Patriots Move to Bi-District After 52-6 Win Over Eagles

The Valley Patriots finished up the regular season with a 52-6 win over the Samnorwood Eagles at Samnorwood last Friday night. With the win, Valley secured a playoff spot by finishing 4-1 in district play and second place in District 2-A Six-Man Football.

After recovering a fumble and returning it to the Valley 1 yard line, Samnorwood got on the scoreboard first with a one yard run. The kick failed and with 3:33 left in the first quarter, the Eagles led 6-0. Valley came back quickly when Jason Smith went 65 yards behind some great blocking by Josh Scoggins and Danny House to score Valley's first TD. The extra point was good and Valley took the lead 8-6. With 1:18 left in the first quarter, Bradley Price went over from the one to increase the Patriots lead to 14-6. Smith scored again, this time on a two yard run. Dewayne Davis set up the score on a fine 58 yard run.

Social Security Card Now Needed for Driver's License

Beginning November 1, Texans applying for a driver's license and persons renewing their license or seeking a duplicate will need to show their Social Security card, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Social Security numbers already are required for Commercial Driver's Licenses, which the DPS began issuing in September 1990.

"We think this new policy will make it harder for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver's license," explained DPS Driver's License Inspector John Hall. "This should pay off by reducing crimes where a fake identification is important, like hot check cases. It also should make it much more difficult for a minor to obtain a license with an incorrect year of birth."

Only Social Security cards issued by the federal Social Security Administration will be accepted, Hall said.

"I realize almost everyone knows his Social Security number by heart, but we need to see the actual card issued by the U. S. government, not a commercially-produced metal or 'flea market' card," the inspector said. "If you do not have the government-issued card, income tax documents, W-2 forms, payroll or other employer records may be presented."

Postal Consumer Cautioned About Mail Scam

The U. S. Postal Inspection Service is warning consumers to beware of a notice in the mail that says the IRS is holding a refund check in your name.

To claim the money, the notice says all you have to do is send ten dollars to an address in Florida. Those who send in ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim form--something the IRS gives away for free.

Millions of notices have been sent to addresses throughout the U.S., and Postal Inspectors have seized almost \$1 million from accounts belonging to the scam operators. There have been numerous complaints and inquiries in the Texas and Oklahoma areas.

"The postcards are designed to look official," says Paul Griffo, national spokesman for the U. S. Postal Inspection Service. "The bureaucratic mumbo-jumbo makes it appear as though disbursement has been approved."

"But customers who send in their ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim form--something the Internal Revenue Service gives away for free."

Linda Weiskopf, Assistant Director of the Taxpayer Service Division for the Internal Revenue Service, says there is never a charge to claim a refund.

"If a taxpayer is due a refund, all he or she has to do is call our 800 number and we'll send them a claim form free of charge."

The IRS has a fully staffed 800 number for people who have questions about their income tax returns, including questions about tax refunds.

Meanwhile, Postal Inspectors offer tips to keep you from getting stung by scam artists who make bogus offers through the mail.

"Any offer that requires you to pay a certain amount up front should be looked at dubiously," says John Brugger, a Postal Inspector in Washington, DC. "Be willing to check them out. Make a few phone calls and verify the truthfulness of the offer."

But one phone number you should not call is the 900 number printed on the postcard. Scams that employ this method usually charge high fees to victims who respond by calling.

Finally, Postal Inspectors offer this advice for those who get a postcard promising a big tax refund for a small fee: throw it away.

DECK THE HALLS AND NOT THE CHILDREN

Christmas time is just around the corner. To some this is a time for togetherness, reunions with family members who live away, sharing, and good will. Not so with everyone, though.

This is also the time of year when suicides and domestic problems seem to arise. Stress of shopping, the fast pace everyone gets into, and financial worries seem to mount this time of year. It's every easy to unload all this stress on the most accessible persons - family members. Wives and husbands generally realize that they are in the same boat, so it's really easy to pass this frustration on to the children. I am guilty of this myself.

Sometimes we don't give our children enough credit for understanding. My children have always been there for me when I had a problem, even though lots of times I didn't think talking to them would help. You know, after awhile they start to thinking the same thing about their parents, if communication isn't there. When I have confided in them, maybe the problem didn't go away, and maybe I didn't feel a whole lot better - but they did.

I have had to deal with problems in other people's homes since I chose this for my profession, and I see more and more of myself in each case. Children say "my parents never listen to me." Parents say "they won't listen to anything I tell them." In my own case, I tend to do a lot of telling and not much talking. These kids will try to talk to you, but you have to talk back to carry on a conversation. I'm learning this on my own with my own children, and it's hard to change old habits. There is counseling available through human services to teach us how to communicate in the family. All you have to do is make the effort. Don't let the problem get so great that someone feels they need to call me. I'm always here for these kids, but I'm afraid I'm not much help sometimes.

You see, I'm struggling with the same problems myself, and hoping that I do the right thing.

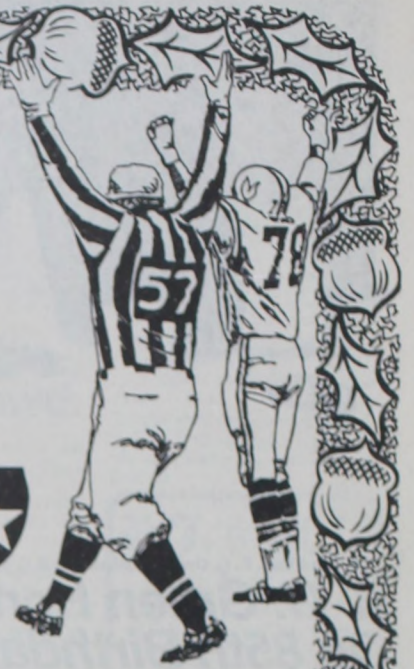

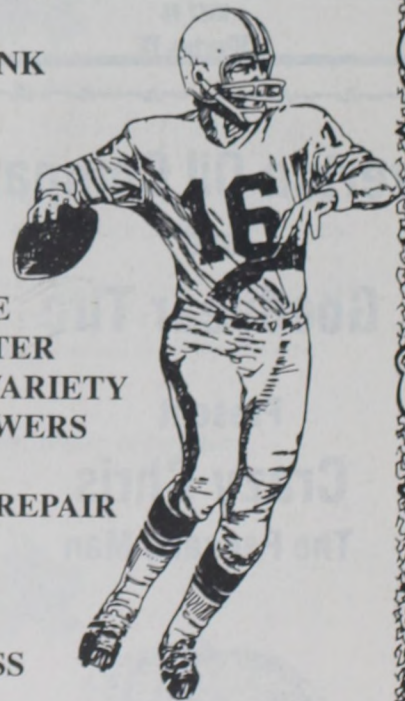

NAFTA May Hurt Rather Than Help

"U. S. farmers are likely to wake up one morning and find they were hurt rather than helped by the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) being initiated by representatives of the U. S., Mexico and Canada," Texas Farmers Union President Joe Rankin warned.

Rankin said, "The more the Farmers Union studies this more than 2000 pages which make up the NAFTA text, the more problems it finds with the document, and greater are the numbers of farmers who stand to be hurt by NAFTA."

"Soon after the NAFTA text was released we realized that U. S. producers of peanuts, cotton, sugar and dairy would lose Section 22 import quotas in the NFATA negotiations, as did producers of many fruits and vegetables," Rankin said. "Now it looks like beef producers and many others may be hurt as well due to the ease with which other countries may be able to join the NAFTA."

Rankin also maintained that U. S. grain farmers will find NAFTA is not the boon to them predicted by the Bush Administration.

"Other U. S. grain producers may find that their exports to Mexico may not increase as much as predicted over the long run, as Mexico is allowed to maintain barriers against U. S. corn and soybeans for up to 10 to 15 years while it modernizes its agricultural production plants," Rankin said.

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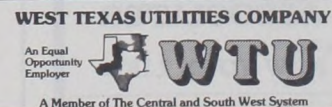

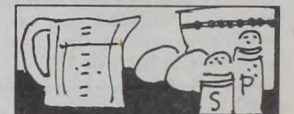
