## Farm Program Meeting Called

There will be a meeting of interested producers Monday, January 24, in the Pioneer Room at the First State Bank in Silverton.

This meeting will be conducted by the Briscoe County ASC Committee and county office staff. The purpose is to discuss the newly-announced Payment in Kind program as it will apply to local producers.

All producers are urged to attend. It is imperative that producers have some idea about how this program works and how it will affect 1983 intentions on each farm. This can be invaluable assistance in signing up a farm to participate.

January 24 will also be the first day that producers can sign up in this program. Try to attend the meeting first.

## Varsity Plays At Estelline; JV In Tournament Here

The Valley varsity boys played Estelline Friday night and took a 13-point win.

The Patriots were six points ahead at the end of the first period, but at the halftime buzzer, they had fallen into a 46-46 tie. The third quarter ended with Valley having recaptured a four-point lead, then in the final period the Patriots found their range and won by 13.

Tommy Williams led scoring-wise with 26 big points. Jerry McNary had 19; Randy Fuston, 18; Brett Cheatham, 12; Will Williams, nine; Kraig Cox, six, and Billy Shannon, two points.

The Junior Varsity teams hosted a tournament beginning Thursday, with the girls taking Childress Freshmen in the first game, 45-24, and the Lady Patriots leading all the way.

The first bell brought the Valley girls 15 points as compared with four for Childress, and at halftime the Lady Patriots led 33-15. The third quarter saw more of the same, with Valley leading 41-27, and the Valley girls went on to win 45-24.

Wanda Brittain hit for 14 points; Devonna Smith, 12; June Johnson, seven; Edna Reyna, six; Tammy Clay, four, and D'Anna Smith, two points.

In Friday's game, the JV girls played Childress JV and lost 25-31. Childress reversed the scoring in this game and the Lady Patriots were the losers all the way.

At the end of the first period, the Lady Patriots had two points and Childress JV owned 10. At halftime the Valley girls trailed 6-17, and the end of the third quarter saw Childress still ahead 24-13. They went on to defeat Valley 31-25.

Wanda Brittain and June Johnson tied for honors with six points each. Tammy Clay got five points; Karen Clinton and D'Anna Smith added two points each.

Saturday's game was played

against Motley County, and the Lady Patriots won this one.

The Valley girls were ahead 9-6 at the first stop, 17-12 at the midway point, 29-17 at the end of three quarters, and went on to win 42-25.

The Valley Patriots played Plainview in their first game Thursday, winning 54-46.

The first quarter ended with Valley leading 19-5, and at halftime the score was 27-24, Valley. In the third quarter, the Patriots led 37-32 and at the final buzzer they had extended their lead to eight points to take the victory.

Ricki Jeter tossed in 18 points for scoring honors. Tim Clardy added 14; Steve Price, nine; Rosendo Silva and Chuck Martin, five points each, and Shon Phelps got three points to round out the scoring.

Friday's game saw the arch-enemies, Valley and Motley County, paired, with the Patriots taking an easy win.

The first bell sounded with the Patriots on top 16-6, at halftime they led 33-12, after three periods it was 49-17, and the final score was 59-22. Coach Adams has a second team coming on strong, from all evidence.

Ricki Jeter again took scoring honors with 20 points; Tim Clardy, 15; Chuck Martin, eight; Shon Phelps and Ray Taylor, four each, and Steve Price, Rosendo Silva, Jamie Cox and Roy Beavers added two points each.

The Valley JV Patriots played Paducah Saturday in the finals and lost by three points to take second place.

Valley was ahead 17-12 at the first bell, 29-23 at halftime, then fell behind 37-40 at the end of three periods, and lost by only three points, 50-53.

She also has worked as a volunteer at Dumas Nursing Center and has done some volunteer work at Memorial Hospital.

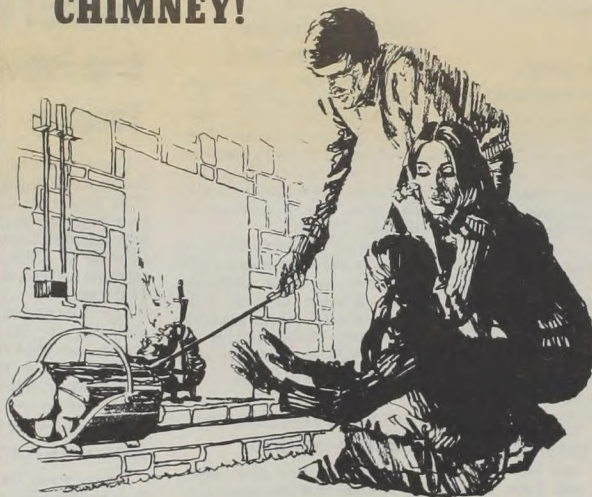
In her free time, Mrs. Rowell enjoys oil painting, ceramics, making silk flowers, decorating plaster articles, sewing and embroidery.

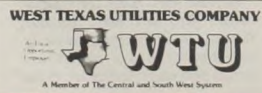




