Most Wonted Fugitives," is wanted for
escape from the California Institution
for Men, Chine, Calif., where he was
serving a 5 years to life sentence for
murdering an Air Force sergeant. A
Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1950,
charging him with unlawful interstate
flight to avoid confinement for murder.
A white American, born on October
25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett
is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall
and weights 160 to 170 pounds. He
has light brown hair, heal eyes, a fair
complexion, a medium build, and has
worked as a clerk-typist, laborer,
worshouseman, laboratory technicion,
and altyd-resin cooker for a point
manufacturer. His two upper front
teeth slant inward and he wears
glouses, reportedly being extremely
meanighted and capable of seeing
only close objects without them. He
has a mole under his chin and a C
shaped scar on his right thumb.
Corbett, once a premedical student,
is interested in scientific matters,
oridly reads technical and travel
books, and is intensely interested in
firearms and torget proclice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and senerally lives quietly
and neetly but becomes erratic when
drinking alcoholic beveroges.

Convicted of second-degree murder,
he is considered armed and dangerous.



Lawn Mowers Can Be Dangerous

Did you know a rotary power lawn mower blade travels at speeds up to 150 miles per hour and is capable of throwing sticks, stones, or other objects at comparable speeds? Imagine what would happen if you were hit by one of these fast-flying objects.

Power lawn mowers are now in the majority both in town and among farm people. Along with their increased use has been a closely related increase in accidents involving both operators and bystanders. Most cidents have been due to careless or lack of knowledge on the part of the individual.

W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, offers these suggestions on how to operate your rotary power lawn mower safely and efficiently.

Always disconnect spark plug wire before working on the blade. Power lawn mowers are now




