Appearing in the Fort Worth Press on November 12, was an article about a new medical device called "The Simultaneous Multiple Analyzer" SMA for short, being used in St. Joseph Hospital in Fort Worth The machine, which can produce 30 seperate reports per hour, is fed two small vials of blood from each patient. The serum pours through plastic tubes, heating units within the SMA controls temperatures, and special pumps move the serum through various chemical agents. Within two minutes, the machine has measured 12 different substances in the blood of one individual A physician applies his medical knowledge to the resulting graph sheet and can pinpoint the initial stages of a disease, as well as the disease litself.

The SMA machine costs \$60,000. The series of tests now given a patient costs about 25. The same tests run by SMA costs \$15.00 per patient.

This medical device has met with such acceptance among doctors that some believe an annual SMA for every patient will become as common as a
