## Depression Sends Family Cruising

The depression with its lack of employment has done many strange things to human activities. The reaction of the people over the country is an interesting study and at the same time has its value in showing how the human race reacts to adapt itself to changing conditions. Not all animals have been able to survive when climatic conditions have changed their mode of living or their source of food. But man, has been able, with a few domestic animals of the lower order, to do this.

A 58-foot ketch, literally a home afloat, has left New Orleans for the South Seas bearing an Illinois family that is satisfying its wanderlust by going "where inclination leads us."

Skipper of the Zarark, a corruption of "It's Our Ark," is Ralph W. Zimmerman, Winnetka, Ill., architect. His crew consists of Mrs. Zimmerman, their 18-year-old son William, their daughter Jeanne, 16; Larned Bowman, a friend, and Fritz, a Schnauzer mascot.

The Zimmermans, who left Chicago early in December and went to New Orleans by the Lakes-to-Gulf route, explained that economic necessity and wanderlust combined in charting their sea adventure. With a slump in building, Mr. Zimmerman reasoned that a floating home would mean a saving in living expenses and the satisfaction of their longing for travel. He purchased the vessel in Stamford, Conn., and brought it to Chicago through the Erie Canal and Great Lakes.

The boat has a 20-horsepower auxiliary motor and is equipped with a full set of charts and navigating instruments. A complete galley, a kerosene refrigerator and three cabins make it thoroughly comfortable. A Pacific crossing in the sturdy craft holds no fears for the group, all of whom—even Miss Zimmerman—are described as hardy sailors capable of handling the helm or canvas in heavy weather.

From New Orleans the ketch pointed for Jamaica. From that point it will continue to Panama. "We'll probably head for the Galapagos Islands and from there to Tahiti, Samoa or any place that seems inviting," Mr. Zimmerman said.

The younger Zimmermans, despite the fact that they are missing several months of school, expect to gain rather than lose in education. In addition to the advantages of travel, they are prepared for continued study through an excellent library they have taken along.

## Worlds Cotton 21,000,000 Bales

There are a vast number of growers of cotton in Texas. There is a small army of crop sharers. According to a revised estimate by the New York cotton exchange service world production of commercial cotton this season will total about 22,396,000. This compared with 25,560,000 bales last season and 23,665,000 bales two seasons ago and 5,500,000 bales smaller than the average from 1934 and 1925 to 1828 and 1929. Speaking of the United States production, it was 9,619,000 bales, against 12,712,000 bales last season. Foreign output was 12,777,000 against 12,850,000 last season. Total production of commercial foreign cotton this season is the second largest in history, falling short of last season's record growth of 12,450,000 by 73,000. Everywhere in foreign lands where the cotton plant can be grown the production is increasing from year to year. This is not the darker side of it. Everywhere in foreign lands, from Russia to the Chinese sea, cheap labor produces cotton and cheap workers in the textile mills assist in its fabrication and the finished product finds its way to bargain counters of the seven seas of the world. Facts are ugly, but man must face them. He was not made to be a spineless thing and ever afraid of his shadow or the future.

## Two Important Rulings Supreme Court

Texas democrats bar negroes from their state primaries. Now the supreme court of the United States has ruled that the action of the state democratic convention was constitutional and the colored brother has no recourse. Of course, in the bygone years the colored brother was dragged to the polling places of the major and minor cities when the fate of large bond issues was at stake. He was permitted to cast a ballot to levy high taxes on self and his white brother and thus was given recognition, but he cannot vote or cast a ballot in a democratic primary even if he had the right in other years to vote for bond issues with the sky as the limit regardless of color or previous condition of servitude.)

Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes announced another important ruling. In the famous Scottsboro cases carried to the court of last resort from Alabama a new trial was granted for the reason (the chief justice said) the constitutional right of two negroes was violated because negroes were excluded from jury service at their trial. Thus away down in Texas negroes cannot be barred from jury service but they may be barred from the primary ballot box if their white brother objects to "their immediate presence."

## Tom Connally To Ask For Centennial Aid

Sen. Tom Connally of Texas is a native son. He may introduce a bill for government assistance to the Texas Centennial celebration "as soon as the legislature decides what it wants to do." He is positive that the proposed appropriation would be in keeping with previous allocations for similar exhibitions and might run into millions of dollars. In 1893 the federal congress appropriated \$4,778,000 for the first world's fair held in the city of Chicago. This was the largest appropriation made by the congress to assist a national fair or an exhibition or a celebration. Sen. Connally has a list of all similar expenditures of the government.

## UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN April 4. — Pioneer Texans pitted their luck against chance in different games from those against which Gov. Allred has sent present-day rangers.

Some of the games against which early gambling statutes were leveled now are unknown. On April 9, 1873, the legislature prohibited "Jenny Lind" tables. An inquiring reporter spent much of two days questioning old-timers without discovering what a "Jenny Lind" table was, nor how it was used in gambling.

Court cases resulting from the 1873 gambling law do not throw any light upon the game that was popular enough to be mentioned specifically by legislators.

Senate Secretary Bob Baker of Fort Worth has been keeper of house or senate records for more than 30 years. He has a faint impression that a "Jenny Lind" table was a pool table with prizes for special shots.

Stuart (Pinky) Francis of Dallas, an early-day sergeant-at-arms in the house, thinks that "Jenny Lind" was a variation of "rondo" a game popular in New Orleans in the seventies and eighties.

Former Adjutant General (Ranger Bill) Sterling thinks it was a "hole" game. Another border officer thought it was a game Mexicans played with cards.

That it was not "rondo" appears reasonably certain. "Rondo" is mentioned separately in the same law that forbids "Jenny Lind." Other games the law prohibited were faro, monte, vingt-et-un (Black Jack or 21), roulette, ABC, Chuck-a-Luck keno and rouge et noir.

The date of the prohibitory act and use of "Jenny Lind" as a proper name in the act indicate that it was named for the Swedish singer who toured the United States under the direction of P. T. Barnum of circus fame.

Austin's first hard rain since

Gov. Allred and family moved into the flat-roofed residence gave the governor an unexpected shower bath and damaged considerably the Sam Houston room in the executive mansion. Rain water, pocketed above a bathroom ceiling, worked through just as the governor entered the room. He received a shower instead of a tub bath.

It seems a far cry from gas waste in the Panhandle of Texas to golf balls, but waste legislation may be felt on golf links all over the country.

One of the wasteful uses of gas now under legislative attack is the manufacture of carbon black. Carbon black is used in making golf balls. It also goes into automobile tires, Sen. Clint Small of Amarillo said.

Tax payers frequently write to legislators protesting against expenditures and high taxes. Rep. B. E. Quinn of Beaumont has reversed the process. He has sent letters to tax-payer organizations and to taxpayers suggesting that they write each senator and representative in opposition to salary increase bills. Particularly, he suggests opposition to increasing the pay of county commissioners.

Appropriation bills reveal names of the many and diverse purposes for which the state employs people. Practically every usual trade and profession is included. Some of the extraordinary ones listed are psychiatrist-psychologist and dog sergeant.

Legislators took the former for granted. They wanted to know about the dog sergeant. He is employed at Gatesville Training school to keep the bloodhounds that go after escaping boys.

The department of agriculture has a girl peacan expert, one of the institutions a picture machine operator, Serologist, technician-pathologist and roentgenologist-technician are some of the other titles.

High-sounding titles do not always help to get a big salary. Representatives balked at hiring an auditor for the property section of the Adjutant General's office until they learned that the employe really is an inventory clerk and does not do work that belongs to the state auditor.

The departmental appropriation bill recalled that Mexican War pensions still are being paid. There are five pensioners, all widows of soldiers of that war. The total appropriation is \$750 a year, which is in sharp contrast to the bonus bill

totals which congress wrestles with.

Miss Claudia Johnson of Crosbyton, assistant in the engraving and enrolling department of the state senate, has become a full-fledged lawyer. She passed the February state bar examinations. This idea of the experimentalists taking apart the American business structure in an attempt to reconstruct it in a pattern more to their personal liking is working as expected. It doesn't work.

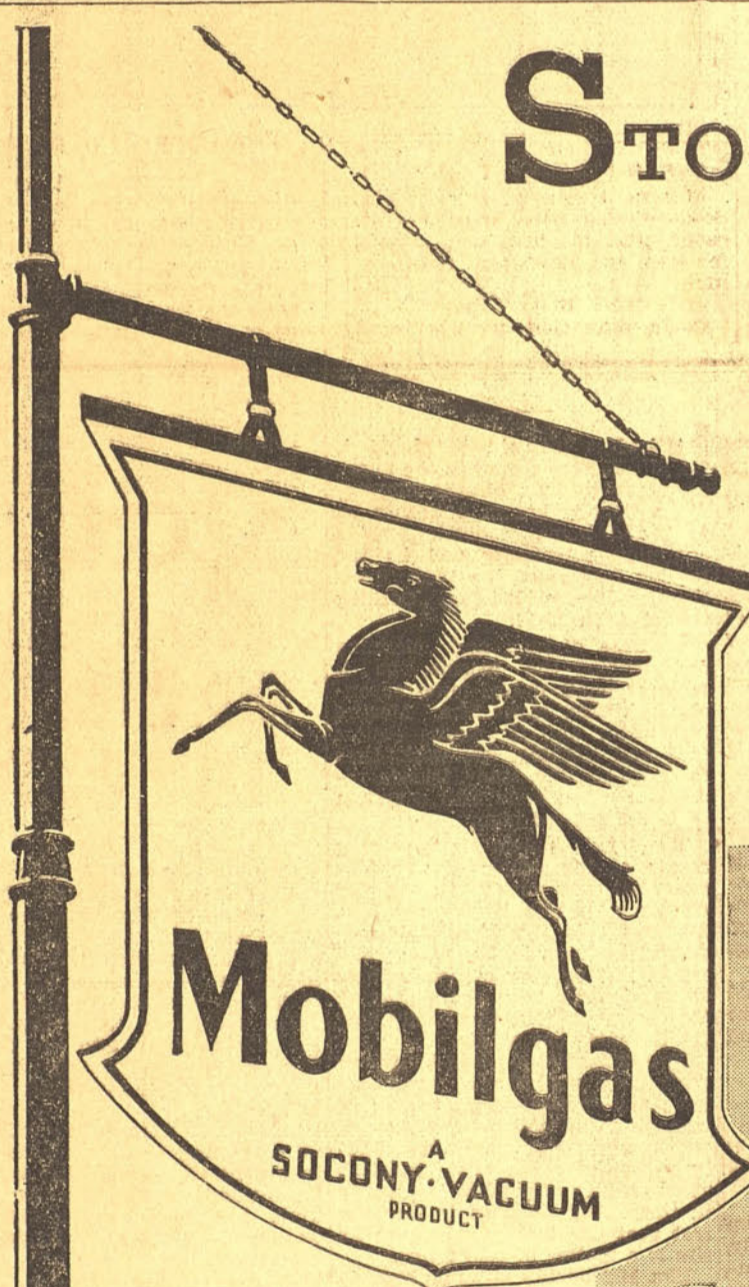

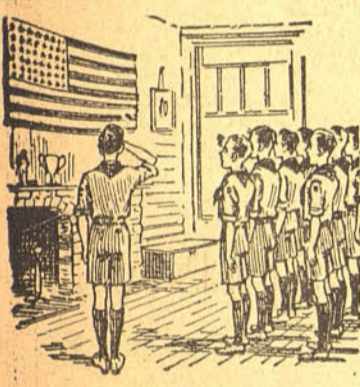

PAN-AMERICAN HIGHWAY SEEN AS PROBABLE

LAREDO, April 4 — Possibility that the Pan-American highway long an issue in Latin-American politics, will within a few years stretch from Laredo to Panama City was predicted by Nelson Rounsevell, publisher of the Panama American, Panama City, proponent of the highway. For the first time all nations along the proposed route of the highway have agreed to send delegates to the Pan-American conference which meets in San Salvador. The conference was called by Rounsevell and will seek to establish a corporation of the nations involved, whereby funds for the construction work can be procured. Seven nations, Honduras, Nicaragua, San Salvador, Panama, Costa Rica, Guatemala and Mexico have agreed to send a lawyer and an engineer each to take part in the discussion. One plan suggested by Rounsevell calls for the levying of a capital toll of one cent a mile for travel on the highway to pay for the cost. Much of the highway, it was pointed out, has already been built. The highway between Laredo and Mexico City is to be opened within a few months.

Billy Sunday Says Roosevelt Director

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., April 4. Billy Sunday, 72-year-old veteran of the sawdust trail, whose voice has rung out in evangelistic halls for decades in a bitter battle against liquor, license and religious laxity, sees in America a second Rome, whose grandeur slowly is crumbling. Atheistic leaders, dictatorial in power, fascistic in policies, are guiding the nation to its ultimate downfall, and an age of American people indifferent to God, moral standards and the ideals of pioneering forefathers are aiding in the destruction of all that is American by their passive attitude, the evangelist told the United Press today. "The world is going straight to hell so fast it's breaking the speed limit," the one-time baseball player said, placing Russia and Germany in the van in this mad rush into disaster. "The Russia which knew the absolute rule of czarism was a Sunday school compared to the government by Stalin today," he stated. Germany is little better, and other nations of the world are following close behind in the parade into cataclysm. "In our own country everything's heading toward communism, socialism and fascism—even today our President, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, is a virtual dictator," he pointed out.

Girl Refused Right Of Springing Trap

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., April 4 — Authorities turned thumbs down on the request of Thelma Rediger, 20-year-old college student, who asked that she be allowed to spring the death trap for a condemned negro murderer here. "No," said Sheriff Scott Curtis. "In the first place it's an unpleasant job; secondly, the law provides that I must do it." The girl made the unusual request because she wanted to experience the sensation of hanging someone, thus proving her nerve and qualifying her as a detective story author.

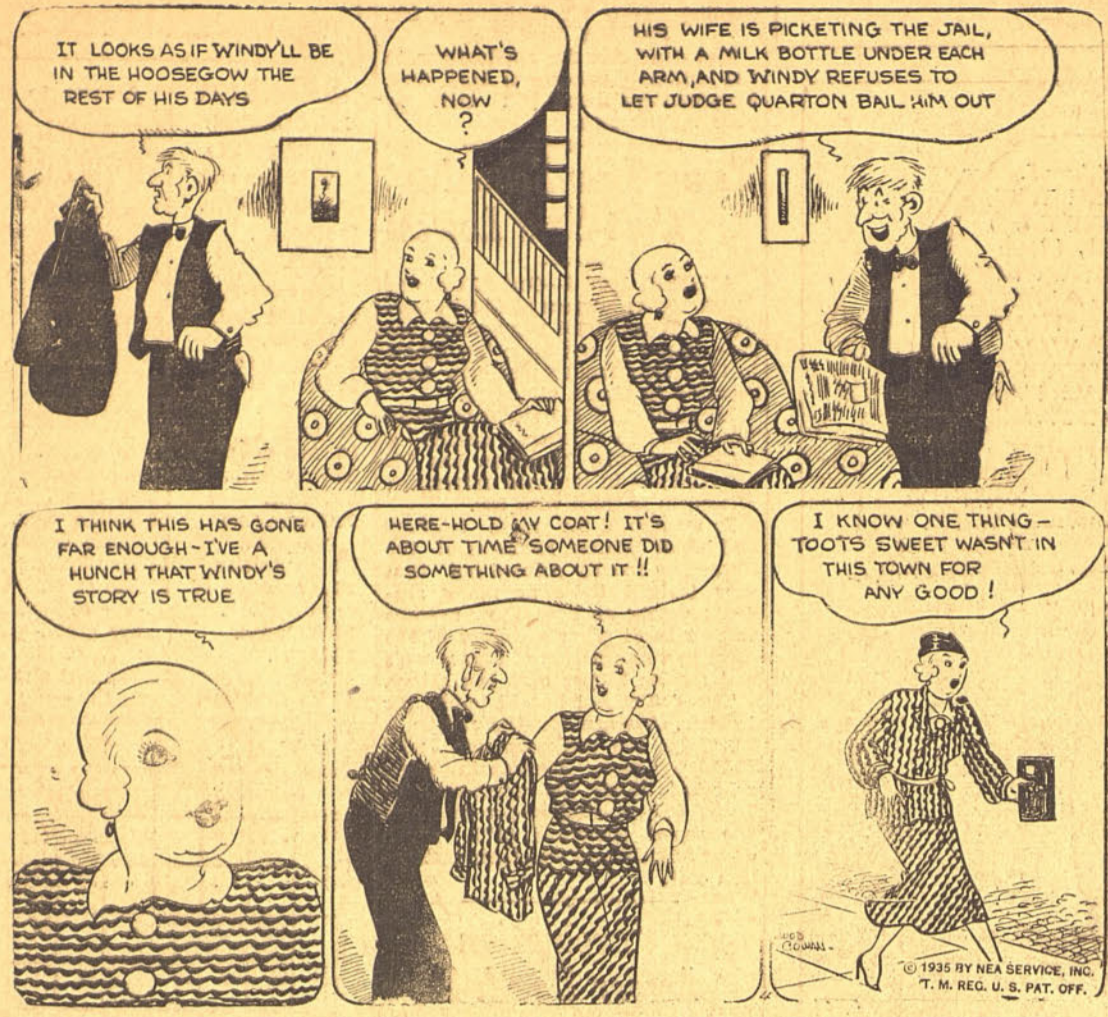
Competitive Girls' Basketball Scored

AUSTIN, April 4 — There's a lot of trouble ahead for those schools which are going in for inter-school girls' basketball on a highly competitive basis, Texas high schools are warned in an editorial in the current issue of the Interscholastic League, official organ of the Texas Interscholastic League. The Leaguer is published by the University of Texas bureau of public school interests, which serves as the state executive office for the league. "The thing has been studied by the most competent authorities and they are practically a unit in condemning it under present school conditions," the editorial said. "It is beginning to make some money and that makes it all the more dangerous. The league office is beginning to get protests on girls' basketball from teachers who apparently think that the competition is fostered by the league. It is not. The league has nothing to do with inter-school basketball for girls and does not offer to decide any disputes, or give any advice, except: 'Quit it.'"

BROWNSVILLE TO HAVE DEEP WATER PORT
