Contracts Let For Fish Kill

Contract for air spraying has been let for the scheduled August 6 rough fish kill on Possum Kingdom Lake, according to the Director of Inland Fisheries of the Game and Fish Commission. Application of the solution was awarded to the Red River Aero Dusting Company of Texas, whose planes will make test runs over the lake several days before the spraying to familiarize pilots with the lake surface to be treated.

Federal Aid funds for approximately \$52,000 were approved for the project, but it will cost considerably less than this amount. Federal Aid funds are furnishing 75 per cent of the project's cost while state funds provide the remaining 25 per cent, according to the Director.

All Federal Aid funds are provided by revenue from an excise tax on fishing equipment under provisions of the Dingell-Johnson Act.

"The Brazos River Authority is cooperating with the Commission, furnishing valuable information and maps which made fulfillment of the project possible," the Director said.

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Economy Is Pledge Of Rep. Brashear



State Representative Paul Brashear promised to continue his efforts to obtain for the 76th Legislative District and the State of Texas the maximum in good government for a minimum outlay of tax dollars in a formal statement this week in connection with his bid for re-election.

Mr. Brashear announced last January that he would run again, promising to issue a formal statement later. He is now completing his second term as a member of the Legislature.

During the 54th Legislature, his first term, Mr. Brashear served on a number of important committees, including the Military and Veterans Affairs, Agriculture, and Penitentiaries committees. In the 55th Legislature, Mr. Brashear served as chairman of the Military and Veterans Affairs committee. He was also a member of the State Hospitals and Special Schools, Liquor Regulation, Oil, Gas and Mining committees.

Mr. Brashear is a native of the 76th District, having been born at Atwell in Callahan County in 1917. He is married to the former Helen Ray of the Scranton community. They have two daughters — Ann Etta, who is married and lives in Abilene, and Sarah, who attends school. They have one grandchild.

A veteran of U. S. Army duty in World War II, Mr. Brashear is an active member of the American Legion. He was recently appointed to serve a 6-year term on the American Legion's Legislative Committee, a statewide body. He is currently chairman of this committee.

Mr. Brashear's education includes graduation from high school at Cross Plains, Cisco Junior College and a business college in Austin. In private life, Mr. Brashear is an insurance man and a farmer. He began farming as a boy and has owned and operated farms in Eastland and Callahan counties all of his life. He currently owns a farm in Callahan county. His extensive knowledge of farm and soil conservation resulted from several years as an employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture soil conservation service units in Eastland and adjoining counties.

Prior to his election as a state representative, Mr. Brashear served as secretary in the House of Representatives and as assistant sergeant-at-arms of the Texas Senate, gaining valuable experience in legislative procedure. He spent three years as manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco, a post he resigned in order to devote more time to his legislative duties and to enter the insurance business.

"During my two terms of office, I have been able to learn the things necessary for a Representative to do the best job in serving his District," Brashear said. "I have endeavored at all times to work for an honest, efficient state government. It has been my purpose to support legislation in the best interest of our district first and the state of Texas as a whole."

"Each of my votes were cast after due consideration of good business principles. I have supported measures for better state employee salaries, decent benefits for the aged, improved water programs, along with legislation for better education and teacher pay and equitable treatment for veterans and farm groups.

President Proclaims Farm Safety Week

"The health, prosperity, and well-being of our rural families are vital to the strength of the Nation and accidents suffered by rural residents result in thousands of deaths and injuries each year and constitute a serious social and economic problem," said President Eisenhower in his proclamation announcing National Farm Safety Week for 1958.

In setting the week of July 20 as Farm Safety Week, the President also said, "Experience has shown that these accidents can be reduced through educational programs directed toward safety precautions in the homes, in the fields, and on the highways of the Nation. I, therefore, call upon the people of the Nation to observe Farm Safety Week and urge all farm families and all persons allied with agriculture to join in a continuing campaign to prevent needless accidents."

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council has pledged their support to this campaign and join the President in requesting all persons and organizations interested in the welfare of farm people to participate in National Farm Safety Week activities.

In the United States last year, almost 13,000 farm people lost their lives in accidents and more than a million suffered injuries. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council suggests that a little checking be done in every neighborhood for the purpose of finding and eliminating accident hazards. "How many persons do you know who have suffered crippling injuries and how many neighbors are gone forever because of an accident?"

"Only by finding the cause and then making sure the same mistake isn't made by someone else, can we cut the farm and home toll of accidents," say the Councilmen. "Safety," they point out, "works for you when you work for safety." Don't tempt fate in '58 but put safety to work on your farm. It will save you time and money, and could save your life or a member of your family. Safety is that important, conclude the Councilmen.

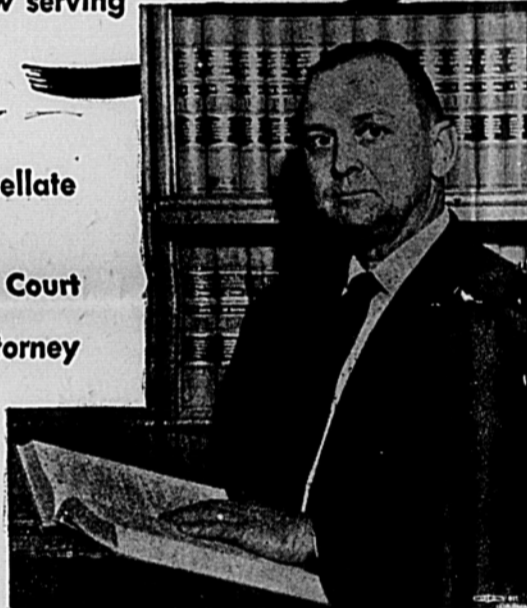

PELLET GUNS POPULAR NOW — While on the subject of guns we were also impressed with the Crosman display at the NRA show. Here is a pellet gun that has made very rapid strides in the last few years, especially for indoor targets.

"He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good."

These guns are available either air or gas powered. They are made in both 22 and .177 calibers.

"He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation: . . . For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences; . . . For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments; . . . For suspending our own legislation and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

The pellet gun offers a great deal for both indoor and outdoor shooting. It is less dangerous in the open than conventional rifles. It must not be sold short however, in power, and should be handled with the same care as any other gun.

Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles.

Crosman provides an indoor target range for the pellet gun, which permits a lot of target practice at a very reasonable price.

In 1787, when the framers of our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence had been signed 11 years previously, they set to work to create a system of checks and balances in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

Newest in the Crosman line is the CO2 pistol, which gives power without powder. The Medalist model, which was on display at the Dallas show attracted a great deal of attention from military marksmen.

They seemed to get as much kick out of the accuracy of these powderless guns as did the on-lookers who admired their marksmanship.

And, while Crosman makes mostly guns for fun, the company also produces another gun with a useful purpose. This gun, especially made for wildlife biologists, is used in trapping and tagging operations. It shoots a dart or needle containing an anesthetic which paralyzes the animal until it can be tagged or treated as the case might be.

Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.

IT'S THE LAW In Texas . . .

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE SETS OUT BASIC AMERICAN PRINCIPLE

What do we mean when we say that in the United States we have a "government of law" and not a "government of men"? Basically we mean that we have certain individual rights, guaranteed by our federal and state constitutions and laws, which may not be denied by any governing body.

The early American colonists had their fill of government by men, and the Declaration of Independence, signed 182 years ago, set out their complaints against that type of government and revealed their belief in a principle which we now accept as basic to our American way of life.

The indictments set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charged him with numerous violations of that principle. Among the complaints enumerated are the following: "He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people."

OUTDOORS-In Texas
By L. A. Wilke

If you weren't among the ten thousand who visited the National Rifle Association's annual convention in Dallas recently you missed a great show. Convention proceedings were most interesting. But the thing that held most of us was the exhibits of firearms.

We saw there literally hundreds of guns dating back to the beginning of firearms. Collectors from all over the United States brought in iron-bound wooden boxes with flint lock and percussion cap guns with which our freedom in America was won.

They had old Colts Remingtons, Sharps and Winchester galore. Each gun was prominently displayed so it could be viewed and admired, along with modern day guns.

The whole show was a reminder that firearms are here to stay, and that we'd better do something about keeping a place to use them.

I was particularly impressed with the statement made by an old-timer who had been to most of the Camp Perry shoots. He was talking with a couple of game wardens at the Game and Fish Commission exhibit.

"Why don't you fellows in Texas get a real shooting range?" he demanded. "You have a few pretty fair rifle and pistol clubs scattered around over the state, but as big as Texas is you need

I realized this just the other day when a friend called me and asked where his 11-year-old son could get some 22 rifle practice. He had been shooting in a country gravel pit, but someone put a stop to that.

I couldn't keep from thinking how open the country was when I was a kid. We could shoot 22's anywhere. Today, however, cities are expanding rapidly and random 22 shooting is extremely dangerous.

Perhaps the problem could be solved locally in many places by some rancher dedicating one small canyon to 22 shooters under the age of 17. Anyway it's a good idea.

FASTER ON THE DRAW — Another thing that interested me at the NRA convention was the work of amateur gunslingers. There were several fellows there who'd better not run into Marshal Dillon. If they do, Gun-smoke will disappear in a puff.

Some of these quick draw artists are older men, but most of them are young fellows, who have quick reflexes and use a lot of science. They can flick out a long barrel six gun with either or both hands faster and faster.

Most of them were using the old single action, cocking type revolver. It will be interesting to see now whether another fraction of a second can be shaved from drawing and firing time with a new fast gun just announced by High Standard. It is patterned after the frontier models, but is double action and chambers nine 22 caliber cartridges.

This "Double Nine," as it is called, is sure to be showing up in all quick draw and rapid fire competitions where western guns will be required.

For years High Standard has been making top quality automatic pistols and revolvers for 22 ammunition. This gun should be their best.

BETTER AMMUNITION TOO — Ammunition manufacturers are continuing to bring out new and souped up versions of sporting ammunition that make us wonder how we ever killed anything with the old "thuty-thuty".

Winchester has just announced a couple of new loads. One is the 284 Winchester Magnum, which will provide hunters with a high velocity, flat shooting, long range load, ideal for deer, sheep and antelope.

The other is a 338 Magnum, as an intermediate cartridge for moose, Kodiak bear, Lion, tiger and other heavier game.

Both cartridges are based on a case similar to the 468 Winchester Magnum, which permits the use of the Model 70 action.

Col. Charles Askins Jr. who recently returned from Africa, field tested one of these 338 guns. He told me he had killed 18 animals with it in Africa. Only one shot was necessary on 13 of them.

Colonel Askins is one of the world's great marksmen. He has shot all over the world, first as a forest ranger, then as a Border Patrolman. While in the Border Patrol he held all world's records in pistol shooting. Then he went into the Army. During the last 20 years he has shot big game all over the world, including lions and elephants in Africa and tigers in India.

He thinks the 338 is tops for a hunting gun. It will kick out a 200 grain bullet at 3050 feet, with 4130 pounds of muzzle energy, or a 300 grain bullet at 2400 feet with a knockdown of 3840 pounds.

By comparison a 30-06 kicks out a 200 grain bullet at 2410 ft.

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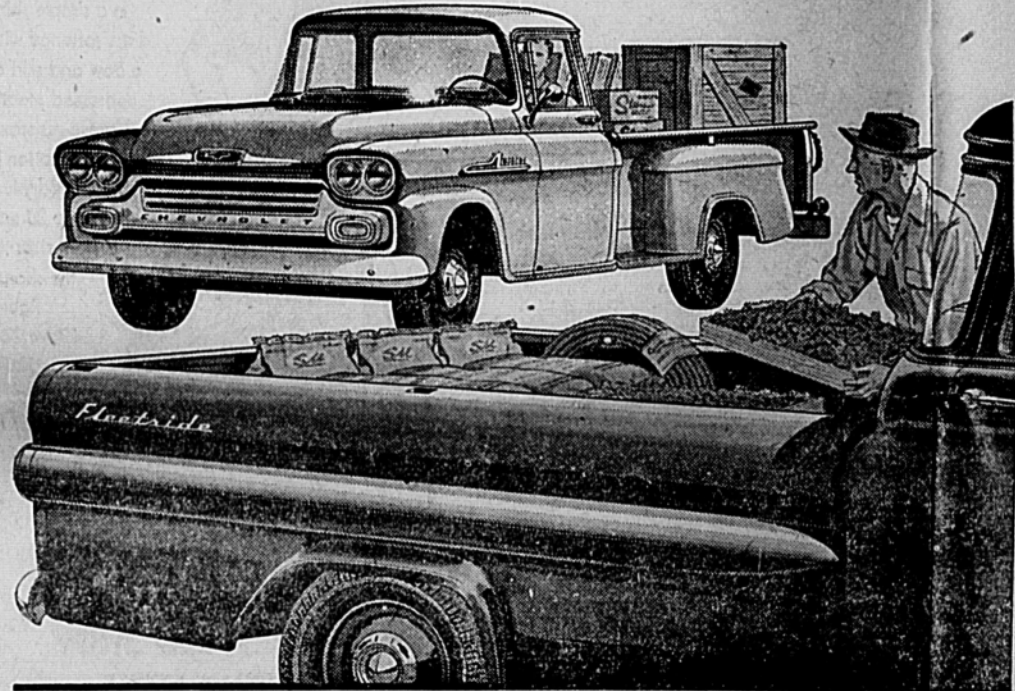

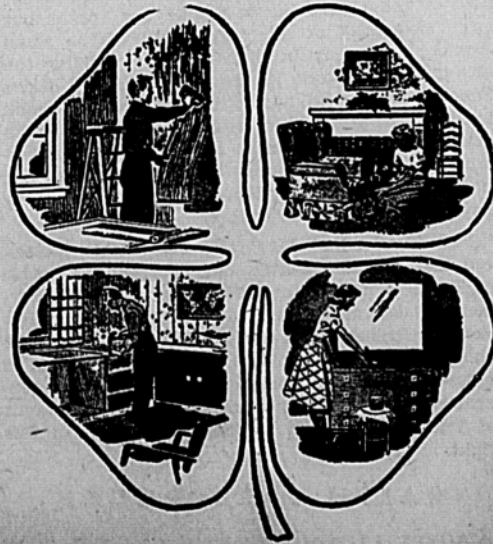

About Your Health . .

It all started with Sir Walter Raleigh and a Y-shaped pipe.

The pipe was a gift to Raleigh from Sir Francis Drake -- a souvenir from the West Indies, where natives put the pipe prongs in their nostrils and inhaled the smoke of a smoldering substance they called "tabaco."

Raleigh apparently set the style of his day, for when he took up smoking the practice soon became fashionable. All this happened nearly 400 years ago -- in 1586. Since then smoking has become the most deeply ingrained habit of humanity.

Today in the United States alone, more than half the men and a fourth of the women smoke cigarettes daily, and additional millions smoke pipes and cigars. Altogether it adds up to almost 40,000,000 smokers -- 26,000,000 men and 14,000,000 women -- out of an adult population of approximately 50,000,000.

The seriousness of the smoking habit has been made clear in a recently finished study by the National Institutes of Health. Results of the study, already widely publicized, indicates a strong and undeniable relationship between cigarette smoking and increased death rates from lung cancer and heart disease.

The studies reveal a death rate among cigarette smokers 58 percent greater than the rate for non-smokers. Moreover, it shows that heavy smokers die off quicker than light smokers.

In addition to lung cancer and heart diseases, smokers run a much greater risk of dying from such diseases as bronchitis, pleurisy, ulcers, and cirrhosis of the liver.

The connection between cigarette smoking and high death rates has been so definitely proved that cigarettes would probably be banned for public sale if introduced as a new product on today's market.

The British Ministry of Health for some time has been warning about the hazards of smoking.

Now the U. S. Public Health Service has begun a similar campaign.

The Texas State Department of Health will support such a drive to the fullest.

The late Dr. William Mayo used to say that cigarettes, cigars and pipes were nothing more nor less than "adult pacifiers," something for idle hands to play with. If true, breaking the smoking habit probably isn't as hard as it is supposed to be.

Should you, personally, make the effort? That's your decision. But while you are making it, keep in mind that the best research talent in the world is convinced that heavy smoking shortens life.

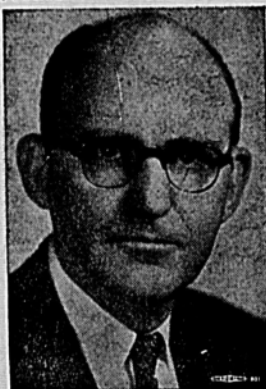

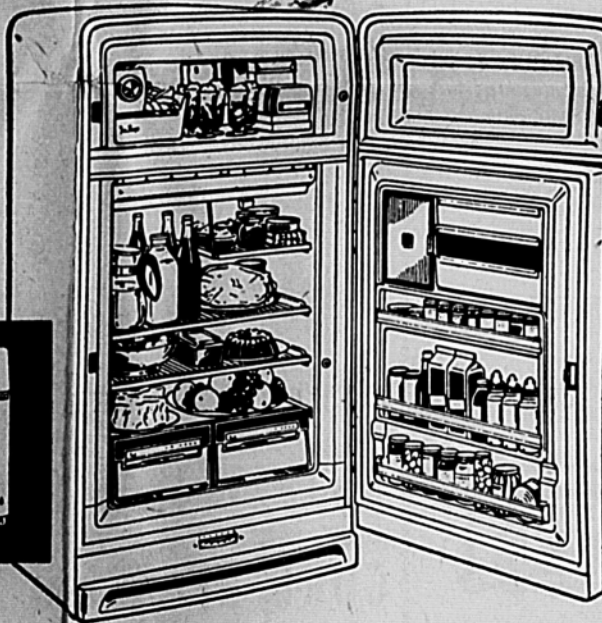
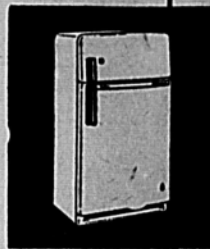
