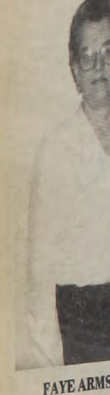

Mrs. Faye Armstrong of Turkey is among the 108 nominees for the Eighth Annual Texas Panhandle Distinguished Service Awards which will be presented at West Texas State University.

Mrs. Armstrong was nominated by the Nuevo Study Club.

Recipients and nominees will be honored during the awards luncheon from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Saturday, April 16, at the WTSU East Dining Hall.

Colette Dowling, author of the bestselling "The Cinderella Complex," will address the luncheon theme "Women—Aware." Music will be provided by members of the Harrington String Quartet who will play Puccini's "Chrysanthemums."

Tickets to the luncheon which is hosted by the WTSU Returning Student Program are \$10 each and must be purchased from the Returning Student Office.

Women have been nominated by individuals and organizations for contributions to civic and volunteer service, career and professional areas. Nominees are from Amarillo, Borger, Canadian, Canyon, Childress, Clarendon, Claude, Dalhart, Dimmitt, Dumas, Floydada, Friona, Fritch, Happy, Hereford, Kress, Lockney, McLean, Memphis, Muleshoe, Pampa, Panhandle, Perryton, Phillips, Plainview, Spearman, Stratford, Tulia and Wheeler, as well as Turkey.

Contributors to the Speakers Endowment fund also will be recognized.

Mrs. Armstrong and her husband have been Turkey residents for one year. She has accompanied her husband, Rev. W. L. Armstrong, jr., pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Turkey, to several mission locations throughout the world. They served as missionaries in Hawaii where she taught children and served as a foster parent for the Hawaiian Juvenile Probation Department. During the three years they served a church at Lorenzo after their return to the United States, 16 children in age from one week to 16 years, lived in their home which had

been approved as a state welfare foster home.

In 1964, the Armstrong family, which includes three children, traveled to Sumatra, Indonesia, to serve as missionaries for 12 years. She worked with village women to help with nutrition, hygiene and family planning and operated a clothing and food distribution center through Church World Service.

Again they returned to the U. S. where they were active in a Lamesa church. From 1978 to 1982, she and her husband were home parents at the Methodist Home Boys Ranch near Waco.

Since the move to Turkey, Mrs. Armstrong has become involved with United Methodist Women and the Nuevo Study Club. She also serves as a substitute teacher.
