OUTDOORS-In Texas

If you wern't among the ten thousand who visited the National Rifle Association's annual convention in Ialias recently you missed a great show. Convention proceedings were most interesting. But the thing that held most of us was the exhibits of firearms. of firearms.

We saw there literally hundreds of guns dating back to the beginning of firearms. Collectors from all over the United States brought in iron-bound wooden boxes with filint lock and percussion cap guns with which our freedom in America was won.

They had old Colts Persiss.

sion cap guns with which our freedom in America was won.

They had old Colts Remingtons, Sharps and Winchesters galore. Each gun was prominently displayed so it could be viewed and admired, along with modern day guns.

The whole show was a reminder that firearms are here to stay, and that we'd better do something about keeping a place to use them.

I was particularly impressed with the statement made by an old-timer who had been to most of the Camp Perry shoots. He was talking with a couple of game wardens at the Game and Fish Commission exhibit.

"Why don't you fellows in Texas get a real shooting range?" he demanded. "You have a few pretty fair rifle and pistol clubs scattered around over the state but as big as Texas is you need

That fellow had an idea which we hope some Chamber of Commerce will pick up and follow through on. We do need that big range, and we do need many smaller ones.

I realized this just the other day when a friend called me and asked where his 11-year-old son could get some 22 rifle practice. He had been shooting in a country gravel pit, but someone put a stop to that.

I couldn't keep from thinking how open the country was when I was a kid. We could shoot 22's anywhere. Today, however, cities are expanding rapidly and random 22 shooting is extremely

Perhaps the problem could be solved locally in many places by some rancher dedicating one small canyon to 22 shooters under the age of 17. Anyway it's a good idea.

Farmers To Vote For ASC Committeemen

The election of community Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committeemen in Callahan County will be conducted by mail ballot again this year, according to an announcement this week by Tommie Harris, chairman of the county ASC committee.

The county convention to elect the county ASC committee will be held on September 24, 1958 in Baird.

The farmers in each commun ity will elect a committee consis-ting of a chairman, vice-chair-man, and regular member. In addition, first and second alter-nates will be elected in each community.

community.

The community committee chairman will also be the community delegate to the county convention, A county ASC Committee consisting of a chairman, vice-chairman, a regular member and two alternates will be elected at the county convention.

ber and two alternates will be elected at the county convention.

Voting for community committeemen will be done by mail, the same as in recent years, with the county ASC office sending a secret ballot and return envelope to every eligible voter on its records. The ballots will be mailed by August 26, 1958. Final date to return marked ballots has been set as Sept. 2, 1958.

Supervision and direction of the election is in charge of a county election board composed of officially designated persons outside the ASC organization. Under this plan are Glen W. Moreover, it shows that heavy smokers die off quicker than light smokers. In addition to lung cancer and heart diseases, smokers run a much greater risk of dying from such diseases as bronchitis, pleurisy, ulcers, and cirrhosis of

The connection between cigarette smoking and high death rates has been so definitely proved that cigarettes would probably be banned for public sale if introduced as a new product an today's market.


