Deadlines For **FMHA** Drought **Emergency Loans** The Farmers Home Administrat

The Farmers Home Administrat-ion (FmHA) will receive applicat-ions until September 30, 1977, un-der the special loan programs, initiated by President Jimmy Car-ter to assist farms and improve community water systems affected by prolonged drought

by prolonged drought. FmHA County Supervisor, Ge-orge H. James, jr., said the application deadline was designat-ed by a federal interagency Drought Emergency Coordinating Com-mittee in naming areas eligible for benefits of the special pro-

Briscoe County in Texas is am-

Briscoe County in Texas is am-ong the areas designated. FmHA farm emergency loans covering losses from drought and providing additional credit needed to restore production are avail-able to farmers who lack other sources of credit. Loans, which may be supplemented by grants sources of credit. Loans, which may be supplemented by grants, are available for emergency mea-sures such as deepening or drill-ing new wells to improve comm-unity water systems adversely affected by drought. Another deadline applies to em-ergency water system projects: they must be completed by Nov-

they must be completed by Nov ember 30, 1977.




Open and close the retrigerator and freezer doors only when necessary. Several items can be removed at once to reduce loss of cold pir.


Freezers and refrigerators operate most efficiently when filled to the correct capacity. Foods should be placed slightly apart on refrigerator shelves for correct circulation.

Cover all liquids stored in the refrigerator (espe-cially frost-free models). Moisture is drawn into the air from uncovered liquids making the refriger-ator work harder.


Be sure your appliance is standing level so that the door seals properly. By setting a glass of water on the top, you can see if it is level.
