Granddaughter of Resident Drowns In Water Accident

Jennifer Paige Gafford, 13, daughter of Ann and Keith Gafford, of Houston drowned near a low-water crossing on the Blanco River at Wimberly, Texas, Sunday, June 14, 1992 while visiting relatives.

The incident occurred at Road 314 off Flite Acres Road where the flowing river waters crossed over the road.

Authorities said she and several friends were wading through the rushing waters on the bridge when she presumed got too close to a flood control drain, and was swept into the drain under the road.

A 400 pound tree stump was lodged in the drain, trapping the child.

Emergency crews and the Rapid Water Rescue Team responded to the call but were unable to free her due to the log and force of rushing waters.

A spokesman stated they received the emergency call at 8:15 p.m. when the girl didn't wash out on the other side of the

bridge. He said they formed a temporary dam with a piece of plywood long enough to pull the girl's body free from inside the drain. She had been trapped just over an hour underwater.

Over 40 minutes of CPR failed to revive her. She was pronounced dead at 10:00p.m.

Funeral services were conducted in Wimberly on Thursday, June 18, 1992.

Survivors include her grandfather, George and Thelma Gafford of Turkey.
