Valley Varsity against Lazbuddie

Patriots Lose Second Game To Lazbuddie

The Valley Patriots fell to the Lazbuddie Longhorns 66-30 Friday night in their first home game of the 1990 season. Lazbuddie hit town with a high powered offense that kept the Patriots looking around all night.

The Longhorns hit first on a 34 yard touchdown pass from Paul Williams to Doug Barns. The kick failed and Valley trailed 6-0. Matt Gozby scored for Lazbuddie on a 14 yard run. The try was good by Luis Gonzales to end the quarter 14-0 Lazbuddie.

Valley bounced back with a 16 yard touchdown run by Clay Edwards. The extra point try failed and the score was 14-6. Kirk Jesko moved Lazbuddie up on the score board with a 4 yard run. The kick failed to make it 20-6. Bradley Price hit Jason

Smith on a 48 yard scoring play and Chad Calvert added the extra points to move Valley

within 6, 20-14. Valley to the lead 5 minutes later on another pass from Clay Edwards to Kirk Garner. The kick was good by Calvert and Valley had the lead 22-20. Lazbuddie did not wait long before regaining the lead when Kirk Jesk went 58 yards to add 6 to their score. But with 24 seconds left on the clock Kirk Garner went in from 2 yards out to give Valley the lead at half, 30-26.

That was the highlights for Valley as Lazbuddie took over and scored 40 unanswered points to win 66-30.

"We left in the locker room at half. That's the only answer I can come up with. The boys were really up after we took the lead but lost it in the second half. The

boys need to work on staying mentally sharp the entire game." Leading rusher for Valley was Clay Edward with 161 yards on 22 carries, open touchdown and Kirk Garner had 71 yards on 18 carries and two touchdowns. Chad Calvert was 3-4 on extra point attempts. Bradley was 3-6 for 54 yards and one touchdown in the passing department. Valley will face Higgins Friday, September 21 at Higgins game starting at 7:30 p.m.

Landfill Rules To Be Enforced

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 GENERAL ELECTION
 NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
 Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

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

You can call Social Security's toll free telephone number 1-800-234-5554 (1-800-234-5772), 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. every business day. The best times to call are early in the morning and later in the afternoon after the first week of the month.

You should apply for retirement benefits at least 2 or 3 months before you plan to stop working. This will help assure that your benefits will start the month of your retirement. The first check should be received early in the month after the first full month of your retirement.

You will need certain documents to establish your eligibility for benefits. They include your Social Security card or a record of the number and proof of your date of birth, such as a birth certificate or religious record of birth or baptism recorded early in life. These documents must be original records or copies certified by the agency that issued them.

If you do not have the original

records or certified copies, you should submit the best evidence you have of your date of birth. This includes, among others, schools and church records, a marriage license, a passport, and employment or military service papers.

You should also have your Form W-2 for the preceding year, or, if you are self-employed, a copy of your Schedule SE. The reason is that most recent reports of your earnings may not yet have been recorded in Social Security records.

If your spouse is applying for benefits, she or he will have to provide similar evidence.

If you have any more questions, call Social Security. Our toll-free telephone service is available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in all time zones weekdays. The best times to call are early in the morning and late afternoon. And if you can, it is best to call later in the week and later in the month.
