## Mayor Conner Attends Rural Waste Management Seminar

Mayor Elgin Conner attended a Rural Waste Management Seminar February 11 at Clarendon College.

John Kiehl of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission gave a review of the regional solid waste plan that is being developed by the Regional Solid Waste Advisory Committee. Kiehl pointed out that the regional plan has a minimum of three landfills and a maximum of nine landfills, with a combination of direct haul and transfer stations throughout the Panhandle. Twenty-eight percent of the population in the Panhandle lives outside incorporated communities, thus presenting a major problem to be dealt with in the regional plan.

A panel of representatives from the Texas Department of Health, Texas Water Commission, Texas Air Control Board and Texas Department of Agriculture fielded questions from the audience of about 150 participants.

It was pointed out by the panel that farmers and ranchers can continue to take care of their own garbage by putting it in a pit. However, there can be no disposal of chemical cans in this way. Representatives from the

Health Department and the Water Commission also advised that when anyone other than the farmer or rancher used the pit that it would then be considered an illegal landfill.

Larry Jordon of the Air Control Board in Lubbock pointed out that all outside burning in the State of Texas is illegal without authorization from the Air Control Board. However, no authorization will be granted for the burning of tires, asphalt shingles and only limited burning of plastics. Campfires, bonfires, land clearing operations and diseased animal disposal will qualify for authorization. However, wholesale burning of these waste disposal pits will not be granted.

It was agreed by all that a major problem will exist from illegal dumping in barpits and ditches. This problem will have to be addressed, but officials suggested that it wouldn't take many examples of \$10,000.00 fines to help solve the problem.

John Crowell of the RC&D discussed some opportunities

that are available for some business spin-offs from the problems facing rural and urban areas for special disposal of tires, batteries, plastic pesticide and herbicide cans, used motor oil and oil filters.

The E.P.A. Subtitle D regulations are published and we must, all, work to find ways to meet the criteria.

**Low Income Eligible For Energy Assistance**

Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Interim Commissioner Burton F. Raiford.

Raiford said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other low-income individuals may request an application by calling the toll-free number 1-800-252-8060 during the enrollment period of Jan. 15 through February 28.

Eligibility is determined by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$662.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$876.49 for households of

two persons, \$1,090.49 for three, \$1,304.49 for four, \$1,518.49 for five, and \$1,732.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays part of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

Someone receiving an energy assistance check should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the rest month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

**Scientifically Sizzling Facts**

Why do we cook meat? The most important reason we as consumers cook meat is out of tradition to enhance the appearance and flavor. Scientifically, we know that cooking will help improve tenderness and contribute to the characteristic flavor of meat. Cooking also destroys any potential bacteria and parasites that could cause food-borne illness.

Cooking can cause both tenderness and toughening. Knowledge on cooking meat properly to ensure a juicy, tender and flavorful product is necessary. Cooking rates also affect the final product. The faster and hotter the cooking method, the greater the loss of moisture and fat in the product and possibly the greater the toughness.

There are two primary cooking methods for preparing meat. Dry heat cookery methods use direct or indirect heat without adding moisture during cooking. These meth-

ods include: roasting, broiling, grilling, pan-frying and pan broiling. Tender cuts of meat are suited to dry-heat cooking methods. Less tender cuts of meat require moist heat cooking. This uses indirect heat and the addition of a liquid or retained moisture. Some moist heat methods include braising and cooking in liquid.

Whether you cook for fun or out of necessity, now is the time to turn your skills into cash. The National and Texas Beef Cook-Off is searching for amateur chefs to submit their favorite original recipes for the 1992 competition. More than \$35,000 will be awarded this year.

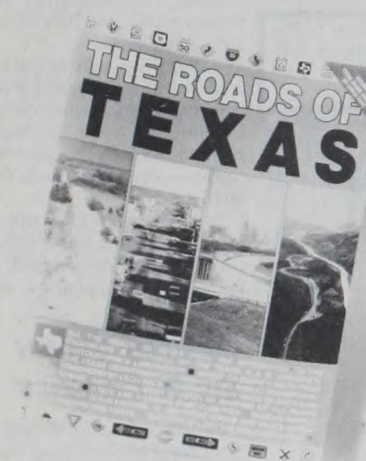

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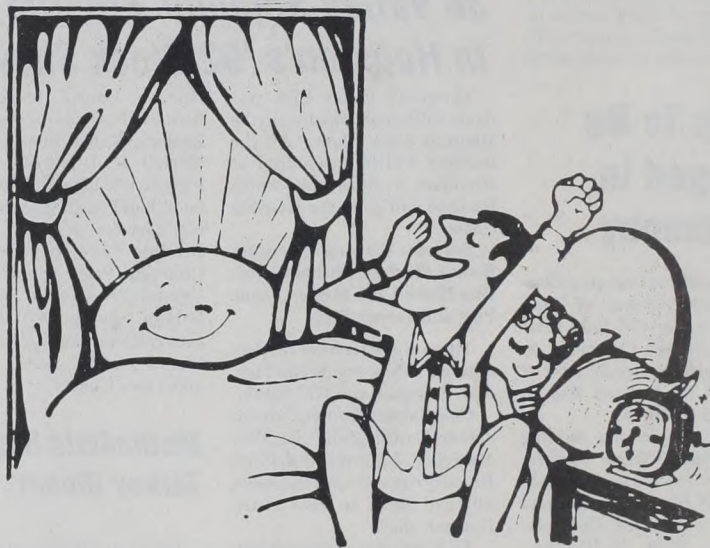

On February 12th, Lincoln's birthday, Valley students, as well as students across the nation participated in a fundraising campaign for the Lincoln Memorial Museum Exhibit in Washington, D.C. A day in which the Valley students, by donating their pennies, pledge to imitate the Lincoln Legacy as the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. and others who gathered at Lincoln's memorial demonstrated their dreams for a better America. The study of Lincoln's face on the coin reminds them of his role in shaping our country. The goal nationwide is to collect \$300,000 to underwrite the cost of the enhanced exhibits at the Lincoln Memorial. Every penny collected from participating schools will go to the National Park Service for the development of exhibits for the Lincoln Memorial. Slated for completion in 1993, the exhibits will depict the ways in which Lincoln's memory has inspired Americans to understand and use their First Amendment rights. They will describe his role as preserver of the Union and Great Emancipator. They will tell the story of the Lincoln Memorial as a symbol of freedom for our society.

## Properly Planned Windbreaks Make Comfortable Homes

Windbreaks make Briscoe County homes more comfortable and less expensive to heat and cool. Properly located tree rows shield homes, livestock, and crops from winter winds, summer heat, blowing dust and drifting snow. Mature windbreaks provide protection at least for 40 years.

Conifers or evergreens form the best protection and they should be at the heart of any windbreak. Even a single row of evergreens with the trees set about 15 feet apart will give good protection. This is the most common windbreak around homes and farmsteads in Briscoe County. Two rows of evergreens with the tree lines spaced 20-30 feet apart provides even better protection.

If space is available, a three row windbreak with two rows of evergreens and a row of shrubs or hardwoods will grow into an attractive shelter that will protect against the coldest winter winds. The shrubs or hardwoods provide some early protection until the slower growing evergreens become effective barriers. The evergreens should be planted in the outside rows (toward the wind), so in Briscoe County that means the North or West edge of the windbreak. Enough space should be left between the tree rows to allow plowing or shredding weeds during the early years of tree growth.

The Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is currently taking orders for windbreak trees. The following evergreens are available: Afghanistan Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Austrian Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Pinon Pine, Ponderosa Pine and Scotch Pine. Hardwood varieties available are: Cottonwoods, Willows, Green Ash, Honeylocust, Little Walnut, Nanking Cherry, Native Plum, Pecan, Russian Olive, Sandcherry, Caragana, Sumac, Lilac, Elm, and Lombardy Poplar.

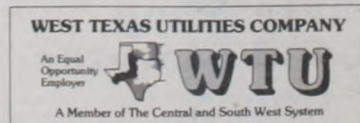

### Quick Weeknight Meal — A New Classic

- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 pound veal cubed steaks, cut into 1-1/2 x 3/4-inch pieces
- 1 small onion, cut into thin wedges
- 2 small carrots, sliced 1/8 inch thick
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 can (15-1/2 ounces) Great Northern beans, drained
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley



Combine oil, thyme and garlic powder. Heat 1 teaspoon of seasoned oil in 12-inch nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Cook half of veal cubed steaks in skillet just until cooked through, about 3 minutes; stir frequently. Remove veal from skillet. Add another teaspoon seasoned oil to skillet. Reheat skillet, then cook remaining veal; remove from skillet. Add remaining seasoned oil to skillet. Cook onion and carrots over medium-high heat 4 minutes, stirring frequently. Add wine and water; stir.

Add beans and salt. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer uncovered 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Return veal to skillet; continue cooking until vegetables are tender and mixture is thickened, about 2 minutes. Stir in parsley. 4 servings.
