FORTURING OF **HUSBAND SAID DEATH CAUSE**

KANSAS CITY, April 4 - Expernced police officers, inured to crime in its most shocking forms. confessed bafflement today in their efforts to clear up the case of Mr. and Mrs Hubert Hurd and their adopted daughter.

A hodge-podge of spiritualism arbaric cruelty, and near homicide confused their attempts to learn why Hurd, 77-year-old railroad watchman, shot and fatally wounded his sturdy wife, Nellie, 67.

Hurd told detectives last night that his wife tortured him with flames and whip and knives into signing a prepostrous statement in which he "confessed" to giving \$15,-000 from a "hidden fortune to neighbor woman with whom she accused him of having intimate rela-



Paris and London indicate the Stresa conference will be widened to include discussions of the entire European political situation.



MOSCOW, April 3 - The appointment of Lazar Kaganovitch, Soviet Russia's Number One "troushooter" and close friend of bonds — a \$500 one." Stalin, as Commissar of Transport marks the beginning of a terrific drive by the Kremlin to modernize the nation's railroads.

More than 4,000,000,000 Soivet roubles have been placed in Kaganovich's hands to lay new rails and buy rolling stock. And the plan for car production has been stepped up by 35,000 units. By the end of 1935 the Soviets expects to have 80,000 cars in operation.

Fear of War

Fear of war as well as the necessity to step-up the transportation system to keep pace with industrial development are the reasons for the current "big push" on the railroad front.

Soviet Russia, according to transportation experts, has the most backward railroad system of any modern industrial nation. It still is using types of locomotives and cars which were abandoned a decade ago in western Europe and America Military men are agreed that if Russia suddenly were plunged into war it would find its backward railroad system its weakest spot.

To the task of modernizing its railroads the Kremlin has appointed a stocky, energetic man with a remarkable record of past accomplishments -Kaganovitch. **Tremendous Energy**

As head of the Communists party here, Kaganovitch, during the past ew years, has paved and widened obblestone streets, erected hundreds of new apartment houses and public buildings and supervised the con-

Worlds Cotton 21,000,000 Bales

There are a vast number of growers of cotton in Texas. There is a small army of crop sharers. According to a revised estimate by the New York cotton exchange service world production of commercial cotton this season will total about 22,396,000. This compared with 25,560,000 bales last season and 23,665,000 bales two seasons ago and 5,500,000 bales smaller than the average from 1934 and 1925 to 1828 and 1929. Speaking of the United States production, it was 9,619,000 bales, against 12,712,000 bales last season. Foreign output was 12,777,000 against 12,850,000 last season. Total production of commercial foreign cotton this season is the second largest in history, falling short of last season's record growth of 12,450,000 by 73,000. Everywhere in foreign lands where the cotton plant can be grown the production is increasing from year to year. This is not the darker side of it. Everywhere in foreign lands, from Russia to the Chinese sea, cheap labor produces cotton and cheap workers in the textile mills assist in its fabrication and the finished product finds its way to bargain counters of the seven seas of the world. Facts are ugly, but man must face them. He was not made to be a spineless thing and ever afraid of his shadow or the future.

Two Important Rulings Supreme Court

Texas democrats bar negroes from their state primaries. Now the supreme court of the United States has ruled that the action of the state democratic convention was constitutional and the colored brother has no recourse. Of course, in the bygone years the colored brother was dragged to the polling places of the major and minor cities when the fate of large bond issues were at stake. He was permitted to cast a ballot to levy high taxes on self and his white brother and thus was given recognition, but he cannot vote or cast a ballot in a democratic primary even if he had the right in other years to vote for bond issues with the sky as the limit regardless of color or previous condition of servitude.)

Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes announced another important ruling. In the famous Scottsboro cases carried to the court of last resort from Alabama a new trial was granted for the reason (the chief justice said) the constitutional right of two negroes was violated because negroes were excluded from jury service at their trial. Thus away down in Texas negroes cannot be barred from jury service but they may be barred from the primary ballot box if their white brother objects to "their immediate presence."

Tom Connally To Ask For Centennial Aid

Sen. Tom Connally of Texas is a native son. He may introduce a bill for government assistance to the Texas Centennial celebration "as soon as the legislature decides what it wants to do." He is positive that the proposed appropriation would be in keeping with previous allocations for similar expositions and might run into millions of dollars. In 1893 the federal congress appropriated \$4,778,000 for the first world's fair held in the city of Chicago. This was the largest appropriation made by the congress to assist a national fair or an exhibition or a celebration. Sen. Connally has a list of all similar expenditures of the government.
