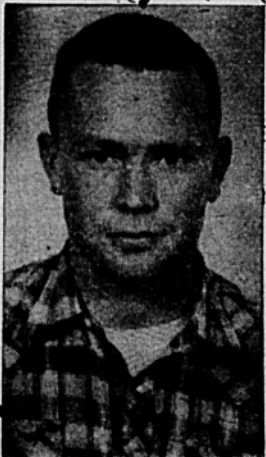
## Save A Life By Giving a Blanket

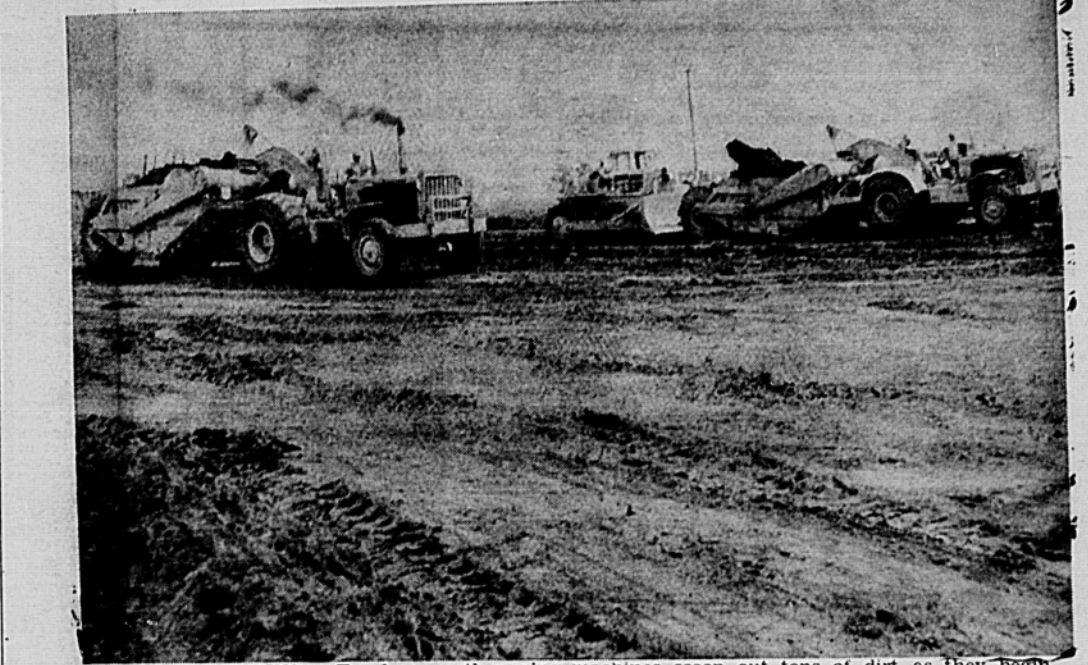

## Missile Site Work Begins Monday

With work to begin about a week apart on each of the 12 Atlas missile sites to be located within a 35-mile radius of Dyess Air Force Base, huge construction machinery was put into operation early Monday morning at the first missile site, located between Baird and Clyde, just south of State Highway 18.

H. B. Zachry Co. and Brown & Root Co., contractor for the \$20,075,000 project, started excavation of an area roughly as large as a football field. The excavation will slope to a depth of about 40 feet and is expected to be completed in a week or less.

Once the surface excavation is completed, a shaft about 60 feet in diameter will be drilled to a depth of 170 feet, which will contain the Atlas silo, supervisors said.

An office was opened Monday morning at 1833 S. Treadway in Abilene by the Zachry Firm, and will serve as its headquarters throughout the 14-month construction period.

D. V. Moore, project manager said that in addition to the main office in Abilene, a field office will be maintained at each of the 12 construction sites.

Only about 25 persons were on the job Monday morning, but Moore said up to 650-700 workers will probably be hired locally.

Next site to get under way will be the Denton site, about 10 miles south of Clyde, and the third will be the site just north of Opal. These first three are all located in Callahan County.

Other locations of the sites include three in Taylor county, three in Jones, one each in Nolan, Runnels and Shackelford counties.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

In a period of deep gloom about state finances Texans had to pinch themselves to believe the good news.

U. S. Supreme Court ruled that Texas does indeed own its tidelands for 10½ miles out -- just as Texans have been claiming for 115 years.

Financially, it's a long-range gain at best. But as a moral victory for Texas principles, it's the biggest thing since the Battle of San Jacinto.

Revenue from the publicly owned land will go into the permanent school fund. Problem of Texas' bankrupt general fund is unchanged.

How much money comes to the school fund will depend on how much oil is under the submerged land and how good is the market. Money going into the permanent school fund -- from mineral leases, royalties, bonuses, etc. -- is invested, and only the income from these investments may be used for current school spending.

Thus far, the oil yield from Texas tidelands has been far from spectacular. There have been only 24 producing oil wells and 47 gas wells in 22 years.

But if conditions are promising, oil men undoubtedly will keep trying. As an immediate effect, the state will get some \$29,000,000 in mineral payments that accumulated while the issue of state or federal ownership was being thrashed out.

Politicking Vacation -- Gov. Price Daniel will spend his vacation politicking for U. S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson.

First stop will be the National Governors Conference in Montana June 26-29. After that, said the governor, he'll vacation and visit around with other governors where he feels he can do the Texas favorite son's cause the most good.

And after that, he will go on to the National Democratic Convention in Los Angeles July 11.

Daniel predicted Johnson would lead on the first ballot at the convention.

Anti-Income Taxers -- Voters who oppose the federal income tax and the United Nations will find a haven in the Constitution Party.

Like the Republicans and Democrats, the Constitution Party will hold a state convention June 14 to name delegates to a national convention.

At a preliminary meeting in Austin, delegates were selected and instructed to work for a ticket headed by J. Edgar Hoover for president and Tom J. Anderson of Nashville, Tenn., for vice president.

Constitution Party also nominated candidates for all statewide offices except governor. Gubernatorial nominee was omitted because if he should receive 200,000 or more votes in a general election, state law would require the party to go the expensive primary nomination route next election year.

Hospital Needs Grow -- Deficit or no deficit, the State Hospital Board says the hospital system has increased money needs that must be reckoned with.

Board has voted to ask the Legislature for a \$107,000,000 appropriation for the 1962-63 period. This would be \$34,000,000 more than the present allocation.

Part of the extra funds, about \$2,000,000 a year, would go to hire extra people so present staffers could change from the present 44-hour week to a 40-hour week. Board has recommended this change to put hospital employees on equal footing with those of other state agencies.

But the main problem, says the Board, is that the hospital system is getting more and more patients and needs more money to take care of them. In addition -- it has the problem of car-

ing for many oldsters who are not really mentally ill.

Youth Needs Cited -- Another state agency with a story of urgent need for more state support is the Texas Youth Council.

Youth Council has the responsibility for trying to stem the tide of rising juvenile delinquency and also to provide homes for children who have none of their own.

For this task in 1961-63 the Council is asking for a \$13,695,-636 appropriation -- up by \$3,-500,000 from the present.

Some of this would be used for new construction at Gatesville Training School for Boys, Gainesville Training School for Girls, a state home of orphaned Negro children and for additions to the Waco and Corsicana State Homes for orphans.

It also would enable the Council to set up a parole supervision staff to follow up on the rehabilitation of youngsters released from training schools.

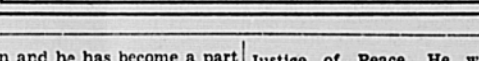

Justice of Peace. He was a plump, middle-aged man with mild blue eyes and a quiet way of speaking. The conversation had been about this and that; then Wood, addressing me, asked: "Did you ever hear the West Texas tradition that a horned frog can live a hundred years without food or water?"

Newspaper instinct told me that here was a good story but that instinct also told me to handle the line with care. So, in an equally casual tone, I replied, "No -- but then I'm comparatively new in West Texas and don't know all the traditions. Why?" His answer was, "We'll soon know whether it's true or not."

"How is that?" "Because when the cornerstone of this courthouse was laid a live horned frog was placed in it."

He then related the circumstances: The courthouse cornerstone was going to be laid. Being a member of the band, he would have a part in the ceremonies. As he was leaving home Wood saw his son, Will, playing with a horned frog. The father had read, a day or so before in

the Dallas News, something about the purported ability of these creatures to survive a century without food or water. Deciding to put the matter to a test, he took the frog and proceeded downtown.

Because of his duties as a musician, Wood knew he would not have the opportunity to place the frog in the cornerstone, where also were deposited a Bible, newspapers and coins.

That night, (after our conversation) I wrote a short news article, keeping the carbon for use in the Eastland paper and sending the original to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, of which I was the local correspondent. Not only did the Star-Telegram publish the article but the Associated Press, of which that newspaper is a member, sent the dispatch to hundreds of journals.

Letters came to Eastland from many sections. Visitors asked about the matter and townspeople traveling to other areas were showered with inquiries: Was it really true that a live frog had been sealed in the cornerstone? When would the stone be opened? The seekers for information who dwell in more distant regions wanted to know if there actually were frogs with horns. The young editor was amazed at the wide interest which had been aroused.

It was not long until destruction of the courthouse began. County Judge E. S. Pritchard promised to learn from the contractors the exact day and an estimated hour that the cornerstone would be reached. So on a Friday morning the editor was informed that probably in the middle of the afternoon of the next day the cornerstone would be opened. Through the Associated Press, millions were informed of this.

On Saturday, February 18, 1928, shortly after noon, people began to gather and the crowd grew steadily larger. The frog was the only topic of conversation: Would he be found -- and if so, would he be alive? There was one member of the crowd who was sure that nothing would be discovered, not even a shriveled mummy or a pinch of dust that could be identified. This individual was the brash young editor who had started all the speculation. (To be concluded next week.)

## IT'S THE LAW In Texas...

CONTINGENCIES In this unpredictable life of ours, it is the law's business to take a long look into the future and say what would "happen if". For in your contract, leases, wills, insurance policies, escrows and the like, you had better say what would "happen if" some of your best laid plans go awry. Such events the law calls "contingencies." Who gets the "earnest money" you put down, if you cannot go through with buying that house? What if you want to pay up that loan and save interest? What happens if a partnership goes sour, or a partner gets sick or dies? What happens if the peo-

ple you name in your will should die before you do, or, if you all perish in a common catastrophe like a car smashup?

The law is wise but it cannot do your thinking for you. It settles such questions -- but not always to your liking. If you don't make a will, the law says who shall get your property. If you leave certain things out of a contract, the law assumes that you meant to put some certain things in. But how much better it would be in the first place to put them in the way you want them, by asking "what if?"

Take your will now: Your first desire of course, is to take care of your wife and children -- those nearest to you. But won't hurt anything to "contingent beneficiaries" in your will in case something happens to thwart your first intentions.

Review your will every year or so to see if it meets the new things that have come up, or arrange with your lawyer to write in "contingent beneficiaries" -- those who will receive your property if your first beneficiaries should die before you do.

You may have long ago had your son provided for in your will, but what about those lovely grandchildren he and his wife have presented to you since you wrote the will? What would happen if things go wrong and your son should die before you?

Or take your widowed sister and her children now. Suppose you and your immediate family should be wiped out: Would you want your property to go equally to her and your well-heeled bachelor brother? Or would you prefer to leave your brother some token of your affection, and then really take care of your sister?

You may be impatient with the law's long memory. Such things never happen, you think, but the court records are full of plans which failed. And so the law has ways in which you can provide for "what happens -- if." One way is the device of contingent beneficiaries in your will and insurance policies.

**WANTED BY THE FBI**

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyd-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a C-shaped scar on his right thumb.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

Convicted of second-degree murder, he is considered armed and dangerous.

## Lawn Mowers Can Be Dangerous

Did you know a rotary power lawn mower blade travels at speeds up to 150 miles per hour and is capable of throwing sticks, stones, or other objects at comparable speeds? Imagine what would happen if you were hit by one of these fast-flying objects.

Power lawn mowers are now in the majority both in town and among farm people. Along with their increased use has been a closely related increase in accidents involving both operators and bystanders. Most accidents have been due to carelessness or lack of knowledge on the part of the individual.

W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, offers these suggestions on how to operate your rotary power lawn mower safely and efficiently.

Always disconnect spark plug wire before working on the blade.

A clean sharp blade does a better cutting job and requires less power.

Never operate mower with safety shields removed.

Make sure all rocks and debris are removed from the area before close mowing.

Do not refill the gasoline tank when engine is hot or running.

Run mower as slow as possible to do good work.

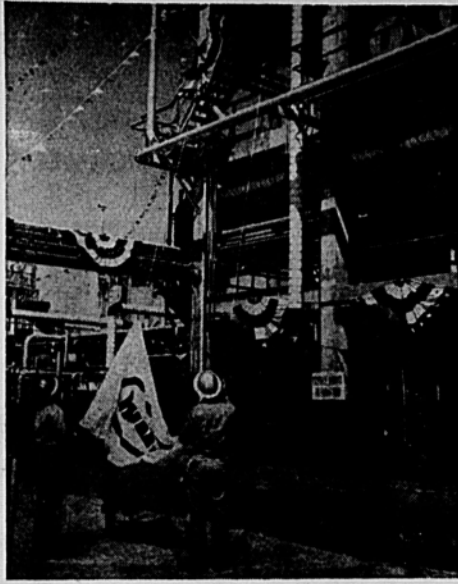
Keep children and pets away from mowers.

Always be certain of sure footing when mowing on steep slopes.

Never leave engine running when mower is unattended.

Make sure mower is steady and under control before starting engine.

Always be aware of the hazards involved when you are using a power mower. Don't get caught napping.

## About Your Health.

Cancer and heart diseases set a grim new record last year, accounting for almost half the 73,754 total deaths in Texas during 1959.

Final tabulation of State Department of Health death statistics shows 24,629 deaths from

heart diseases and 11,086 from cancer.

The cancer death rate in Texas is still below the rate for the United States as a whole. Texas registered 117 deaths from the disease for each 100,000 population compared to the national cancer death rate of close to 150 per each 100,000 population.

Texas has a younger popula-

tion, which probably accounts for the disparity between the death rates. Cancer strikes most frequently at people past 45 Texas and national cancer deaths last year, 9,768 were past 45.

Heart diseases are demonstrating a significant increase. Three years ago there were 22,888 deaths from heart diseases -- a rise of 1,741 for 1959 over the number registered for 1956.

Most of the increase is in the older age groups. Of the total heart disease deaths, 23,519 were past 45 years of age. The heart disease rate for all ages during 1959 was 261 per 100,000 population.

As life expectancy increases, more and more people are going to fall victim to heart diseases and cancer by virtue of living into the ages when they are more vulnerable to the ravages of the twin menaces.

Here is a simple four-point regimen for general good health:

1. Eliminate excessive weight that taxes your heart. Do not overeat.

2. Ask your family physician about a plan of exercise suitable for you. A non-strenuous hobby is beneficial.

3. If you must smoke, do it in moderation. There is strong evidence linking excessive smoking to increase in lung cancer.

4. Above all, see your family physician at least once annually for a thorough physical examination.

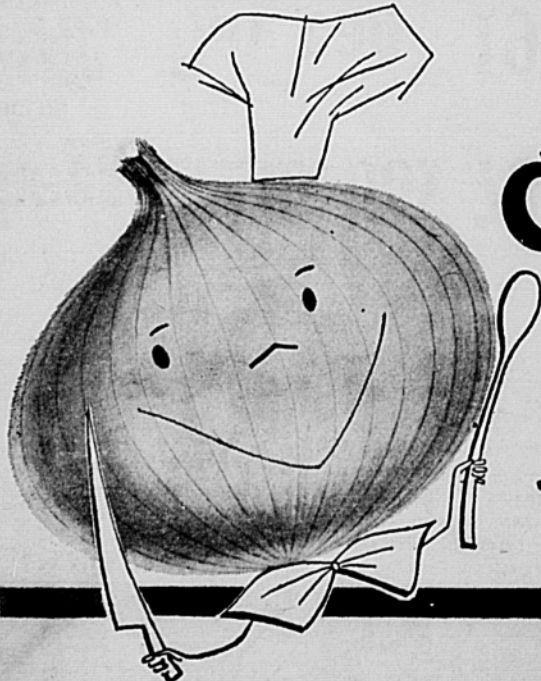
