First Major Raid Of "Crack" Made By Area Lawmen

Area law enforcement officials have made their first major raid on manufacturers of "crack," a dangerous cocaine derivative currently sweeping the nation.

Lt. Gary Chadwick, an officer in the Panhandle Regional Organized Crime Unit, said one to two ounces of cocaine and crack, with a street value of \$10,000 to

\$15,000, was confiscated from a North Amarillo residence during the bust.

"We have had one other sample in Amarillo," he said. "But this is the first time we've had it in bulk."

Sue Hayes, 807 Moore, and Orlando Paul Broughton and Grindl Deon Jackson, both of 814 Moore, were charged with possession of a controlled substance, Chadwick said. All three were released Thursday from Potter County Jail on \$5,000 bond.

The highly addictive drug, usually smoked through a glass pipe, is manufactured by mixing cocaine and baking soda in warm water, Chadwick said. As the mixture cools, it crystallizes into a rock form.

Users of the drug experience an immediate five to 20 minute high followed by an immediate loss of the high, making it dangerous for even first-time users, Chadwick said.

"As soon as they get a high, they get immediately low and they want it again," he said.

Addiction to crack can come after only 6-10 weeks of use while it may take two to three years to form an addiction to cocaine, Chadwick said. The National Cocaine Hotline estimates one million Americans have tried the drug.

Chadwick said the arrests were part of an ongoing investigation and officers hoped to arrest more crack distributors soon.

"If parents suspect or see children with this, they should definitely be concerned about it and we'd like to know about it," he said.

The crack confiscated in Amarillo was found in hundreds of packets priced from \$50 to \$150, Chadwick said. In New York City, a single hit can be bought for as little as \$10, he said.

But police are concerned the drug could pose major problems because of its low price and addictive nature, Chadwick said.

"It's going to be popular with young people because it's readily available and inexpensive," he said. "It's easy to conceal, easy to use, and a lot more dangerous than cocaine."

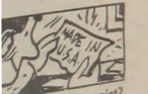

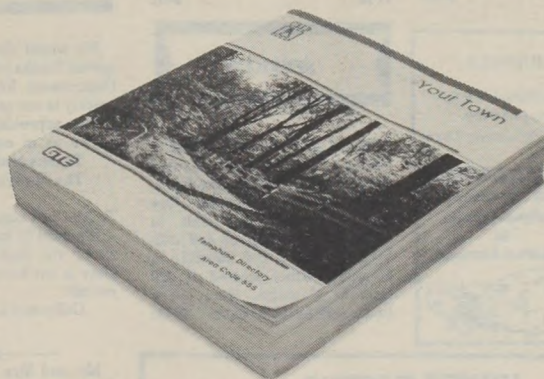
