Judge Beeler has been judging livestock shows for 20 years. Judge Beeler commented that the first thing that he looked for in a hog is muscle, then shape through the center of the ham. "Most judges see everything the same," Beeler a hog farmer with

950 sows, said. "The difference is how the judge prioritizes these characteristics." Judge Beeler said that Burson's barrow had tremendous body conformation, good production, and a huge chest and excellent muscle expression.





The Friends of the Motley County Library in Matador, Texas, will host a program en-titled "A Matador Cowboy's Long Distance Romance." This program will be presented by Mar-sue Potts on Sunday, March 17, at 2:00 pm in the Library in Matador

Based on the letters of D. C. Keith (the original spelling) and Ella Cribbs, their poignant story is revealed in correspondence postmarked Teepee City, Dockum Ranch, Fort Spunkey, Giles, Della Plains, and Fort Madison, Iowa, and runs from 1886 to 1891. The Keith and Cribbs letters provide a rare opportunity to participate in the flowering of a budding romance and the settling of cattle country on the ranges of the Espouela, Dockum and Matador Ranches.

Wild horse and cow hunts, night herding on trail drives, shipping beeves by rail to Chi-cago, burning of fireguards on the vast plains pasture of the Matadors, revelry at Teepee City, and standing watch at a lonely post at Christmas time are described by the Matador cowboy as he writes to a cotton farmer's daughter he has never seen. The lovely Miss Cribbs shares her life in the little settlement of the Brazos River Valley. Self described as "hardier than looks might suppose," she brags of picking 6,000 lbs of cotton in the fall of 1888, but longs for the last bale to be picked before Christ-mas, so she and her sister can have a "lively time". As the fever and chills hit the family, the young woman assumes a grown-

On the afternoon of March 17, Marisue Potts will describe in detail this long-distance romance and will tell of the family that resulted in the marriage of these two letter writers. Ms. Potts is a native of this region and is aptly suited to tell this fascinating ory, which she presented at the National Cowboy Symposium in Lubbock. In addition, Ms. Potts has written several books about the people and history of Motley and Floyd Counties.

These works include The Motley County Library Mural History Book, Essays on the Texan-Santa Fe Expedition of 1841, and Motley County Roundup, Over One Hundred Years of Gather-

#### Landing Likely Saved Boy's Life in Wreck

After going to the scene of the son's car wreck, Billy Ballew be-

lieves a miracle happened. Sixteen-year-old Lance Ballew has "scrapes, lacerations, gouges and lots of stitches," his dad said, but he's alive. And that's after spending about 30 minutes Saturday with his head pinned beneath

his 1995 Chevy Cavalier. Lance Ballew and his friend Ryan Ivy, 17 are juniors at Memphis High School

They were riding around on Texas 70 about 10 miles north of Turkey, and they neglected to fasten their seat belts.

Lance Ballew, who was driving, failed to negotiate a curve, the Department of Public Safety said.

The car slid into a ditch and overturned on its top. Lance was thrown through the back window, but Ivy was still in the car when it came to rest. The lay of the land saved Lance's life, his father said.

"Had it not been for a mesquite tree not letting the car fall all the way flat, he would have been dead, Billy Ballew said.

A crevice in the earth also kept Lance from shouldering the entire weight of the car, he said.

Hall County Hospital in Memphis DPS Trooper Daniel Hawthorne, who investigated the 2:30 pm accident. Ivv was later taken to Amarillo, but Lance Ballew stayed in Memphis


