attorney general's opinions impacting the justice of the peace court, civil law, code of judicial conduct, criminal trial procedure and simulations, forcible entry and detainer, emergency detentions (mental, drug, and alcohol), lawyer/non-lawyer representation in justice court, judicial liabilities, juvenile law, protective orders and peace bonds.

Valley goes to Knox City this Friday night. It's a long way to go, but there's so much to see. So come to Knox City and see those Mighty Valley Patriots.





Linda and Zack spent approximately three weeks with her parents. Part of that time Mark was in a Naval Survival Training course at San Diego, California.






With winter just around the corner, WTU has these suggestions for lower energy bills.

Tightly close the damper in the fireplace when not in use.

Open drapes and blinds during the day to let in sunlight and close them at night to hold in warm air.
