

Dr. G. A. Dunn, Jr., former teacher at the University of Texas, has joined the faculty of Cisco Junior College to teach history and government, according to an announcement Monday by President G. C. Hogue. He replaced C. A. Womelsdorff, who resigned at mid-term.

Dr. Dunn has traveled extensively and done research on four continents. He holds a BA degree in English from ACC, a master's degree from Texas Tech with a major in history and anthropology, and a doctor's degree from the University of Texas with a major in history.

Dr. and Mrs. Dunn live at their farm residence on Highway 183 some 12 miles south of Cisco.

Mr. Womelsdorff, who was in his sixth year at CJC, was reported to be planning to study law at Baylor University.

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

are many hundreds of these.  
In many homes back home  
there are those who wonder  
what became of brother, son  
or father. Perhaps they are  
here under the Unknown . . .  
but to God.

We drove up to the Nuuanu  
Pali where the wind always  
blows a gale through the pass.  
It is a beautiful scene as we  
look toward the ocean and  
Kaneohe. There is a sheer  
bluff here of perhaps one  
thousand feet. Many men  
were thrown over this bluff at  
the battle which set up Ka-  
meameha as King, and united  
all islands under one rule.  
Prior to Kameameha each  
island was a separate govern-  
ment. Several rulers succeed-  
ed Kameameha. King Lun-  
alilo did much to establish  
the Christian religion on the  
islands. Queen Liliuokalani  
was the final ruler, and after  
her the islands became a ter-  
ritory of the U. S.

### Letters TO THE EDITOR

February 3, 1965

Editor:

If I'm correct as to the con-  
tents of my last letter we had  
not made the tour of the Na-  
val Base at Pearl Harbor  
but had only gone to the Ariz-  
ona monument and around  
Ford Island. Lieut. McCoy  
and his wife called for us at  
the hotel shortly after lunch  
last Wednesday. Their first  
greeting was to place the lei  
of fresh flowers around our  
necks and at the same mo-  
ment a kiss on the cheek.  
After these formalities we be-  
gan the acquaintance in Ha-  
waii that was begun about ten  
years ago in San Diego.

Many of the landmarks of  
1943 had changed and it was  
necessary to get my direc-  
tions straightened out. Of  
course we drove by the Ad-  
ministration building of WW  
II where we took our orders  
for further endorsements. The  
Officers Mess of that day  
burned a few years ago and  
has been replaced with a  
larger and more modern fa-  
cility. Drove by the small  
ship dry dock and the very  
large ship repair facilities to  
Hospital Point where I had  
quarters. The building has  
been closed and is not in ser-  
vice for any purpose. It was  
badly damaged during the  
Jap attack and I recall we  
had plenty fresh air at all  
times.

The submarine Base is in-  
teresting. Quite a few sub-  
marines were at dock, includ-  
ing nuclear. Training for sub-  
mariners is very thorough.  
One crew is on the submarine  
as sea while the second crew  
is undergoing training at  
Pearl Harbor. This goes on  
and on, and anyone has to  
stay alert physically and  
mentally to remain in this  
branch of the Navy.

Submarines are named from  
some species of fish or ma-  
rine life. We lost fifty-two  
submarines during WW II  
which were never heard from  
and all on board were lost.  
Among these submarines was  
"U.S.S. Cisco," S.S. No. 290,  
lost in September, 1943, with  
all aboard. There is a plaque  
in her honor on the monument  
to the 52 lost.

We have visited the Nation-  
al Memorial Cemetery of the  
Pacific here in Honolulu. It  
is known as "Punchbowl Cra-  
ter," and is constructed in  
the crater of the extinct vol-  
cano, Puuwaia. It is a beau-  
tiful place, and to go through  
it sort of makes a big lump  
in your throat and a tear in  
your eye. Ernie Pyle is bu-  
ied here. As you look at the  
thousands of markers flush  
with green grass across this  
huge crater, one wonders at  
the thousands of stories that  
lie quietly here. We walk  
along the long rows and see  
many boys from Texas. They  
are here from every State.  
The saddest of all markers  
have the simple word "Un-  
known" on them, and there  
are many hundreds of these.  
In many homes back home  
there are those who wonder  
what became of brother, son  
or father. Perhaps they are  
here under the Unknown . . .  
but to God.



now-bare rooms, he remembered '16 when his dad, J. E. was told by doctors to go to a dry, high climate because of his health. How they'd loaded him in a wagon with brothers, bound for New Mexico. They'd been told "Don't change climates too fast," but they didn't have to worry, in those days you couldn't change too fast riding behind a team of mules. Looking at the old place, Frank remembered that he was afraid he'd never see his Dad alive again, because he was so sick. But before the wagon got to Clovis area where it was to stop, the elder Sparks was riding one of the mules himself, and went on to live many years in the dry, high climate of New Mexico, and to die in 1949 at Frank's home in Eastland at a ripe old age, and of an entirely different illness.

Prowling through the old house near Belton, Frank remembered this and his brothers and sisters: Edgar, now of House, N.M.; S. E. of Fort Sumpter, N.M.; Crockett and Mrs. Arthur Milburn, both now of Clovis.

Frank had been in his senior year of law at the University of Texas in '16, and he didn't make the trip to New Mexico. He went on to finish, the war came, and things began to happen. Since then "a lot of water had gone under the bridge" as the saying goes.

And therein lies the "twist" because as Frank lingered in the old home place that day, a milestone was being reached for the home.

He doesn't remember the date exactly, but for the sake of the story, we'll say it was, say June 5, 1963.

As he wandered into one of the old rooms and saw the wall paper peeling from the walls and the debris that collects in a vacant house, he spotted a fresh, recently-attached "public notice" tacked to one of the walls.

It was an announcement by the U. S. Corps of Engineers stating that the old place had been condemned to make way for the new reservoir to be built near Belton, to be known as the Still House Hollow Reservoir. The farm place was to be covered in lake.

The notice said in part: "... this place will be sold at public auction at the Corps of Engineers office in Fort Worth on June 5, 1963, at 10 a.m."

"Why, that's today," Frank must have said to himself, remembering the date, and then as his gaze fell on the face of his watch, the little hand pointed to 10 and the big hand reached for 12.

The bare-foot, farm boy chapter was closing in Frank's life.

And now, at 70, he begins a new chapter, as presiding judge of the 91st District Court.

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


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
