CITY TAX RATE REDUCED

Tax Rate for the 1939-40 fiscal year of the City of Baird was set at \$1.45 Monday night in a special meeting of the City Council held for the consideration of the year's budget and to set the annual rate of tax levy.

The unanimous vote by Council members represents the first time since the incorporation of the City of Baird that a tax rate has been lowered.

The tax rate for the fiscal year just ended, as well as for the past several years, was \$1.50. Heretofore, only changes in the tax rate were increases voted as the City developed.

This substantial saving to taxpayers will be welcomed as a direct result of the program of economy and efficiency that the City Government has been operating under for the past two years. Although expenditures have been larger than ever before, there is more money in the various funds now than at any time in previous history.

Moneys spent have been put into civic improvements such as extensions of the water line, acquiring rights-of-ways, constructing a new well at the City Waterworks, street and intersection repairs and improvements, sanitary services, and health services.

Along with the new low tax rate, City Councilmen plan further improvements such as increased street improvements, more widespread sanitary and health services, development of a City Park, operation of a new white-way system, and extensions of the water distribution system.

'World's Record' Set By Farm Security in Pictorial Booklet

"Every once in a while a world's record is made. Apparently a group of individuals in the Farm Security Administration has scored one." This is the comment of Raymond Brooks in The Austin American upon a pictorial magazine, a copy of which has been presented to The Baird Star by J. S. McKnight. The American says that this 34-page picture book portraying the transformation of Texas and Oklahoma share croppers into farm owners sets a world's records because it is "put out by employees of FSA without expense to the government."

A very limited number of copies are available at this county's FSA office. Dr. J. J. Taylor, Editor of The Dallas News, writes of this book "... The illustrations show prosperous farm homes bought by former share tenants, with government aid. Few of us go all the way ... with the new deal but this column goes a long way with the agency which is helping industrious tenants to become farm owners. The hope of the nation is in its agriculture, the flotsam and jetsam which float through the cities and come to anchorage in the eddies of suburbs, where character degenerates and industry dries up, should be turned toward the land."

The Wichita Falls columnist, John Gould, writes: "There are few federal undertakings more challenging, more bravely conceived, than that of opening the door of hope a little wider to those who live on rented farms. That problem is so vast, so closely bound up with the welfare of the South as a whole that if even a very small measure of success attends the administration's undertaking, the cost and effort will be justified. A project that has enough of inspiration in it to prompt federal workers to pay for their own publicity must have something." Uphur Vincent writes in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram: "Anything that is done in these hectic days without expense to the federal government is worthy of commendation! But, 'I Was A Share Cropper' is really a remarkable publication."

Nathan Adams, President of the First National Bank of Dallas, was among many business men adding their comment. Mr. Adams writes: "I have found this booklet most interesting. I think if we had more of this kind of work going on our relief problems would be less burdensome."
