Quitaque had three places open on the council and four persons vying for the spots. Randy Stark cornered 54 votes, 53 went to Wilburn Leeper, 51 to Rhonda Rogers and 20 to Jerry Beck.

A letter was signed by the councilmen for the June 3, 1995 celebration in accordance with the FAA rules so that Coye Franks will be allowed to fly over the City of Quitaque under 500 feet high for the "Guiana Day".

The Council also will draft a letter in support of WTU Manager, Jerry Chambliss in support of a job well done and in the interest of his remaining a manager of the Quitaque-Turkey WTU.

Lift chicken pieces from bowl and arrange, skin side up, in single layer in a shallow rimmed baking sheet. Brush evenly with chutney (finely chop large pieces). Bake, uncovered, in 350° convection oven for 45 to 50 minutes or until meat near thigh bone is no longer pink when slashed. Arrange chicken on a platter; garnish with parsley. Makes 4 or 5 servings.

Consumer Corner

(NAPS)—Hundreds of millions of dollars a year. That's how much it will cost consumers in higher electric bills, if Congress votes to sell three government-owned power marketing administrations (PMAs), agencies that sell federally generated hydropower.

The hydropower projects were built and have been operated in partnership with not-for-profit, consumer-owned utilities that, in turn, purchase power through long-term contracts and for what it costs to produce. These power sales cover all the PMA operating costs as well as repaying the facilities' construction costs, with interest.

"Selling off these valuable public resources undercut the foundation of real competition between consumer-owned and investor-owned electric utilities," says Glenn English, execu-

utive vice president and general manager of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association.

Residential and business consumers would not be the only ones feeling this price increase, he warns. People who buy what those businesses produce and sell can expect to see price increases corresponding to the increased electricity costs. Taxpayers can expect to have to pay higher electric bills for military installations and state and municipal entities.

Meanwhile, privatization would not reduce federal spending because the PMAs pay their own way.

Many consumers, concerned about prices and taxes, are asking their legislators where they stand on this. Anyone can write to their Senators and Representative
