Bears Lose Defensive Battle To Merkel Friday; Have Open Date

Football fans who like defensive ball had a picnic in Merkel Friday night as the Bears from Baird High School and the Merkel Badgers squared off in a battle which featured little or no offense. The Badgers, playing before a homecoming crowd, put together one drive which netted the only touchdown of the game and won over the Bears 6-0.

Baird's offensive team had two moments of glory during the 48 minutes of play. In the second period Wally Harris scampered for 30 yards and almost went in for a score, but the Badgers safety man brought him down about the 25 yard line. In the waning seconds of the game, the Bears took to the air and moved the ball from their own 35 to the Badger 16. On the final play of the game, a pass into the Merkel end zone was incomplete, and the Merkel homecoming fans went away happy. Baird fans came home.

The Baird defensive line and secondary ate up the Badger offensive line, and the Badger defensive line and secondary ate up the Bear offensive line. Only 14 first downs were made by both teams with Merkel owning eight of them. Both teams netted 216 yards rushing with Merkel holding a 128-88 edge. The Bears held the Badgers until late in the third quarter. Charles Dannhelm, defensive back, intercepted a Bear pass on the Baird 45 yard line. Eight

plays later C. B. Brown carried the ball over the goal line from a yard out. His point after attempt from placement was blocked and the offensive show was over until the final seconds when Baird hit the air for their final effort.

The Bears are idle this week and are licking a few wounds. Fullback Tally Windham had a growth removed from his foot Monday and will be inactive for a few days. He will be ready for the game with Gorman on October 12. Steve Stanley has had a succession of bad blisters on his feet since the season began. Some of the players, including Tommy Barton, quarterback, missed a day or two of drills because of flu.

At Quarterback Club meeting Monday night, Coach Vernon Townsend said that there would probably be some personnel changes in the next game in an attempt to strengthen the offense. He said that he had not scouted Gorman and could not give a report on the boys from the land of Peanuts. He plans to scout them this week end.

Local United Fund Drive To Get Underway Monday Morn.

The Baird United Fund campaign will get under way Monday as workers begin solicitation for funds needed to fulfill the \$3,810 budget as set up by the budget committee to take care of the needs of the more than a dozen agencies which the organization supports.

Final plans were made at a meeting of the campaign committee at Bibb's Cafe Monday morning. Mrs. W. L. Ivey and Elsworth Mayer are general chairmen of the drive.

It was stressed at the meeting that while the budget for 1964 was less than the 1963 budget, it was urgent that contributions be increased. It was reported that there was a deficit in last years fund drive, and that the deficit had to be made up from a surplus which no longer exists. "A days pay is the United Way" is the campaign slogan and everyone is urged to contribute one days pay in the campaign this year.

The campaign is divided into

Participating agencies are: The Boy Scouts, The Girl Scouts, the Cancer Fund, Polio Foundation, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Red Cross, Heart Fund, Goodfellows, Salvation Army, Crippled Childrens Foundation, Texas United Defense Fund, Baird Youth Club, Mental Health Association, Sweeny Diabetic Foundation and the Alcoholic Council.

It was pointed out that the Heart Fund was set up this year to assist local patients and that the fund would be administered by a committee composed of Ben Russell, B. C. Chrisman and Steve Warren. A portion of the Cancer fund goes into research and a portion stays in Baird to be administered as needed for local patients. L. C. Cash, Fred Goble and John Towler are in charge of that fund.

City Of Baird Retires \$26,000 In Bonds; Interest Reduced

The City of Baird as of June 30, 1963 had outstanding two series of Tax supported Bonds, one Refunding Bond 1950 issue, amounting to \$40,000.00 and a Park and Park Improvement (Swimming Pool) Bond 1955 issue amounting to \$20,500.00, making the total tax bonds outstanding June 30, 1963, \$60,500.00.

The \$40,000.00 1950 Refunding Bonds were callable Oct. 1, 1963 or any interest paying date thereafter. As this is the City's first opportunity to redeem any of these bonds without bonus or penalty the City Council is taking advantage of the opportu-

ity and is calling \$26,000.00 of the series 1950 Refunding Bonds as of Oct. 1; having accumulated sufficient funds in the Sinking Fund to pay off this amount and leave enough money in the Fund so that with the apportionment of the 1963-64 tax collections this year another \$4,000 or \$5,000 can be paid off next October.

The payment of the \$26,000.00 will make a very substantial saving in interest to the advantage of the taxpayers of the City of Baird.

The City will also make a \$5,000 Bond payment Oct. 1, on the \$165,000.00 Water and Sewer System Revenue Bonds voted Oct. 1, 1962.

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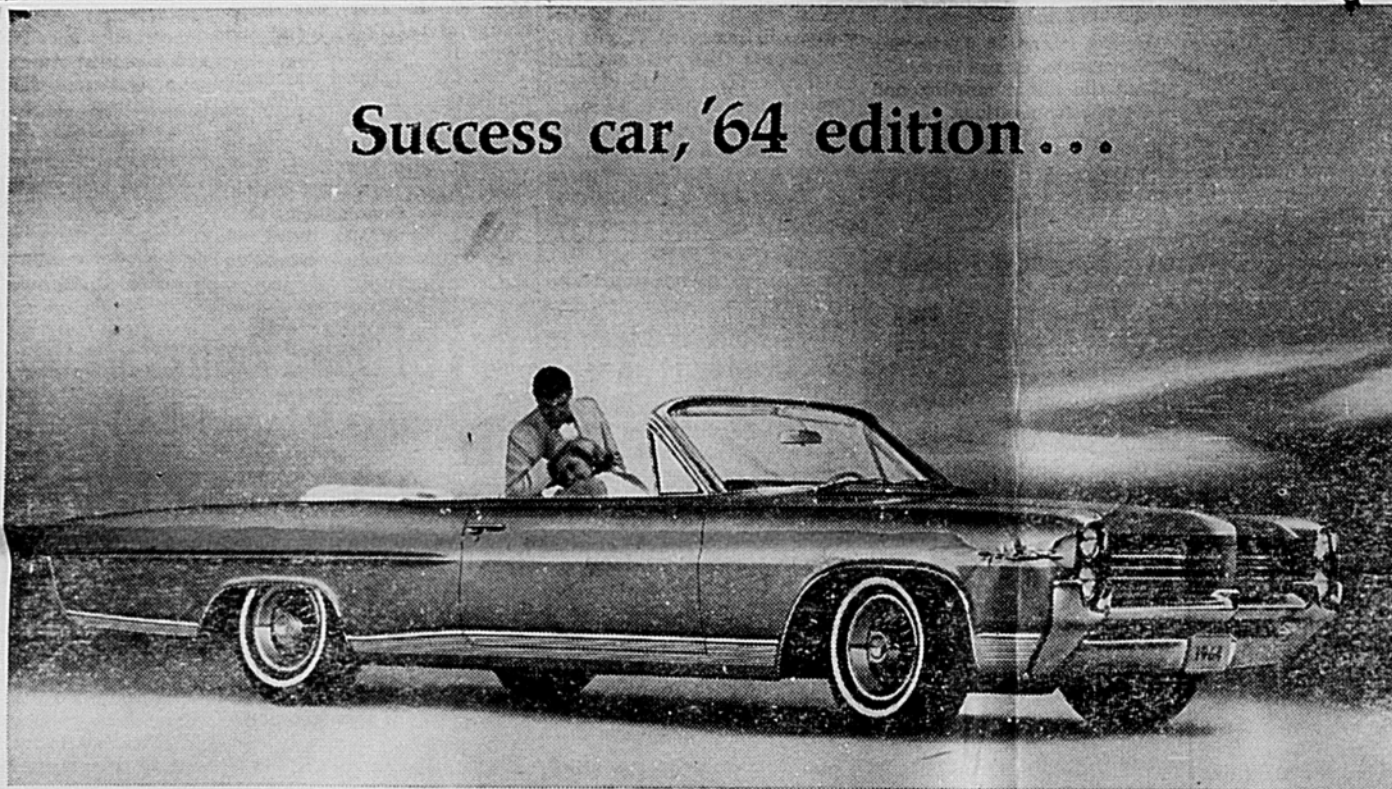

Pacific. He was presented a check and a surprise gift from his fellow workers. The gift turned out to be a large apron with the words "Little Chief" embroidered on it.

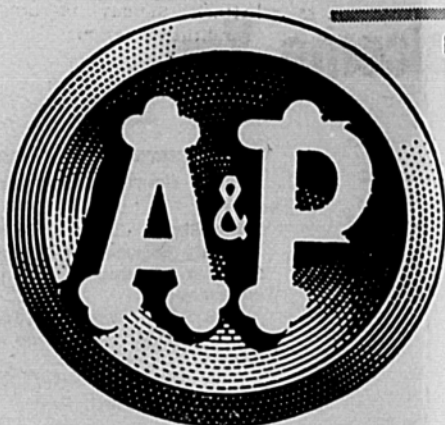
He reported that he had received more than 100 calls from friends all along the line from Fort Worth to El Paso congratulating him on his retirement.

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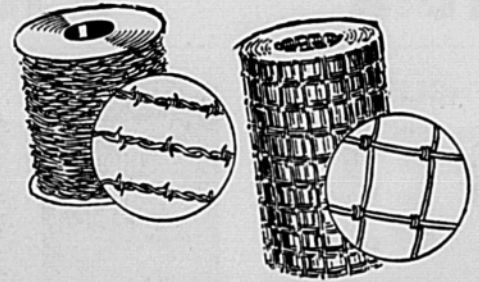
