FmHA Accepting Emergency Loan Applications Now

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought, hail, high winds, excessive rain, flooding, early frost and freezing weather are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Floydada, FmHA County Supervisor Becky D. Via said today.

Briscoe is one of 29 counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, hail, high winds, excessive rain, flooding, early frost and freezing weather.

Ms. Via said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Ms. Via said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 31, 1987 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Via said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a

substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Floydada is open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Hall County Declared Disaster County; Farmers To Sign Up

Hall County has now been declared a disaster county. Farmers who think they may have sustained a 50 percent loss of production should provide the Hall County ASCS office with the following information as soon as possible.

If you harvested some acres and abandoned some acres you will need a production card for the harvested acres and the number of abandoned acres and their location on the farm. If you harvested all acres you will need a production card. If you harvested zero acres you will need a zero production card. If you had any type of crop insurance you will need a copy of the appraisal and a copy of the settlement state-

ment.

Between January 12th and January 30th, 1987, you will have to sign a Final Application for Payment. Please come by the Hall County ASCS office if you feel this will apply to you.

WTU CAPABLE OF GENERATING SUFFICIENT POWER DURING PEAK PERIODS OF USAGE

With its new Oklaunion Power Station in commercial operation, West Texas Utilities Company is again capable of generating all the power its customers will need during the peak usage period of hot summertime.

The peak demand for electricity exceeded the capacity of WTU's installed generating stations several summers ago and additional power had to be purchased from neighboring utility companies.

"This means that we literally have grown into this new power plant," explained Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Often, when a new plant is brought on line it creates an immediate huge surplus of generating capacity. In our case, completion of Oklaunion was timed to coincide with our needs."

The coal-burning Oklaunion unit eight miles southeast of Vernon has a net rated capacity of 665 megawatts, which is more than half the 1,070 megawatt capacity of all of WTU's gas-fired plants. WTU owns 54.69 percent, or 370 megawatts, of the new plant, which is the first jointly-owned unit in the Central and South West System. Other owners are Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both members of CSW; the Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority and the City of Brownsville.

The new plant was officially declared commercial December 24. The power is under control of a central dispatcher in Abilene, who economically loads the various generating units in the WTU system.

As Plant Manager Chuck Adams of Vernon explains it, "When the load increases, the unit that can make the next kilowatt the cheapest is the one that is brought on line." Adams' staff includes 126 employees, who work in shifts to keep the plant running 24 hours a day. Most of the staff has been on the site for several months involved in training and start-up operations.

Construction at Oklaunion was begun in May 1982, and almost all the news regarding the plant since then has been good. The best news is that it was completed on time and under original cost estimates.

The plant will provide over 25 percent of WTU's operating capacity and will end the Company's almost total reliance on natural gas as boiler fuel. The low-sulphur coal comes by rail from Wyoming. Each delivery averages from 100-115 cars, with each car holding 100 tons of coal. About 300 tons will be burned an hour when the plant is in full operation.

The plant is one of the most modern in existence. Equipment includes the most up-to-date pollution control facilities and complies with all air quality control requirements.

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HALL COUNTY FARMERS HARVEST 9,155 BALES WITH GOOD WEATHER

Favorable cotton harvesting weather has prevailed most of the season, and area farmers took advantage of drier conditions to strip 9,155 bales to bring the season harvest total to 23,405 bales.

Since farmers were able to harvest almost 10,000 bales during the past seven days, it would indicate that harvesting efforts are near full swing, but the damp weather recently coupled with forecasts of wetter conditions, will bring the harvest to another halt.

The 23,405 bale mark being reached this week is also an indication that farmers are serious about harvest efforts despite very difficult conditions brought about by very heavy rains in August, September and October, which in some areas of Hall County, boosted annual moisture totals to 55 inches and over.

Many of these rains were of a general, soaking nature, causing the worst washing conditions of

any late summer and fall season in remembered history of this area. Now, fields which have always been firm and dry when surface moisture evaporated, have become boggy in nature, and farm equipment breaks through a hard pan and becomes mired and stuck.

Modern harvesting equipment such as overhead basket strippers, module makers and module

trucks have become prime victims. Added to the sub-soil moisture traps, surface washouts and fields cut from run-off water, broken terraces, create a nightmare as equipment lumbers across the fields.
