## Cotton Extravaganza Set For January 18 In Memphis

With the 1991 cotton crop beginning to wind to a close many of the producers should be reminded about keeping their private applicators license updated. Each producer holding a private applicators license must obtain 15 CEU (continuing education units) by December 31, 1995 in order to maintain their license.

The Hall County Extension Service will be sponsoring the Hall County Cotton Extravaganza to be held Saturday, January 18th at the Memphis Community Center. The event will kick-off at 10 a.m. with craft booths and commercial booths and the judging of the Cotton Show.

At 1 p.m. the CEU training will begin offering 3 1/2 credits for private, commercial, and non-commercial applicators. Topics will include; Cotton Insect Outlook for 1992, Sprayer Calibration, Gossym-Comax (irrigated cotton computer model), Cotton Breeding in 1990's as well as a report from the Texas Beef Industry Council. Door Prizes will be given out throughout the day. Various commercial and craft

booths will be on exhibit during the day.

Following the programs at 5:30 p.m. will be a dinner sponsored by Hall County 4-H Clubs and a "Cotton Fashion Show" displaying all the latest fashions in cotton fibers. Awards will also be presented to the Cotton Grower of the Year in Hall County as well as students who participated in the "What Cotton Means to Me."

Tickets may be picked up at Memphis State Bank, Memphis and Turkey, The Place Fashions, Greene Dry Goods, First Bank and Trust and Lacy Dry Goods in Turkey.

## Players Chosen For Super Team

The Amarillo Globe News recently announced its 1991 Six-man Super Team. Among those chosen were Valley runningback Clay Edwards and linebackers Chad Calvert and Bradley Price. Edwards was also named offensive player of the year.

Valley Coach Clifton Gilmore was chosen as the Coach of the Year. Coach Gilmore led the Patriots to an 8-5 season to reach the state quarter finals, the best play-off showing since 1983 when Valley reached the 11 man quarter finals.

Senior Clay Edwards led Valley's offense with 1,814 yards despite missing three games due to an ankle injury. Edwards averaged 10.5 yards per carry on 173 rushes. He also caught six passes for 144 yards and

returned nine kickoffs for 181 yards with 29 touchdowns.

Senior Chad Calvert and Junior Bradley Price were major factors in Valley's dominating defense. Calvert made 115

tackles, including 62 solos, had two interceptions and blocked a punt.

Price made 177 tackles, including 103 solos, recovered two fumbles and had one interception.

## Applications Being Accepted

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is accepting applications for a game warden cadet class scheduled for this fall. Applications will be accepted through Feb. 7.

About 39 cadets will be accepted into the 43rd Game Warden Academy, scheduled to begin its six-month training Oct. 1 in Austin. More than 1,500 people applied for 34 positions in the previous cadet class that graduated in April.

Applicants must be at least 21 years old on or before Oct. 1 and have a B.A./B.S. level degree from an accredited college or university by July 1. At least 60 hours of college and two years of experience working with the public may be substituted for a college degree.

To be accepted, applicants must meet the minimum eligibility requirements and successfully compete in a written examination, intense background investigation and an interview before an interview board in Austin.
