THOSE NEW HALF dollars went mighty fast in our town.

First National Bank's supply of 500 of the shiny new coins was almost completely snapped up during the first two days they were available — last Thursday and Friday.

Only a few were left by the first of this week.

Bank officials feel the supply would have gone much faster had it not been for limits they imposed on the new coins — \$2 worth for regular customers and \$1 for others.

The story in Baird was no different from that in hundreds of other towns across the nation. Everyone wanted to get hold of the new Kennedy 50-cent piece.

APPARENTLY MANY people took the new coin as a souvenir to save rather than to spend. But with so many put back as keepsakes, it seems unlikely the coins will ever become worth much more than face value since there will probably be a big supply even 100 years from now.

But so far we have seen very few in actual circulation. In fact, The Baird Star has received only one so far through regular customer channels.

Perhaps if the coin shortage develops that experts are now predicting for years in the immediate future, folks will have to pull these new half dollars out of hiding.

CLYDE HIGH SCHOOL'S Science Club held its first Callahan County Science Fair this Wednesday. Results of judging are listed elsewhere in this edition.

We were somewhat disappointed that there was not a single entry from Baird in the fair. In fact, only the Clyde and Eula school were represented by the scientific exhibits.

We hope participation will be wider in the county next year.

ALL INDICATIONS point to a relatively light turnout of voters for both the school board election this Saturday and the city council election Tuesday.

It is particularly hard to stir up interest in elections where the ballot is short and contests are either few or nonexistent — which is the case in both.

Contract Gets Official Okay

A contract for 5.72 miles of construction on IH 20 in Callahan County has been officially awarded to a San Antonio firm. It was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission. Subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Allen Construction Co., Inc. submitted the low bid of \$1,795,408 on the project. Grading, structures, flexible base and asphaltic concrete pavement from 2 miles east of Baird to 0.3 miles east of Mexia Creek is expected to take 300 working days, according to J. C. Roberts District Highway Engineer at Abilene.

C. W. Westbrook, Resident Engineer at Abilene will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

If spring be here, can rodeo time be far behind?

The signs are strong in Callahan County that rodeo time is approaching with a rush, standing right now at only four weeks away. Four weeks from this Thursday will be opening night for the Callahan County Sheriffs Posse Rodeo.

Many hours of work have already gone in on the 1964 production, although the work is just beginning.

Several stores in the county have started featuring rodeo regalia in their displays. Western hats, shirts and other items are showing up on counters in number.

But the big work has been done so far by members of the Sheriffs Posse and others who have spent hundreds of man hours revamping the rodeo arena east of Baird. The lights have been on often in recent days, indicating workers are busy in the arena.

Chutes and pens are being completely redone for this year's show. The old wooden railings and fences are being replaced with pipe which is being welded into place.

The project will be completed before May 30, first day for the rodeo.

CLUES STILL SCARCE IN SLAYING; UNDERCOVER MAN JOINS OFFICERS

An undercover criminologist employed by the State of Texas has joined the investigation of the robbery-murder of a 23-year-old Clyde service station attendant.

The agent has joined Callahan County officers in investigating the murder, which occurred early last Wednesday at a service station on Highway 38 11 miles south of Clyde.

Killed was Johnny Charles Maner, a native of Clyde.

Clues to the mysterious slaying have been scarce, although a number of persons have been questioned in connection with the incident.

Lie detector tests in Austin last week virtually eliminated two Houston men as suspects in robbery-slaying, an investigator said, but 42nd District Attorney Bradley Miles said he wasn't completely ruling them out.

The two men and the wife of one were arrested last Wednesday afternoon after allegedly attempting to sell some tires to an Abilene service station operator. They were taken to Austin for lie detector tests, then returned to Abilene.

Callahan County Deputy Sheriff Tod Newton said as far as he's concerned they're no longer suspects. "We're back where we started from," he said. "We'll have to start from scratch again."

Newton said the results of the polygraph tests taken by the two men proved negative and that "nothing conclusive" was turned up in a check of fingerprints on a .22 pistol found in the men's car after they were arrested last Wednesday afternoon.

District Attorney Miles said

he was working on additional evidence in the case but would not say what it was. However it was learned from one source that a hunter in the vicinity of the death scene saw an auto similar to the one the Houston people were driving heading toward Abilene at a high rate of speed at about the time of the shooting.

A credit card found in the woman's purse places the three within 20 miles of the murder scene, Miles said.

Capt. George Sutton, head of Abilene police criminal investigation, said the woman, 18, signed a statement Thursday that the credit card was stolen from Grand Prairie.

The card allegedly was used to purchase gas, tires, fan belts and other items. Police say the suspects tried to resell the items.

Baird Voters to Choose Council, School Board Members at Polls

One contested and one uncontested election loom for Baird voters within the next week.

This Saturday three trustees for the Baird Independent School District will be elected from four candidates, while next Tuesday a mayor and two city councilmen will be elected with only three names on the ballot.

Polls for both elections will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. School board voting will be at the American Legion Hall in Baird, while city election ballots will be cast at City Hall.

The four men seeking positions on Baird's school board are Terrell Williams, James L. Snyder, Ray D. Black and Bill Cason. Williams and Snyder are present board members.

Roy Gilbreath, third board member whose term expires this year, did not file for reelection.

Two incumbents are among the three candidates for the three city positions. They are Mayor J. L. Ault and Councilman J. W. Loper. Clyde White is retiring from the city's governing body.

The second council candidate is Charles Reeves.

County ASC Office Summarizes Callahan Activities For 1963

A summary of activities under the Agricultural Conservation Program for 1963 has been prepared by the Callahan County ASCS Office.

A total of \$68,508 was paid to Callahan County producers and soil conservation contractors for establishing soil conserving

practices on 271 farms, the report says. A like amount was paid by producers since ASCS shares one-half the cost of the practices.

Total acreage of participating farms included approximately one-third of the total land in the county.

Here is a break-down of the various practices which were established in 1963 showing Federal cost-shares paid — forty-two farm operators established permanent cover by seeding 794 acres perennial grasses at a cost of \$4,047. Perennial grasses were seeded on 1,217 acres on 26 farms to improve established cover (pasture) at 85 cents per acre.

The greatest conservation problem is that of controlling competitive shrubs (mesquite, post oak, prickly pear, cedar). One hundred twenty-three producers took advantage of this

practice, controlling 15,201 acres at a cost of \$36,291.

Forty-eight livestock reservoirs were constructed on 41 farms using \$15,967. Sod waterways were built on two farms, 13 constructed terraces and 13 constructed diversion terraces; total \$1,149.

Subsolling 943 acres to permit better penetration of moisture on 14 farms cost \$1,211. A total of 3,006 acres were seeded to winter cover crops of vetch or rye on 88 farms costing \$7,244. Operators of 16 farms stubble mulched 1,433 acres at \$1 per acre. Grazing was deferred on 284 acres — \$126.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is a nation-wide conservation program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Congress authorizes these funds as the public's share of an investment on conservation work needed in the public interest.

Wildcat Is Slated In Callahan County

Location for a proposed 1,600-foot rotary Cook Sand wildcat was staked 12 miles southeast of Baird in Callahan County.

It is J&L Drilling Co. of Coleman No. 1 E, S. Mauldin, located on a 128 acre lease.

Drillsite is 233 feet from the north and 1,315 feet from the east lines of Subdivision 18, Victoria CSL Survey 337.

The project is to be carried in Callahan County Regular Field.

He was married in 1944 to the former Mary Jean Price of Hunt County while both were students of Texas Tech. They have three sons, Richard, 17, Edward, 12, and Jake Rayburn, 11.

Some 100 acres in peanut allotment is available to Callahan County farmers, but request must be made by Monday for this crop year, J. C. Earp of the Callahan County ASC office said Wednesday.

Monday is the deadline for either release or request peanut acreage for this crop year.

All acreage requests submitted to date have been granted in full, he said, since releases totaled more than requests. He urged farmers having more allotment than they wish to release it by Monday.

Release and reapportionment of allotments both protects the history acreage for those releasing and benefits farmers who receive he said.

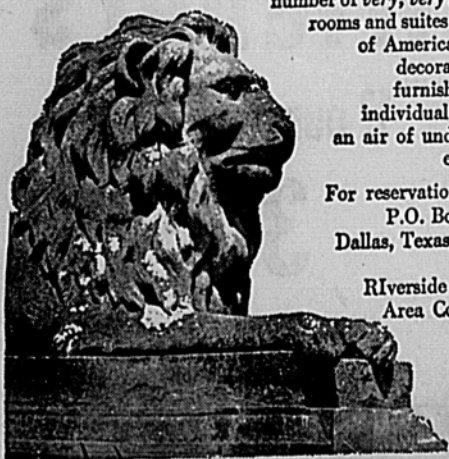
