Hugo Alex Bode Rites Saturday

Funeral for Hugo Alex Bode, 68, of Clyde, was at 1 p. m. Saturday in Cherokee Methodist Church in San Saba County. Burial was in Cherokee Cemetery with Bailey Funeral Home of Clyde in charge.
Mr. Bode died about 9 a. m. Thursday following an apparent heart attack. A native of Mason County, he was born Sept. 10, 1896. He was reared in San Saba County and moved to Breckenridge in 1923 to work in the oil fields.
He moved to Clyde from Breckenridge following his retirement in 1961.
He was a member of the Clyde Methodist Church.

Earnings Alone Don't Determine Social Security

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," according to H. L. Weatherly, social security field representative for Baird.
"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he said.
If you earn over \$1,200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1,200 and \$1,700. For earnings over \$1,700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.
Weatherly emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.
To avoid any misunderstanding you may have about the social security retirement test, especially if you are over 65 and earning anywhere between \$1,201 and \$3,600, you may get all the facts from your social security representative at Baird court house March 9 at 10 a. m.
Baird residents having social security matters that need attention should come to the district office, Room 2321, Federal Building, Abilene, if attention to such matters is needed before the next Baird visit.

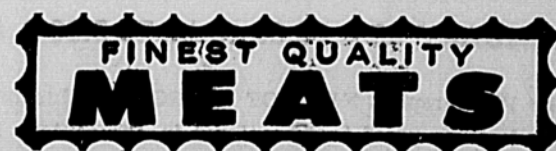
