## Economic Injury Disaster Loans Available From SBA

Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in Armstrong, Briscoe, Castro, Floyd, Hale, Randall and Swisher Counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. extensive rain and hail which occurred May 1 through May 31, 1994, and again on July 9, 1994, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies.

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing applications is June 26, 1995.

Due to the extensive rain and hail, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. To the extent these problems have caused the business difficulty in meeting its normal obligations, these loans may be of assistance. The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debts, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program.

The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual application. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard.

Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

## ASC Elections Rescheduled

This year's election for positions on the Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, which were to be held in December, are being rescheduled to accommodate changes brought on with last month's enactment of the law to reorganize the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

According to Bruce Price, chairperson of the Briscoe County ASC Committee, the change in the election schedule is nationwide and is authorized under regulations issued by USDA. Current members of ASC committees will continue in their posts until the new election is held next fall.

The law, which reorganized USDA, created a new Agency--the Farm Service Agency--which encompasses all of the commodity support and basic conservation programs of the former Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), of all the risk management programs of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) and the farm lending activities of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Price said the new committee system, when fully implemented, will exercise increased responsibilities in its enlarged role. "Rescheduling the elections on a nationwide basis avoids confusion which could occur from hastily drawn rules and regulations," Price said, "ands will create efficiencies by using funds which would have been spent on this year's election process to be used in training committees in performing their added duties."

## Extension Program Plan Unveiled

In March of 1994, forty-two Briscoe County residents representing Silverton and Quitaque gathered together to identify the current and upcoming issues affecting Briscoe County.

Members identified a variety related to Health, Safety and Well Being; Environmental Stewardship and Natural Resources; Economic Competitiveness, Viability and Stability; and Development of Life Skills and Leadership Qualities.

The issues identified at this meeting have been researched, reviewed and written into a formal plan. This plan, the Long Range Extension Program (LREP), will be distributed to Study Group Participants and any other interested persons at the Briscoe County Extension Program Meeting on Thursday, December, 15.

The program for the evening will include a Mexican-Stack Dinner, reports on the Issue Areas identified, distribution of the LREP's and a special program entitled "Parental Influences on Children" presented by Dr. Martha Couch. 
