
#### 4-H To Sponsor Team Roping

#### Sales Tax Permit **Abolished October 1**

'New businesses that are scheduled to open their doors on or after October 1 and have al-ready paid the \$25 sales tax permit fee, will have their money refunded," State Comptroller John Sharp says. "The same applies to existing businesses that have already filed to have their sales tax permit renewed on or after October 1.

The refunds coincide with the announcement that the annual \$25 sales tax filing fee paid to the Comptroller's Office is abolished, effective October 1.

Not only will the \$25 fee be abolished, but we're also going to issue a sales tax permit to a business for an indefinite period of time. As long as they are making sales and sending their taxes to the state, businesses won't be required to renew those permits every year, as they are now," Sharp said.

Beginning October 1, the permits will only be cancelled if a taxpayer reports no sales or taxable purchases to the state for a year's time, of if the business does not file its sales tax returns and remit the taxes it collected to the state.

"According to the Texas parks and Wildlife Department's manda-tory requirements, effective September 1, 1990 a hunter born after September 2, 1971 must have successfully completed a hunter Education Class in order to hunt in Texas. However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of the requirements.

The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; conservation; hunting traditions; wildlife identification; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival.

Students 12 years of age or older ccessfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certification.

### TAAS Test To Be Given

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) will be administered on October 8, 9 and 10th to public school students statewide. In October 1990 the testing program was administered for the first time to approximately 1.2 million students in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11. The Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) testing program was also admininistered to eligible exit level enrolled students and to registered out-of-school examinees

In October 1991 the TAAS tests will be administered for the second year. The writing test will be administered on October 8, the reading test on October 9, and the mathematics test on October 10. During the same period the exit level TEAMS tests will be administered for eligible individuals. Make-up sessions are not allowed for TAAS or TEAMS.

Valley School students in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 will be admininistered the test October 8, 9, 10th beginning at 8:30 a.m. all students are encouraged to be present for the testing since no make-up sessions are allowed. Students are encouraged to get plenty of rest and eat a nutritional breakfast prior to taking the TAAS test.





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
