Estate Planning Seminars Across Texas in March

College Station- Do you have some hard decisions to make concerning settlement of an estate? Then you are a prime candidate for Texas Cooperative Extension's two-day estate planning seminars slated at four locations in March.

These seminars are designed to help Texans reduce their estate taxes and make effective estate planning decisions. This year's seminar dates and locations include: March 6-7, Lubbock; March 20-21, Houston; March 24-25, Abilene; and March 27-28, Austin.

"The goal of our seminars is to help Texans make wise estate planning decisions by providing a wealth of information on tax and estate planning matters," said Dr. Wayne A. Hayenga, Extension economist-manager. "It is useful for married couples, spouses, potential estate executors, trustees and those who want to make estate settlement less burdensome for their loved ones."

Program topics will include:
 * Basic Estate Planning Devices, such as wills, living trusts, estate tax deferral, gifts and property titles.
 * Treating Beneficiaries Fairly.

* Estate Planning Tools for Agriculture; focusing on use of corporations and partnerships, special farm land valuation, family-owned business exclusion, and rules for deferring estate tax payments.

* The Role of Life Insurance in Estate Planning, and Tax Valuation Rules.

Hayenga is an attorney as well as an Extension economist. He works extensively with farmers, ranchers and family owned firms in financial, business and estate planning. This year's seminars are sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension in cooperation with Progressive Farmer Magazine.

Regional Range Renovation Program Set For February 26

Dumont - A "Rangeland and Wildlife Habitat Restoration Field Day" sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service, and the Texas Section of Society for Range Management is coming to the Tongue River Ranch near Dumont, TX on February 26.

Registration starts at 8:30 a.m. The program begins at 9 a.m. Three continuing education units (CEUs) will be awarded to participants with Texas Department of Agriculture pesticide applicator licenses.

Dr. Darrell Ueckert, Texas A&M range researcher as San Angelo and one of the program coordinators, said northwest Texas ranchers now have another battle to fight while facing a prolonged drought and questionable economic times.

"Termites have eaten the world up here. The drought and desert termites have resulted in a major die-off of desirable warm season forage grasses. Huge parts of many of these ranches have little or no desirable vegetative cover," Ueckert said. "So when it does rain, the soil seals over...resulting in little rainfall infiltration and a lot of runoff. Recovery of rangelands with this problem can take decades."

"The purpose of this program is to provide ranchers with an array of proven technology they can easily use to restore degraded rangeland. We will demonstrate this technology knowing full well that ranchers will only adopt it if it makes economic sense, and if it won't hurt their lucrative wildlife industry."

Gary Antilley, King County Extension agent, will introduce Bill Reed, Tongue River Ranch manager, to kick off the program. Reed will give a profile and brief background of the ranch.

The remainder of the morning's speakers and topics include: "Grazing Management and Monitoring," Allan McGinty, Extension range specialist, San Angelo; "Weed and Brush Control - Chemical and Mechanical," J.F. Cadenhead, Extension range and brush control specialist, Vernon; "Rangeland Ripping, Contour Farrowing, Re-seeding and Managing Desert Termites," Ueckert; "Cost Share Opportunities," Jon Weddle, NRCS program liaison, Lubbock; and "Consideration for Quail," Dale Rollins, Extension wildlife specialist, San Angelo.

Following a noon lunch break, the afternoon program will cover: "Considerations for Deer," Dean Ransom, Extension wildlife specialist, Vernon; and "Deer Nutrition Study at Tongue River Ranch," David Sikes, NRCS, Guthrie.

Registration costs \$15 after February 19 or at the door. Registration information and fees should be sent to Gary Antilley, County Extension Agent, Box 125, Guthrie, TX 79236.

Last Week In Texas History!

Feb. 15, 1876
Present state constitution adopted.

Feb. 15, 1877
About 40 cattlemen met under a great oak at Graham to organize the Northwest Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, now known as the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association. The chief aim of the organization was to stop cattle rustling.

Feb. 16, 1846
First Legislature convened in Austin thereby completing the process of annexation.

Feb. 16, 1861
Robert E. Lee arrived in San Antonio from Fort Mason en route to Washington. Rebel troops held his baggage until he swore allegiance to the Confederacy. Lee never recovered the luggage.

Comptroller Strayhorn Urges Qualifying Texas Families To File For More Than \$3 Billion In Federal Earned Tax Credits

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn today said the economy would get a \$3 billion boost if nearly two million Texas families who qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) claim the credit on their federal income tax returns.

"In 2002, the average EITC refund to Texas families was almost \$1,900," Strayhorn said. "Families used this money to pay bills and buy household goods and school clothes for their children. The EITC is one of the quickest ways I know to bring more federal tax dollars home to Texas, and to put those dollars in the pockets of hard-working families."

EITC refunds vary, depending on family income and the number of qualifying children in the family. To claim the credit, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) requires families to meet specific eligibility requirements and have a valid social security number for every qualifying family member.

Taxpayers who expect to qualify for the EITC in 2003 and have at least one qualifying child may sign up at work to receive part of the credit in each paycheck, instead of waiting for a tax refund.

"For minimum wage families, that's like getting up to a \$2 per hour raise," Strayhorn said. "It's money they can use immediately to help make ends meet."

Winter Wheat Condition Should Improve Soon

Lubbock - Farmers from Midland to Dimmitt have reported purple and dark reddish winter wheat, as well as thin stand, in the past couple of weeks. But a Texas A&M agronomist says these conditions are only temporary. The discolored plants should green up, and thin stands should improve as warmer spring weather arrives.

"I have seen a lot of reddish and purple leaf tips, mostly on the top of older leaves that are more exposed to the weather. If we were talking about corn or other crops, it might indicate phosphorus deficiency, which typically discolors wheat stems, not the leaves," said Calvin Trostle, Extension agronomist based at Lubbock. "Phosphorus is relatively mobile within the plant, so I don't think phosphorus is the culprit."

"My counterpart in Amarillo, Brent Bean, and I believe this leaf discoloration is due to frost and cold weather. If you turn these discolored leaves over, they are green underneath, which mostly rules out the possibility of a virus or some other plant disease."

Trostle and Bean feel the purple leaf discoloration will disappear as the weather warms, perhaps in a few days or weeks. The color difference is already noticeable in some fields, they said.

The agronomists also report some producers are concerned that their wheat looks "thin."

"A dryland seeding rate of 40 pounds per acre should result in about 15 seeds per square foot. If two-thirds of that seed grows into established plants, we would be seeing about 10 plants per square foot," Trostle said. "In short, a field of what might look thin, especially the finer-leaved varieties, and still have modest grain yield potential. However, its forage potential may depend more on the weather."

March and April weather typically has a big impact on forage and grain yield potential on the High Plains. More often than not, this impact is greater than that of seeding rates and winter plant stands. "Some of these thin stands might need a light shot of Nitrogen, especially if they look yellow, to encourage further tiller development," Bean added.

Seed test weight, germination and planting depth are other factors that affect stand health and yield potential. Texas Cooperative Extension recommends planting seed wheat with a test weight of at least 57 pounds per bushel, and germination of at least 85 percent. Shallow planting, less than 1 inch, is not recommended even in moist years because it encourages shallow roots, Trostle said.

"On the other hand, with older grain drills and fluffy seed beds, too often we see wheat planted too deep, hence slower emergence and establishment," Trostle said.

"Overall, our soil moisture condition look good, through we are drying out on top in some area. We are also seeing some leaf mortality, especially in fields where the plants are only rooted from three to five inches deep, in the dryer topsoil layer," he added. "Leaf mortality can be alarming, but it is typically due to moisture and cold weather stress."

It will be the only doctoral program in Texas with this particular multi-disciplinary approach. Only Iowa State has a Ph.D. program remotely similar, Clark said.

Implementation of the program was made contingent upon the University's ability to finance it. "It's important to our University and our region," said Flavius Killebrew, WTAMU provost/vice president for academic affairs. "In spite of today's tough economic climate, we will implement this program as soon as it's feasibly possible."

Early Spraying Pays

Spraying pastures when weeds are small, 4 inches tall or less, typically yield more grass than spraying later. The 1990-91 demonstrations by Texas Extension specialists David Bade and Paul Baumann showed this most clearly. As weeds grow, they rob more moisture, soil nutrients and sunlight from the grass. Most weeds are easier to control when they're small. This early spraying strategy works especially well with Grazon P+D herbicide, applied at the rate of 2 pints per acre or more, because of its soil residual activity.

Weed Control For The Un-Licensed

Redeem® R&P herbicide is our non-restricted use product for excellent broadleaf weed control in permanent grass pastures, rangeland and non-crop area. Active ingredients are clopyralid and triclopyr. 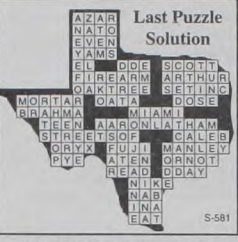
