THOSE NEW HALF dollars went mighty fast in our town.

First National Bank's supply of 500 of the shiny new coins was almost completely snapped up during the first two days they were available - last Thursday and Friday.

Only a few were left by the first of this week.

Bank officials feel the supply would have gone much faster had it not been for limits they imposed on the new coins - \$2 worth for regular customers and \$1 for others.

The story in Baird was no different from that in hur eds of rule. other towns across the nation. Everyone wanted to get hold of the new Kennedy 50-cent piece.

APPARENTLY MANY people took the new coin as a souvenier to save rather, than to spend. But with so many put back as keepsakes, it seems unlikely the coins will ever become worth much more than face value since there will probably be a big supply even 100 years

But so far we have seen very few in actual circulation. In fact, The Baird Star has received only one so far through regular customer channels.

Perhaps if the coin shortage develops that experts are now predicting for years in the immediate future, folks will have to pull these new half dollars out of hiding.

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
