National 4-H Week October 5 - 11

4-H members and leaders all over the country will be observing National 4-H Week, October 5 - 11. Young people with a desire to learn more about their world have the opportunity to participate in this fast-growing organization.

The 4-H program offers a variety of activities for youth who are in the third grade or 9 years old through 19 years of age.

Young people can get involved in project groups, special interest groups or service groups that appeal to their interests.

While 4-H meetings that cover a variety of subjects and activities are held monthly, project groups work on one specific subject and last only until the project is completed.

Projects may include gardening, photography, raising and caring for an animal, safety, and clothing.

Special interest groups are a vital part of the 4-H program and may deal with such subjects as drugs, dating, etiquette, and ecology. These group studies help youth learn more about the world in which they live and to better adapt to changing environments.

Service groups work to help improve the community and may engage in fund raising projects for the needy and disadvantaged, or work on neighborhood beautification, or with underprivileged youth.

The 4-H program is a good way to get involved in today's world. Briscoe County has three 4-H Clubs: Briscoe Co. Sr. 4-H club meets on first Monday of each month; Valley Jr. 4-H club meets on first Wednesday of the month. Silvertown Jr. 4-H Club meets first Tuesday of each month.

Public Hunts Scheduled On Park Lands

Special drawing public hunts are scheduled at 42 state parks during the 1997-98 hunting seasons, and while most hunts will be conducted during the year's lowest periods of visitation, park users are encouraged to check park access availability prior to heading out.

While general visitation of parks will be restricted while hunts are in progress, these carefully controlled public hunts are primarily scheduled for low use, Monday through Friday periods. Most state parks will be open on Saturdays and Sundays for other compatible activities like camping, fishing and picnicking.

According to Bill Palmer, State Parks division director with Texas Parks and Wildlife, the hunts are coordinated among park staff and wildlife biologists to maximize park utilization. "I think we've done an admirable job of balancing park usage among different constituencies," Palmer said. "We've been able to implement hunting and still provide park use by not holding hunts on weekends and by keeping parks nearby open during hunts. Our goal is to try to make each park a true multiple use of the resource and hunting provides an additional recreation use to one of our constituencies." The special hunt permits are in great demand. Last year there were 28,597 applications for the 2,982 available drawn hunt positions on state parks. This year there are approximately the same number of hunt positions available.

"The most important aspect of hunting in state parks is that it's a vital resource management tool," Palmer noted. "We've got parks that are overpopulated with deer and it's common knowledge these days that overpopulation is hard on that animal and the overall resource."

While the hunts are in progress, access to the park will be restricted to persons having a hunting permit.

You can always call directly to the park of your choice before you hit the road to make sure that it will be open for general park activities. Or, call the Texas Parks and Wildlife toll-free at 800-792-1112 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday - Friday and select the Park Information voice menu option.

The state park hunt positions are allotted by random computer drawing. The deadline to apply for most of the state park hunts this year has already past; however, application deadline still remaining is November 4 for feral hog and turkey hunts.

The Caprock Canyons State Park will be closed to the public on December 10 through De-

ember 12; January 7 - 9 and January 14 - 16 for the Aoudad hunt.

Swisher Memorial Hospital Home Health--blood pressure & blood sugar screening, home health information, Texas Agricultural Extension Service--Extension service programs, osteoporosis information; Texas Department of Health--Flu shots & other immunizations, children's immunizations and Texas Department of Protective & Regulatory Services--child abuse & neglect will also be available.

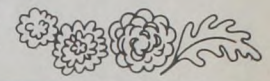
Caprock Public Library News
