Marker Dedication August 30

In 1841 members of the Republic of Texas ill-fated Santa Fe Expedition camped within sight of the Quitaque Peaks—disheartened, out of supplies, harrassed by Indians, their path blocked by the forbidding caprock.

At a spot where two creeks met north of the peaks, expedition leaders resolved to split the expedition sending part of the group ahead to chart the way and find supplies while merchants and other Texas soldiers kept a deathwatch in the Quitaque valley.

The expedition had begun from its staging area, Brushy Creek Camp, about 15 miles north of Austin.

Because they were unable to find a wagon trail onto the Llano Estacado, the three hundred twenty-one volunteer soldiers and amateurs had endured thirst, near starvation, illnesses, and untold hardships on their trip.

On Aug. 30, exactly 146 years later between the Quitaque and Los Lingos creeks on FM 1065 five miles south of Quitaque to place two markers - a Texas state

historical marker and one from the Grand (Masonic) Lodge of Texas - near Camp Resolution, a designation given four campsites used during the deathwatch.

The marker will hold names of Masons on the expedition, which was established initially for the young republic to have contact with the lands north of the Rio Grande.

The dedication, a joint effort of the Floyd County Historical Commission, and the Grand Lodge of Texas, and Daughters of the Republic of Texas gets underway Aug. 30 at 3:30 p.m.

Featured in Sunday's twin

historical marker dedication for "Camp Resolution," five miles south of Quitaque on Farm Road 1065 at 3:30 p.m., the 4th Cavalry reenactment group will pitch their tents amidst the colorful red sandstone bluffs where hikers often catch glimpses of aoudad sheep, deer, rattlesnakes, and occasionally hear the cry of a panther.

Dedicated to preserving the heritage of the cavalry era of the Indian Wars when Colonel Ranald S. Mackenzie and his U.S. troops scoured the caprock and plains for hostiles, the 4th prides itself on authentic uniforms, equipment, and weapons.

The non-profit organization holds monthly training sessions, annual sabre and shooting matches, encampments, and living history displays to educate the public. City Council Called Public Hearing Concerning Tax Hike

On August 20, the Quitaque city Council met in a called public hearing to answer questions from the public on the proposed tax rate increase from \$1697 per \$100.00 evaluation to \$4.43 per \$100.00 evaluation.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Merrell. Councilmen present were O. R. Stark, Randy Powell, Larry Price, A. B. Ramsey, and Elgin Conner. Also present were 23 taxpayers.

The secretary, David Brunson, presented copies of the approved budget to the audience and explained, line by line, each revenue and expenditure.

The Council explained that any reductions in revenues obtained from this increase would result in a reduction of services provided by the city.

A counter proposal was brought by R. R. Skinner. This proposal was presented to

the Council and to the Public, and was discussed point by point.

A show of hands was called for by the Mayor on a proposal to increase the minimum water rate by \$2.00 and decrease the proposed tax rate by the amount of revenue received from this increase. A total of five in the audience approved of this proposal. Also the Mayor called for a show of hands of those present that would be in favor of accepting the increase as proposed by the council. An overwhelming majority approved this proposal.

Also a meeting was called to discuss seal coating the paved streets in the City.

Councilman Stark presented a brief history of how the streets in Quitaque were paved by individual homeowners.

After a discussion on ways to finance the seal coating, councilman Conner made a motion to borrow the required funds and seal coat the streets.

Council Powell seconded this motion. Mayor Merrell called for a vote on this motion. The councilmen voting in favor of the motion were Conner, Stark, Ramsey, and Powell.

In and interview with City Secretary, David Brunson, the question was asked why is such a large increase needed at this time, Brunson stated "the best that I can tell the last tax hike was in 1957. When the reevaluation was done five or six years ago the tax rate was \$.29 per \$100.00 evaluation. In an effort to keep tax rates down the council dropped the rate to \$.16. At that time the city had began receiving a sizable revenue from the Federal Government through Revenue Sharing. Also expenses were kept at a level that allowed the city to build a small surplus.

As inflation began to eat at this surplus no new equipment was purchased or repaired properly. In 1986, Revenue Sharing funds were cut out by the Federal

Dear Parent or Guardian:
The Turkey - Quitaque ISD serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 55¢ K-6th and breakfast for 35¢. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 30¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

FOOD STAMP / AFDC HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-priced meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household; (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None"; (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If you list income information and your child is approved meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

FOSTER CHILD: Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

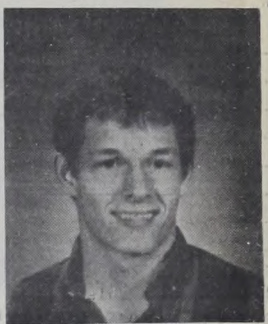

The briefing, which lasted approximately two hours, covered a wide range of topics, including budget, legislative and political forecasts.

Futch, who was appointed to his present position by Secretary Block, and other FmHA state directors were in Washington to attend an Administrator's Policy Meeting in near-by Alexandria, Virginia. The White House briefing was arranged by Secretary Lyng.

"It was certainly a thrill for me just to be in the same room with the Vice President and the Chief of Staff," Futch said. "much less to have the opportunity to talk with them and ask questions. It's an experience I'll never forget."

Although the briefing was closed to the press, Futch characterized the reports as being

"...sympathetic to the credit needs of rural America. While they certainly didn't portray themselves as agricultural experts, both the Vice President and Mr. Baker demonstrated a real sensitivity to what is going on in rural America, and I believe they are on the right track in addressing some of our problems."

Futch also visited with members of the Texas congressional delegation on Capitol Hill, and attended a private reception with Secretary Lyng and other USDA officials.

The purpose of the FmHA policy meeting was to review recent program and policy changes and to address upcoming areas of concern to FmHA state directors.

Dove Season Begins Sept. 1 With New Rules

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved early hunting seasons mourning mourning doves.

North zone mourning doves season begins Sept. 1 and continues through Nov. 9. Central zone dove season is Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 2-11. South zone mourning dove season is set for Sept. 20-Nov. 18 except in the Special White-Winged Dove Area where the season is Sept. 20-Nov. 14. The winter season for mourning doves in the South Zone is Jan. 2-11.

A \$6 White-Winged dove stamp is required in addition to a valid hunting license to take white-wings anywhere in the state.

Minimum age requirement for hunters drawn for Type 1 Wildlife Management Area hunts, such as Matador Game and Wildlife Management Area have been eliminated. However, hunters under 17 must be accompanied by an adult. The Parks and Wildlife Department is to establish a statewide hunter safety training and certification program for persons 17 or younger.

Shooting hours during the mourning dove season in each zone is one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Dove bag limits are set at 12

mourning, white-winged and white-tipped doves in the aggregate including no more than two white-winged doves and two white-tipped doves.

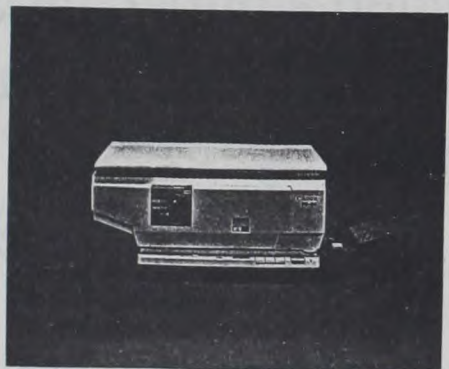
