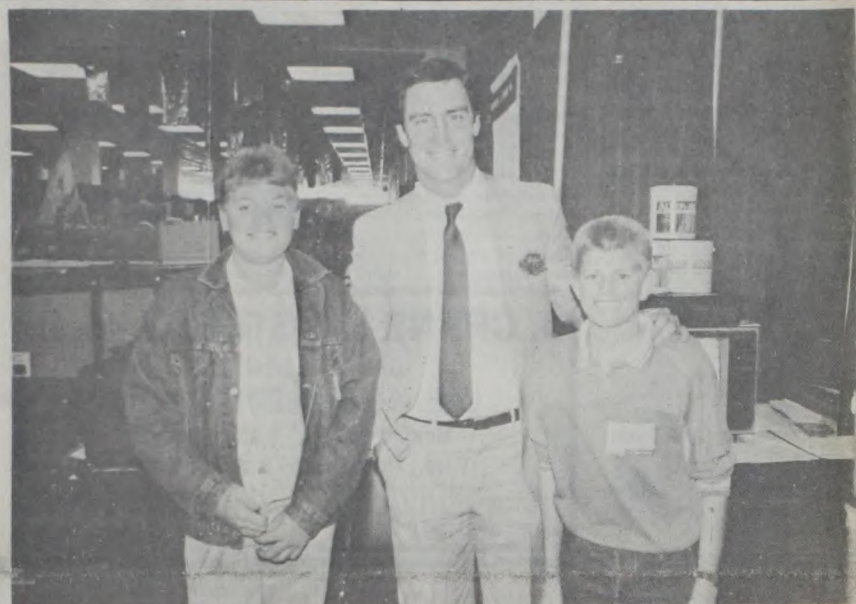

Mr. C. E. Meadows, chairman of the Lower Neches Soil and Water Conservation District, announces the appointment of District Conservationist Fred C. Kellum.

Kellum, a Silvertown native, has most recently worked in the Beaumont Office of the USDA Soil Conservation Service for the past 2-1/2 years.

While stationed in the Beaumont Field Office he was awarded the USDA's certi-

cate of merit for substantially exceeding performance requirements of his position.

Prior to this time he was a staff member of the Canadian Field Office for approximately eight years, and lived in Canadian.

Kellum is a native of Silvertown, Texas. He earned his B.S. degree at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, and was awarded the M.Ed. at East Texas State University in Commerce, Texas.

He taught vocational agriculture at Quitaque High School before their consolidation with Turkey, and at Mt. Pleasant, Texas, before joining the Soil Conservation Service in 1976.

Two hundred thirty-four registered voters made their wishes known in the Super 8 Primary in Briscoe County.

Incumbent Fairy L. McWilliams was returned to office as County Tax Assessor-Collector with 173 votes. Gloria Wood received 34 votes followed by Waynelle Couch with 21 votes.

Voters overwhelmingly chose to keep their right to select judges by a direct vote rather than change to an appointive system. Vote tabulation: FOR-158, AGAINST-18.

Hall County saw 223 voters exercise their right to vote.

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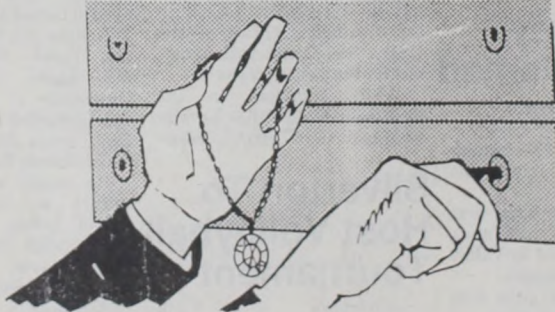

Pets May Help Children Learn

According to recent research, children's blood pressure goes up when they read aloud, indicating an increased level of stress. When a pet was introduced into the room, however, the children reading aloud actually experienced lower blood pressure levels, creating a more relaxed learning experience.



Research is now underway to find out exactly what impact pets have on the learning experience. Experts conjecture that since children are more relaxed with a companion animal present, pets may actually be a key to developing a more productive learning environment.

Animals can also be important morale boosters for children who are experiencing difficulty with schoolwork or rejection by classmates. According to a University of Minnesota study, pets also are excellent companions for "latchkey" children who are alone after school. Other experts believe that pets may help youngsters bridge disturbing personal transitions such as a divorce or moving to a new neighborhood.

Taking care of a pet also teaches a child responsibility, which Dr. Alan Beck of the University of Pennsylvania says is an important facet in developing a healthy self image. In fact, says Beck, training a pet can benefit a child's mental health and increase his self-esteem by making him feel important in the life of the animal and giving him a sense of mastery over the external world.

Breast Cancer: Are You At Risk?

In the past, certain factors such as family history, age, diet and childbearing (breastfeeding), were used to identify those women considered at high risk for developing breast cancer. It is clear today that just being a woman is the most important risk factor.

Studies have shown that 80 percent of women who get breast cancer do not have a family history of the disease. One-third of breast cancers occur in women aged 50 and under, and the incidence of breast cancer is rising, particularly in younger women. These days, one in ten women will get breast cancer.

Fortunately, there is good news about breast cancer. There is an x-ray method called screening mammography, which can detect breast cancer at its earliest stages. "Screening" refers to mammography for women without lumps or symptoms. Only mammography can detect breast lesions too small to be felt.

When breast cancers are detected at this very early stage, the chances of survival—and avoiding mastectomy—are excellent.

Today, every woman over 35 should ask her doctor about screening mammography. The author prefers xeromammography, which, in her experience, has saved lives and saved breasts for many women.

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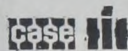

Social Security News

Workers in the local area suffering from a physical or mental impairment which prevents them from working should consider applying for Social Security disability benefits when it appears the condition will last 12 months or more.

Social Security disability benefits can be paid to workers under 65, disabled widows and widowers 50-60, and to married adult children who become disabled before reaching 22.

Under Social Security, a person is considered disabled if he or she has a condition which prevents him or her from doing any substantial gainful work and which has lasted or is expected to last at least 12 months or result in death.

While no payments can be made to a disabled worker, widow, or widower for the first 5 full

months of disability, application should not be delayed.

Before a person applies for disability benefits, it will be helpful if he or she gathers certain information. This will help speed the application process. All it takes is a telephone call to start the process. This includes:

- The person's Social Security number.
- Date last worked.
- Date person became sick or injured.
- Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals or clinics that provided treatment.
- Military service serial number or VA claim number if available.

•List of kinds of jobs performed in previous 15 years.

•Names, Social Security number, and dates of birth of spouse and children.

•Worker's compensation or other public disability benefit number, if any.

A person should not delay applying if all this information is not available. The people in the Social Security office will be able to help you. You may contact us at 1401-B West 5th Street, or call us at 293-9623. Appointments can be arranged if desired.
