Longtime Ralls Newsman Dies

Afton Richards, a West Texas newspaper publisher for almost fifty years, died Thursday morning of last week in the coronary care unit at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after a brief illness. He was 70 years old.

Mr. Richards was editor-publisher of the Ralls Banner, Lorenzo Leader, Aspermont News and Jayton Chronicle. His entire family has a history of newspaper work.

He was the uncle of Leon Watson, editor-publisher of the Matador Tribune and the Petersburg Post.

The Valley Tribune editor asked Mr. Watson last week at Blanco Offset Printing Company's office if there is anyone of the family that can take over the four newspapers and he didn't think there is anyone. This brings out the thought that another man there expressed, "The small town newspaper is almost a thing of the past." This man gives them only about two more years. We hope that this is not true, but with computers taking the day and the cost of production, there is no gain financially in the small newspaper.

This is a sad situation because there will be much history lost. There will be no way to record history with computers.

WBU's Media Guide Rated Best

In Sunday's edition of the Amarillo Globe News, it was stated that a second title has come to the sports information office at Wayland Baptist University, as the 1984 Pioneers track and field media guide was voted best in the nation among Division B entries by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Earlier in the year, the 1983-84 Flying Queens Basketball media guide was voted best in the nation by the NAIA Sports Information Directors Association.

Wayland media guides are produced by Eddie Owens and Bobby Hall, who have now received a total of eight national awards in the past three years.

Two Men Rescued From Ridge At Caprock Canyons State Park

At approximately 9:30 p.m. June 22, the office at Caprock Canyons State Park received word from a visitor that two individuals were stranded on the mountain behind the South Prong Tent Camping Area. Arnold Castillo, Park Ranger III, was notified and he contacted Oliver Clark, Briscoe County Sheriff's Department.

When Arnold arrived at the scene he observed V-1, Kenneth Taylor, located on the north face of Hawkins Ridge approximately 180 feet from the bottom of the ridge. When Tom Loper, Park Superintendent II, arrived, he was told that the second victim was on the south face of the ridge.

Tom moved his vehicle around as far as possible to attempt to locate this victim. Night had fallen and the use of spotlights was necessary to locate the victims.

Deputy Clark set up a command post in the parking lot adjacent to the area. Arnold and Tom proceeded to climb to the top of Hawkins Ridge to attempt to rescue the victims. The Mountain Rescue Squad, Sheriff's Office, Game Warden Julius Stevens and EMS Services were notified and requested to the scene.

Arnold and Tom successfully located V-1 and were able to pull him up to safety, approximately 30 feet. After checking V-1 and locating him in a safe spot, Arnold and Tom proceeded down the ridge to its point, an area less than six feet square.

They then observed V-2, John Hall, on a ledge approximately 80 feet above the bottom of the ridge. Because of V-2's location, they were unable to attempt a rescue and the Mountain Rescue Team attempted to reach him from the side. The team discovered that a rescue from the side was impossible so they climbed to the top of the ridge and joined us with the Game Warden.

After surveying the situation, it was determined that the only choice was to rapel down to V-2 and then lower him to the crew on the ground. One of the team members then went down to V-2 and after attaching the necessary harness to V-2, they lowered him to safety. After the victim was safe, the team member rapelled to safety.

The remaining team members, Game Warden, Arnold and Tom then proceeded back up the ridge and located V-1 and then came off the west face of the ridge. When they reached the bottom of the ridge it was 3:30 a.m. June 22. Neither victim was hurt and none of the rescue team members was injured.

The staff at Caprock Canyons State Park wishes to express its appreciation to the Mountain Rescue Squad, Sheriff's Office, EMS Services, Julius Stevens, and all others who helped in this rescue mission.

Methodist District Picnic Held In Plainview Monday

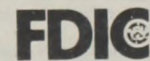

YING LYLES RETURNS FROM SIX WEEKS TOUR OF THE FAR EAST

Ying Lyles left Lubbock at 12:30 on May 7 for Hong Kong, Bangkok, Malasia, Thailand and Penang with a tour group. She visited friends a few days in San Francisco before leaving for Hong Kong. The flight took 14 hours, she said.

The tour group stayed one day in Hong Kong, then went on to Bangkok, a flight of about two hours. They were there two or three days, and took a bus tour with a guide and saw the Temple and sights of the city.

She then transferred to another bus tour and went to Singapore where they stayed at the Dynesty Hotel which had a dome on top and the top floor went around and around. She said you could see the whole city as the building was 26 stories high and it was very beautiful at night. They also went to the beach and saw a ten foot tall statue that had the body of a fish and the head of a lamb. It was a water marker. Also enjoyed a tribal Chinese dance.

At Panang they saw the solid gold Buddah which is about 50 feet long and saw sights at the Temple where the Buddah is displayed. While there they went to a Snake Temple and she begrudgingly had her picture taken with one draped over her purse.

In Thailand they sailed in a glass bottom boat and could see the Coral Reefs which were pretty and unusual.

Ying said the weather was very hot especially in Bangkok and Thailand. Persons on the tour had to buy hats and wear shorts.

They returned to Hong Kong on May 27, where she left the tour group and visited friends and relatives a few days. She saw a cousin and his family that she hadn't seen in 34 years. It was there that she took the flu and had to see a doctor.

She returned to San Francisco on June 13, and after visiting friends, she came home on June 16. She said she enjoyed the trip very much but was so glad to be home with her friends and family again.
