## Turkey Has New Face Lift

The citizens of Turkey have pulled up their shirt sleeves and busied themselves to improve the look of their city, as well as added three businesses on Main Street.

Beth's Beauty Shop recently moved back to its original location in downtown Turkey, after much renovation to the building. The southwest adobe decor is quite an attractive addition to the once desolate, almost vacant side of the street. Beth's is owned by Beth Mills, lifetime resident of Turkey and employs one other cosmetologist/manicurist, Meredith Lowe.

The Line Shack, located at 5th and Main in Turkey, opened last month with a dining capacity of 84. The Western flair restaurant offers a wide variety of true West Texas cookin' from its noted paper sack menus.

The Line Shack is owned by Lavon and Thelma Gafford and operates seven days a week. It

employs 15 members of the local working force, including some part time High School students.

The Turkey Car Wash located on south Main has reopened under the new ownership of Tommy and Judy Kelso. After much clean-up, remodeling and equipment replacement, the car wash is once again in operating order, and is a welcome sight on the south part of town.

Many citizens continue to paint, repair, and improve the look of Main Street Turkey, USA. The theme appears to be the popular Southwest look, including painstaking wall murals. Marjorie Bell and Nadine Davis (and several others) put in hours of drawing and hand painting one outstanding mural, located next to Beth's, while others have painted vacant building fronts to correspond with the improvements. There's even a coyote chasing a roadrunner on one store front.

Window displays are almost completed in the city, and are a very interesting addition to the town.

Other residents are cleaning up other areas of the city in preparation for the annual Bob Wills Day celebration to be held next week, as well as the year long Hill County Centennial celebration.

## Valley District Track Results

The Valley High School Boys and girls competed in the District Track Meet Wednesday and Thursday at Matador. The boys came in a close second 10 points behind District Champion Spur. Third place was Paducah. The girls team of Celeste Sperry, Vera Pinkerton, Jana Johnson, and Katy Browning placed fourth in the meet.

In the field events Clay Edwards placed third in the long jump with a jump of 19' 3/4. Stevie Moore placed fourth in the event with a jump of 19'2. Edwards also had a fourth place finish in the high jump. He cleared 5'10.

The Boys Sprint Relay won the District Championship by just getting by Paducah. Kirk Garner, Bubba Clardy, Jason Smith and Clay Edwards had a time of 44.93. Warren Merrell won the 3200 meter run with a time of 10:31. Clay Merrell placed fourth with a time of 11:18. Anthony Zamora placed sixth with 11:35 in the 800 meter.

Nathan Davis placed third with a time of 2:15.15. Clay Edwards won the 400 dash with a time of 51.78. The 110HH was won by Valley's Kirk Garner who had a time of 15.52. Garner also won the 300IH with a time of 41.5. Bubba Clardy won the 100 meter dash with a time of 10.99. Clardy also placed second in the

200 meter dash with a time of 22.99.

Clay Edwards won the 200 meter dash with a time of 22.69. Warren Merrell also won the 1600 run recording a time of 4:59.6. Clay Merrell placed 5th with a time of 5:18.09. The 1600 Relay team of Warren Merrell, Stevie Moore, Ron Brittan and Chad Powell placed third with a time of 3:54.7.

In the girls division Vera Pinkerton won the discus with a throw of 88'5. She was also third in the Shot Put with a throw of 27'11. Katy Browning placed in

5 events. She was fourth in the 400 meter dash, fourth in the 200 meter dash, third in the 100, sixth in the triple jump, and sixth in the long jump. Jana Johnson placed third in the 400 meter dash and placed fifth in the 200 meter dash. Celeste Sperry placed fourth in the 3200 to give Valley Girls a fourth place finish with 44 points. All track participants will compete in the Six-Man Regionals at Plainview Saturday, April 21 at 9 a.m. Athletes placing first or second will run at the UIL Regionals at Levelland April 27 and 28.

## Accreditation Team To Be At Valley

The Division of Accreditation of the Texas Education Agency will send a team of education specialists to Valley School on April 24 and 25.

The purpose of the visit will be to assess the instructional quality of the school district's programs and services. In order to assess the quality of the program, the accreditation team members will observe classrooms, review documents, and interview teachers, parents, and patrons.

Members of the accreditation team will be available on Tuesday, April 24, 1990 at 5 p.m. to meet with parents and patrons who have an interest in expressing their views and opinions about Valley School, according to Wilburn Leeper, school superintendent.

Every school district in the state is required by law to be visited by an accreditation team from the Agency to evaluate the quality of its educational programs and to determine what progress the school district has made since the last visit.

During the interviews with teachers, parents and patrons, emphasis will be given to the quality of instruction and community support present in the school district.

Areas to be evaluated by the team include planning, curriculum, instruction, services to students, instructional resources, personnel, governance, community conditions, and physical facilities.

Following was the Archaic Period from 6,000 B.C. - A.D. 500. During Archaic times, people depended more on plants and small game animals for food supply. Because plant foods were important

part of people's diet, grinding tools called the mano and metate are found along with pit ovens in Archaic sites.

In the late Prehistoric period, A.D. 500-1500, new tools and new ways of producing food changed the agricultural village settlements. Pottery and arrow points are the indicators of the late Prehistoric period.

The Historic period began after A.D. 1500. It began with the arrival of the Spanish. The introduction of guns and horses, competition for land, and the introduction of new diseases altered forever the lives of native Texans of Indian descent.

Mrs. Bain also mentioned the historic find of the Imperial mammoth skull found in Castro County in May 1988. It is thought to be between 12,000 and 50,000 years of age. This object can be viewed in the Museum on Wayland Campus at Plainview.
