First National Bank To Celebrate 70th Anniversary

The First National Bank of Quitaque will celebrate its 70th year of successful business on August 2, 1990.

The Quitaque banking institution opened on August 2, 1920 and has been in continuous operation ever since. It was one of the few banks in this part of the country to remain open during the severe depression of the thirties.

Officers and employees on opening day were Amos Persons, president; J. B. Russell, vice-president; cashier, Orlin Stark; and bookkeeper, Gladys Persons.

Board of Directors were J.B.

Persons, Amos Persons, O.W. Stroup, J. W. Taylor, G. Tunnell, P.O. Woods and L. E. Graham.

The First National Bank of Quitaque has become recognized as a leader among area communities, with many depositors continuing to bank at home, even though they have moved from the area.

The bank originally opened with loans and discounts of \$4,010.55, cash assets of \$29,820.43 and a banking house with furniture and fixtures totaling \$5,183.55.

Due to continued growth, the original main street building was remodeled in 1951. In 1979,

plans for the new banking facility were drawn up and the First National Bank moved in August, 1980 to their current beautiful home.

The popular "Comings, Goings & Doings" began as an occasional publication in 1953 by president O. R. Stark, Jr. The newsletter was so informative and enjoyable, the depositors responded and began looking forward to each issue. Thus, was born one more friendly, hometown convenience of the First National Bank of Quitaque.

A gala Open House is being planned for Thursday, August 2, 1990 at the bank for the entire community in celebration of seventy years of continuous service to the community. Records, photos, and scrapbooks of the past 70 years of Quitaque hand in hand with the First National Bank will be on display.

Briscoe County Extension News

"Heat Wave" does justice to what our plants and we have been through this summer so far. Three solid weeks of 100+ degree weather in June put plants, water systems and gardeners under extreme stress. We can look forward to a long late summer and fall with much better temperatures for vegetable growth. Iron deficiency is showing up in many landscapes and gardens. Extreme heat in June has made the interveinal yellowing of leaves more severe than usual. Iron treatment of soil and plants is helpful. Iron 138 chelate is the most effective iron source for our region.

By mid July make your last planting of pintos, French horticultural and any other beans you intend for dry harvest. Allow time for maturity, drydown and harvest before fall rains come. Sow seeds of broccoli, brussell sprouts, cabbage and cauliflower by mid to late July. We have enjoyed continuous harvests of Green Comet and Packman broccoli right through the one hundred degree weather. Carrot, snap beans, parsnip, turnip and rutabaga can go in any time until about the first of August. Successions of quick maturing Chinese vegetables can be planted now and on into early September. The same goes for lettuce.

If your annuals look "stressed out" beyond reasonable rejuvenation, you can start over. Replant with potted transplants of: ageratum, dwarf Fibrous-rooted begonias, coleus, impatiens, cosmos, marigold, petunia, periwinkle, portulaca, and zinnia just to name a few. Some kinds will come from seed but time is too short for a long period of bloom enjoyment before frost. Nurseries are taking fall gardening more seriously and continuing to stock good plants, in pots and packs. Impatiens thrive in shade with good direct light.
