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4 Jailed After Attempted Burglary Of Putnam Drug Store Monday

Three Dallas area young men bound for California with a woman companion were all in jail Tuesday, after an attempted burglary of a Putnam drug store blew up.

Putnam Constable Sam Maynard and two other men had flushed burglars out of the Orr Drug in Putnam Monday night. They arrested Joseph Nathan Clark, 28, of Mt. Pleasant, with Mary Elizabeth Valentine, 18, Dallas, who were in a car in front of the drug store, the constable said.

Two other men bust out the rear of the drug store and escaped Monday night, while Maynard and the other men grabbed Clark and the woman.

A full-scale manhunt was set off, ending the next day—Tuesday—about 1 p. m. when the two 17-year-old youths were nabbed 1 1/2 miles east of Putnam near J. S. 80. At least 30 officers, including a Texas Ranger, took part in the search.

The two holdouts apparently had rambled the Putnam area during the all-night manhunt—had in trousers and shirts. "I imagine they got a shade cold," said the constable.

The latest arrestees are Jerry Johnston, 17, and Billy J. Suel, 17, both of Mt. Pleasant. Highway Patrolmen James Wood and Jack Holmes did the honors.

"We saw you coming, but we were too tired to run," the two young men told officers. Neither gave any resistance.

The three men were being held in Callahan County Jail in Baird, while the girl was transferred to Taylor County Jail in Abilene, where there are facilities for female prisoners.

Charges of burglary were filed against the three men and the girl in Justice of the Peace W. L. Bowler's court in Baird.

Clark, only one of the four who refused to sign a statement, had been out of jail less than 24 hours when he was arrested in the car at the drug store Monday night, said Deputy Sheriff Lee Brown. In Clark's billfold was a receipt for a fine from Saginaw officers.

Clark's car was a drive-away automobile he had contracted to drive from Dallas to Wilmington, Calif. He had left Dallas only a few hours before the Putnam burglary.

Loren Everett, Putnam resident, spotted burglars about 11 p. m. Monday inside the drug store. He called Sheriff Homer Price in Baird who with Deputy Brown drove east toward Putnam.

Constable Maynard with R. B. Cunningham and Everett moved in on the drug store shortly after 11 p. m. They found the man and woman in the car, evidently having driven around from the side of the store. Two men fled the rear of the store while the couple were being arrested, Maynard said.

Miss Valentine gave officers a description fitting the two 17-year-olds, and the manhunt was on.

In the Putnam drug store, a pillowcase was abandoned full of merchandise. A matching pillowcase was found in the car driven by Clark. Other items in the car were an adding machine and a guitar, which the other three suspects were stolen from a school at Gordon.

Highway Patrolmen Cecil Weems and G. W. Solomon of Baird joined the search, which continued through the night.

Arriving Tuesday morning to lend a hand were officers from Palo Pinto, Abilene, Coleman, Albany, Breckenridge, Cross Plains and Brown County. A game warden's plane from Brownwood joined the manhunt for the pair.

First to spot the two young men was Palo Pinto County Sheriff Fred W. Foreman, who was en route to quiz the arrested couple about the Gordon school burglary. Foreman saw two men trying to hitch a ride west of Putnam about 10 a. m. Tuesday.

But by the time Sheriff Foreman could get a radio report for a description of the wanted pair, and turn his car, the hitchhikers had vanished.

The hunt quickened, but it was three hours later before the airplane spotted the pair on the other side of Putnam. If they were the hitchhikers, they had doubled back and covered more than a half-dozen miles of brush and trees in that time.

Caught, the two youths had their pockets stuffed with cigarettes, lighters, and other drug store items.

In Clark's car also were some jewelry and jewel boxes, which officers think they may have stolen in Mt. Pleasant.

Born Aug. 28, 1888, in Lafayette, Ala., he had lived in Baird more than 45 years, where he was a freight delivery man. He was a former resident of Clyde.

B. F. Russell, attorney, formerly of Baird and Callahan County, on December 13, 1958, retired from duty as Attorney and Assistant Chief of Acquisition Branch, Southwestern Division, Corps of Engineers, United States Army, in a simple ceremony in the division's office at 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas.

Brig. Gen. William Whipple, Division Engineer, presented Mr. Russell with a transistor radio and a fireplace set. In his work with the Corps of Engineers Mr. Russell handled legal matters in connection with acquiring land for military installations and water resources prospects in eight Southwestern states.

Former Clyde Man Dies Saturday Night

Thomas R. Haggard, 71, former Colorado City and Clyde resident, died Saturday night at his home in Denton following a heart attack.

Funeral was held at 2 p. m. Monday in Kiker and Son Chapel in Colorado City. Rev. Jack Ellzey, pastor of St. Luke Methodist Church at Midland and former Colorado City pastor, officiated, assisted by Rev. J. F. Selcraig, First Baptist Church pastor.

Burial was in Colorado City Cemetery.

Born March 10, 1887 in the Hazel Dell community, Comanche County, Mr. Haggard was a graduate of Dublin High School. He married the former Tava Duff Sept. 9, 1908 in Comanche County and the couple ranched there for several years.

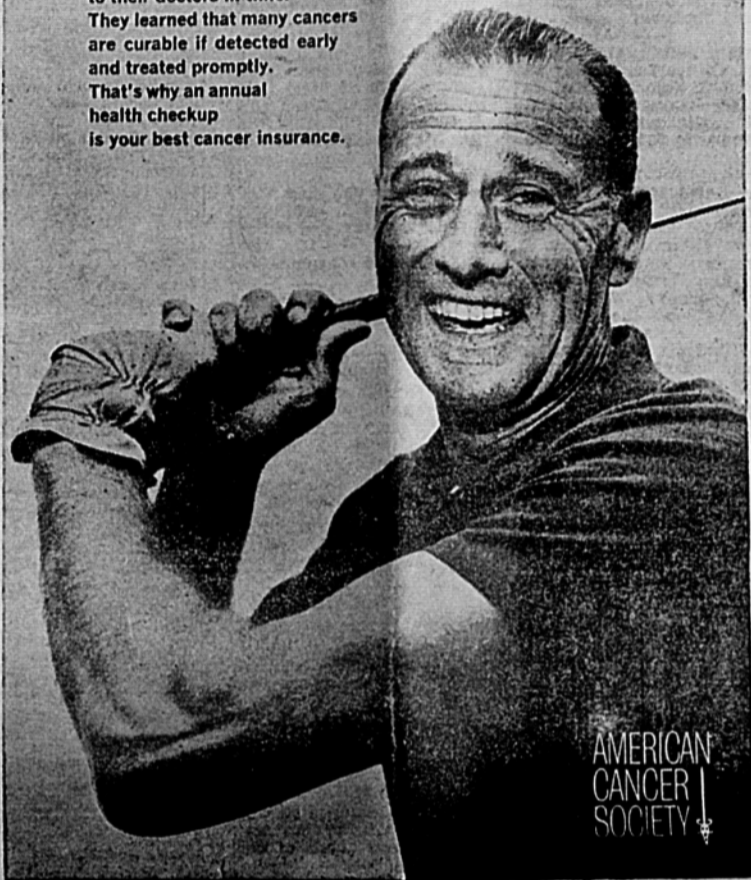

IT'S THE LAW
In Texas...

MAN-MADE LAW?

With the opening sessions of Congress and Texas Legislature, thoughts naturally turn to the products of their labors — our state and national laws.

Some people find confusing our different state and national laws dealing with the same things.

Surely, they say, you can have no real justice, unless there is some one "best way" to do each thing—to hold property, to manage traffic, to pay taxes, or to enforce contracts.

So it bothers them. Why should Englishmen drive on the left side of the street? Why should married couples hold title under community property laws in some states and not in others?

Is law merely a man-made contraption?

Is it true that like good manners much law is man-made, growing out of custom or local problems. In card games you can play many different games with one deck. You merely change the rules. But the law goes deeper than convention into man's basic needs for order, for a grasp of the part he is to play, and for a way to settle disagreements.

Law provides an orderly way to do things so that people can make lone-range plans and work together. Its rules help you to find out where you stand—your rights and duties. And last, law has binding ways to settling disputes if need be, first to keep the peace, and then win people over by dealing with them in ways that satisfy their sense of fairness.

You can find these traits of law in most groups from the most primitive to the civilized.

As man finds out more and more about himself and his world, as his experience and wisdom grow, the law may get better. For example, as the psychological laboratories find out more about man's reaction times, his fears and faults, our laws about driving, for instance, may improve.

And here is another purpose the different kinds of laws may serve. You may look upon each as a sort of experiment. Some turn out badly, and some well.

But in the give and take of public discussion, these efforts may yet bring us more nearly to the "one best way"—if any such thing exists.

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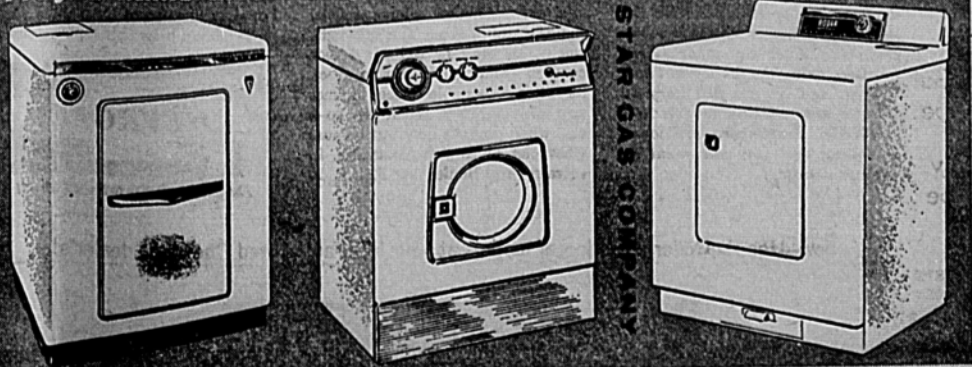
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NEWS ITEMS FROM PUTNAM

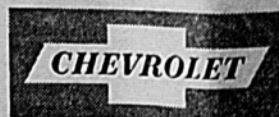

County TSTA Unit Meets In Cross Plains

The Callahan County Unit of the TSTA met in the Cross Plains High School Auditorium on Monday night, January 19, 1959.

Refreshments of pie and coffee were served after which the Cross Plains High School Band under the direction of Mr. Roy Flournoy entertained.

The President, Mr. R. W. Reynolds, introduced the speaker R. M. (Bob) Wagstaff of Abilene. He said his was to be "a serious talk, because these are serious times." He went on to say that "our nation is a new nation; it has lived scarcely two hundred years. It is a different nation and there is no other like it on the face of the globe, based on free enterprise rather than on socialism or dictatorship. We alone have the form of government in which the individual is free. A group of demagogues wrote the Declaration of Independence. They produced a type of government which the world had never seen—a Republic. Under the system, the President could not be a dictator and there was a check on everyone except the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court has been asked to exercise more restraint. For 167 years it needed no check, but in the last few years we have seen a change in the Supreme Court. An attempt is being made to remove power from the states and give it to the Federal Government.

"In no way can socialism compete with free enterprise. There is hardly a nation that has not tried to create a socialistic form of government. All experiments have failed. England tried communism and wrecked the British Empire. All that remains of the attempt is socialized medicine.

"We are facing a crisis today in our nation. The trend is to put the Federal government into everything. Communists know that if they can get control of education they can make the United States socialistic. This country has worked, it is a Republic . . . and we have kept it until now."

The spring meeting will be in Baird.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

A work plan for Turkey Creek watershed of 59,200 acres was developed during 1958, calling for the construction of 12 flood-water retarding structures. This plan also calls for an effective conservation program based upon the use of each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities and its treatment in accordance with its need. The application of these land treatment measures is now being carried out by the Central Colorado and Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Districts. Turkey Creek lies within these two districts.

Developing of the work plan was in addition to the servicing of 426 soil conservation district cooperators as they applied conservation practices to their lands during the past year. These cooperators are located in the Central Colorado, Lower and Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts.

Proper utilization of rangeland was applied to 63,737 acres, while grazing of 19,525 acres of rangeland was deferred. Brush control was applied to 6,426 acres of native grazing lands, as a part of a coordinated soil, water, plant and wildlife conservation program.

Other conservation measures applied to the land were cover cropping, stubble mulching, strip cropping, fertilizing, range seeding, wildlife area improvement and fish pond improvement.

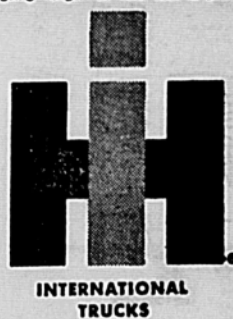
